REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED, AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING ROOM TO BE HELD, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY BY HER ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCESS OF WALES, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Ladies, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Room, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Princess.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation.

No presentation card for the Drawing Room can be received at the Lord Chamberlain's Office

after twelve o'clock on Thursday, the 18th of June next.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Princess.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Room, excepting in attendance upon the Ladies of their families.

The state apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

WHEREAS by the "Foreign Deserters' Act, 1852," it is provided, that whenever it is made to appear to Her Majesty, that due facilities are, or will be, given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of any foreign power, Her Majesty may by Order in Council, stating that such facilities are, or will be given; declare that seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant ships belonging to a subject of such power, when within Her Majesty's dominions, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships, and may limit the operation thereof subject to such conditions and qualifications, if any, as may be deemed expedient.

And whereas it hath been made to appear to Her Majesty, that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen (not being Italian subjects), who desert from British merchant ships, in the territories belonging to His Majesty the King of Italy.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters' Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, Seamen, not being slaves (and not being British subjects), who desert from merchant ships belonging to subjects of the King of Italy, within Her Majesty's dominions, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships; provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent court, and

until his sentence (if any), has been fully carried into effect.

And Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters' Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is further pleased to order and declare, that upon and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, the Order in Council, relating to seamen who desert from merchant ships belonging to subjects of the King of the kingdom of the Two Sicilies, made by virtue of the said Act, on the 19th day of August, 1853, and published in the London Gazette on the 23rd day of August, 1853, and the Order in Council, relating to seamen who desert from merchant ships belonging to subjects of the King of Sardinia, made by virtue of the said Act on the 10th day of March, 1855, and published in the London Gazette on the 13th day of March, 1855, shall be revoked, and the same are hereby revoked accordingly.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Secretary of State for India, in Council, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that due facilities will be given for recovering and apprehending seamen who desert from British merchant ships in the territories of the Republic of Salvador, Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in her by the said "Foreign Deserters' Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen not being slaves who, within Her Majesty's dominions, desert from merchant ships belonging to citizens of the Republic of Salvador, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships.

Provided always, that if any such deserter has committed any crime in Her Majesty's dominions, he may be detained until he has been tried by a competent Court, and until his sentence (if any) has been fully carried into effect.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Secretary of State for India in Council, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by the 57th section of the "Harbours and Passing Tolls, etc., Act, 1861," it is enacted that the trustees of Whitby Harbour may, for the purpose of maintaining and improving the harbour, with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, impose rates on vessels using the harbour, and on goods shipped or unshipped, in the harbour not exceeding the rates specified in schedule A annexed to the "Burgh Harbours (Scotland) Act, 1853," and may from time to time, with the like consent, vary such rates by reducing or raising the same, so that they do not exceed the rates mentioned in the said schedule, and that any rates so imposed may be either in lieu of, or in addition to, any other rates leviable by the said trustees. And whereas the trustees of Whitby Harbour have prepared and submitted for approval a table of rates, as the rates to be levied by them from the date of this Order, in substitution for the table of rates authorized to be levied by an Order in Council, dated the 6th January, 1862; And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said rates do not exceed the rates specified in Schedule A of the "Burgh Harbours (Scotland) Act, 1853," and that the same are proper and reasonable; Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve, and doth hereby approve and signify her consent to the said schedule of rates submitted, as aforesaid, by the trustees of Whitby Harbour, a copy of which is subjoined.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-third day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, in the words following; that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew, situate in the parish or parochial chapelry of Romford, in the county of Essex, and in the diocese of Rochester.

“Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew, situate in the parish or parochial chapelry of Romford aforesaid.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish or parochial chapelry of Romford, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Romford.’

“And, with the like consent of the said Joseph Cotton, Bishop of Rochester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the solemnization or performance of the offices aforesaid, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

“We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration; and to make such order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Romford, being :—

“All that part of the parish or parochial chapelry of Romford, in the county of Essex, and in the diocese of Rochester, which is situate to the south of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary dividing the said parish or parochial chapelry from the parish of Dagenham, in the same county and diocese, at a point on the eastern

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of another Act passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the thirteenth and fourteenth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter ninety four, have prepared and now humbly lay

before your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for augmenting the income of the Archdeaconry of Chester, in the Diocese of Chester.

"Whereas it was, by the said first recited Act, enacted that so soon as conveniently might be and by the authority therein provided (that is to say) by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying the same, any archdeaconry might, subject to the consent of the bishop, be endowed, amongst other modes, by augmentation out of the common fund in the same Act mentioned, but not so as to raise the average annual income thereof to an amount exceeding two hundred pounds, with a proviso that no archdeacon should be entitled to hold any endowment or augmentation or other emolument, as such archdeacon, under the provisions of the same Act, unless resident for the space of eight months in every year within the diocese in which his archdeaconry should be situate, but subject to the same provisions as to licenses for non-residence, which are enacted with respect to incumbents of benefices by the Act relating to pluralities and residence in the same Act mentioned; and it is, by the said first recited Act, further enacted that upon the endowment of an archdeaconry being made under the provisions thereof, all lands, tithes, and other hereditaments (except any right of patronage) belonging to such archdeaconry at the time of such endowment may, with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, and of any archdeacon in possession at the passing of the same Act, and by the authority therein provided be vested in us for the purposes of the same Act.

"And whereas, by the secondly recited Act, it is declared and enacted that in the case of any archdeaconry which shall no longer be held by the archdeacon who was, at the passing of the said first recited Act, in possession thereof, the provisions of the same Act, which relate to the transfer to us of the estates of any Archdeaconry upon its endowment in either of the modes therein provided, shall be construed and held to authorise such transfer with the consent of the bishop of the diocese and of the archdeacon in possession of the archdeaconry at the time.

"And whereas by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twenty-third day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, and duly gazetted in the London Gazette, of the twenty-eighth day of the same month, it was provided that an annual sum of one hundred pounds should be paid by us to the Archdeacon of Chester for the time being.

"And whereas the said archdeaconry is endowed with, inter alia, a pension or annual sum of fifty pounds charged upon the estates of the Bishoprick of Chester.

"And whereas the amount of the said grant of one hundred pounds per annum was fixed on the assumption that the average annual income of the said archdeaconry arising from other sources, inclusive of the pension above referred to, amounted as nearly as might be to the sum of one hundred pounds, and it has been made to appear to us that on an average of three years the annual income of the said archdeaconry, inclusive of the grant and the pension above mentioned, does not exceed one hundred and eighty-eight pounds.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend John Bishop of Chester, and of the Venerable Isaac Wood, the present archdeacon of the said archdeaconry of Chester, testified by their having respectively signed and sealed this scheme, that, in addition to the sum of one hundred pounds in the said recited Order mentioned, there shall be paid by us out of the said common fund to the said

Isaac Wood, and to his successors in the said archdeaconry, so long as he and they shall respectively hold the same, and shall duly reside in accordance with the provisions of the said first recited Act, or shall produce to us a license of non-residence, the further annual sum of sixty-two pounds on the first day of January in every year, so as to make up the average income of the archdeaconry, exclusive of the pension above referred to, to two hundred pounds per annum, as contemplated by the said Act, and that the first such increased annual payment of one hundred and sixty-two pounds shall be made on the first day of January next; and that the pension or annual sum of fifty pounds hereinbefore mentioned as being charged upon the bishopric of Chester and forming part of the endowment of the said archdeaconry of Chester, shall be disannexed therefrom and become and be absolutely transferred to and vested in us, and that we shall be entitled to the proceeds thereof as from and after the first day of January now last past.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the said archdeaconry, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."
