Nobility of Hungary have had frequent Conferences with the Emperor's Committoners concerning the Crowning of the Arch-Duke Jeph King of Hungar; the find Deputies chiefly inditing, that all those flowns or Countries which have been, or shall be recovered during this War, that were formerly parts of the ancient hingdom of Hurgary, be again annexed to the same, to be Governed by their old Laws, and enjoy their former Priviledges; And that the faid Acquisitions be declared to have been made in right of the King of Himgary, and not of the Emperor, which would be an effectual means, in the fense of so great an Obligation, to unite the Hearts and Affections of all the Hungarians in an unalterable Band to their young Prince, and to make that Country confiderable enough to be a strong Bulwark again to Germany, as it had been till the misfortunes of Lewis the Second, who perished with his Army at Mobatz. And it is be-lieved, that all things will be concluded to their faisfaction at the next Assembly of the Diet at Presbourg, which is appointed on the 20th of October next, about which

Marfeilles, August 29.
