

*To the Commissioners for the Conservancy of the River Mersey; to the Acting Conservator, for the time being, of the said River; and to the Clerks of the Peace of the Counties Palatine of Lancaster and Chester, and the Borough of Liverpool respectively.*

I, JOHN HUTCHINSON, of Appleton Lodge, in Tamworth, in the parish of Prescott, and said county palatine of Lancaster, Manufacturing Chemist, do hereby give notice to you respectively of my intention, and that I do intend and propose to make, construct, and erect excavations, basins, docks, piers, quays, wharves, breastworks and embankments, in and adjoining the River Mersey, running from Warrington to the sea, as herein-after stated or mentioned—that the place where such work is intended to be made is on the Lancashire or northerly side of the said River Mersey, immediately below Runcom Gap; that the line, situation, nature, extent, and object of such work and the materials of which the same are proposed to be constructed are as follows, that is to say:— It is proposed and intended to make an embankment to be constructed of earth, soil, stone, gravel, sand, slag, clinkers, and other refuse, materials, and of a greater elevation throughout than the highwater mark of a tide, uninfluenced by the wind, of the height of twenty-one feet, as measured from the sill of the gates of the old dock, in Liverpool, in the said county of Lancaster, and such embankment will commence at or near the point where the Aston and Ditton branch of the London and North Western Railway intersects Steward's Brook, in Widnes, in the county of Lancaster; and extending from thence within and upon my own land along the easterly, southerly, south-easterly, and south-westerly bank of the said Steward's Brook, to or near to the point where the said Steward's Brook joins Ditton Brook, in the township of Ditton, and county of Lancaster; and from thence along the easterly bank of Ditton's Brook aforesaid, to the foreshore of the River Mersey, and in a southerly direction along such Foreshore to the distance of seventy-seven yards or thereabouts from the grass or marsh land of Ditton Marsh; and from thence in an easterly direction and in a slightly curved line along the foreshore, at a distance from the grass or marshland, varying from sixty-seven to one hundred and thirty-eight yards, to land in Widnes aforesaid, belonging to William Wright, Esq., and Mary his wife, or one of them, or their, or one of their trustees; and from thence in a northerly direction, for a distance of about one hundred and seventy yards, to a point on the easterly boundary of my land.

It is also proposed and intended within, and on the line of the said southerly embankment, and near the easterly end of such embankment, to make large and extensive excavations, and thereby and therein to form docks, basins, locks, and other works, having communication with the River Mersey, with convenient piers, quays, wharves, gates, Cranes, tips, staiths, and other suitable conveniences for facilitating the management, conducting and carrying on of such works, and of the trade thereof, and that such last-mentioned works are proposed to be constructed of stones, bricks, flags, earth, slag, timber, iron, ballast, refuse, and other suitable materials. That the objects of the proposed works are:—

To construct docks and afford largely increased accommodation and facility for the trade of the River Mersey, in connection with other means of transit; and

To improve the scour of the navigable part of the River Mersey, opposite and near to the proposed works.

And that I intend, immediately after the expiration of two calendar months from the sending or delivery of this notice to you respectively, to commence such of the said works respectively as I am not, under or by virtue of any notice heretofore given, or of any sanction heretofore obtained, already authorised or empowered to construct.

For the better understanding of the line and situation of the proposed embankment, I beg to refer you to the ground plan which accompanies this notice, wherein the line of such embankment is shown by a red line.
