ORDER REGULATING THE USE OF LOCOMOTIVES IN THE DIVISION OF SALISBURY AND AMESBURY, IN THE COUNTY OF WILTS.

WHEREAS it appears to me, the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the use of Locomotives, unless restricted as hereinafter mentioned, on the Highways within the several Parishes comprised in the Division of Salisbury and Amesbury, in the county of Wilts, is dangerous and inconvenient to the public.

I do, hereby, by virtue of the provisions of "The Locomotive Act, 1861," by this Order, under my hand, prohibit the use of any kind of Locomotive whatever, propelled by steam, or any other than animal power, on the highways within the several parishes comprised in the above-named Division, except between the hours of nine at night and seven in the morning.
