To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Bailiffs, and Common-Council, of Your Majesties Ancient and Loyal Borough of *LANCASTER*.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, being highly sensible of the great Happiness we and all other Your Majesties Subjects do most amply Enjoy, under the Influence of Your most Gracious Government, do render unto Your Sacred Majesty (as in all Duty and Gratitude obliged) our most sincere and thankful Acknowledgments for Your Majesties late most Gracious Declaration; and particularly for Your repeated Assurances therein, to preserve us in our Liberties, Properties, and Established Religion: For which, and all other Your Princely Favours, we do unanimously assure Your Majesty, whensoever Your Honour or Safety shall require, That then our Lives, Fortunes, and Estates, shall be most readily and freely devoted to Your Majesties Service: In the mean time, we shall ever be praying to Almighty God to preserve Your Majesty in a long, happy, and prosperous Reign over us.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, the Grand Jury, and the Justices of Peace; with the rest of the Gentry assembled at the Assizes held at *LANCASTER* the 11th day of *August*, One thousand six hundred eighty and seven, for Your Majesties County Palatine of *LANCASTER*.

Great SIR,

WITH Joy we behold Peace ushered into Your Kingdoms by You, as it was to the World by God, when he was made Man: To Men of good Will, with the Angels we glorify God, and thank You for this great Blessing Your Royal Declaration of Indulgence hath established this in all Your well minded Subjects; and none but the Envious, and such as forget to do as they would be done by, can mutter or repine at it: The Storms are ceased, and we venerate that Power that Commands the Winds and the Waves. The cause of this great Happiness imboldens us to the Expression of our Zeal and Duty to and for Your Sacred Majesty; and to make an humble Offering of our Lives and Fortunes in Your Majesties Service and Defence: These we heartily and sincerely prostrate at Your Majesties feet; and we promise all our Concurrences to render all Your Inclinations easy: And hope all Your Dutiful Subjects will unanimously join with us in this, and also in daily Prayers and Wishes for Your continued Health and long Reign over them and Your Dutiful Subscribing Subjects.

Allicant, From on Board the *Swan* Frigate Captain Frederick Frowde Commander, July 31. We come now from the Coast of *Algiers*, where we arrived the 22th Instant; Mr. *Earlsman* the Consul came on Board, acquainting us, that there were several of His Majesties Subjects brought in thither, whom that Government, in pursuance of the Articles they were under with His Majesty, found themselves obliged to set at Liberty: And accordingly they were sent on Board this Ship and the *Mermaid*, the 24th Instant, whose Names are as followeth.

William Hodges, Boatswain of the *Two Lyons*; *Henry Curtis*, *Abraham Vanderhull*, *Paul Bryan*, *Daniel Dalrymple*, *Thomas Cox*, *John Brampton*, *Jonas Hogg*, *Mary Loveland*, *Ann Van Hattam*, and *Audry* her Daughter, *Ann Neale*, *Elizabeth Cooke*, *Mary Smalles*, and *Henry Vandeuws* her Son, *Dorothy Vander Ist*, with *Abraham* and *Hannah* her Children, *Elizabeth Reeves*, and *Ann* her Daughter, *Elizabeth James*, and *Edward* her Son, *Isisua*

Green, *John Duran*, *Richard Banke*, *Andew Spencer*, *Roger Williams*, and *John Curromy*: The first was taken out of a Dutch Pink in the Channel; and the two last were Passengers on a French Ship coming from *Andria*, and brought in here as prize. It is not to be expressed with what thankfulness to His Majesty these poor People owned their deliverance; and we are taking the first opportunity of sending them into *England*, which we hope to find either here or at *Malaga*: There remains yet at *Algiers* *Mrs. Awn* and her Daughter, with a black Boy born in *Barbadoes*; these have been likewise demanded by the Consul, Captain *Gifford* the Commander of the *Mermaid*, and my Self: And they were not otherwise denied, than that the Baisa told us, that these having been brought in whilst the Governor was upon the place, who is since gone to *Oran*, without having left any Orders concerning them, he could not take upon him to give them their Liberty without his pivity; but as soon as he returned, he would not fail to acquaint him with our Demand; and besides, that he would employ his endeavours that it might have its full effect.

On Board the *Anne* in the River of *Lisbon*, August 1: We arrived here Yesterday in the Afternoon in 8 days from *Plimouth*, and came to an Anchor before the Palace: The King came immediately on Board, and carried the Queen on Shoar; they went directly to their Chappel, where having received the Benediction, the Marriage was consummated the same Night: The whole Town being illuminated; besides which, there were extraordinary Fire-works prepared; and all other Demonstrations given of a publick Joy, which are in use in these Countries upon the like Solemn Occasions.

Hague, September 7. This day the Envoy from *Moscow* had his Audience of Leave of the States; at which he took an occasion to excuse any Roughness they might have observed in his Behaviour during his stay here, hoping they would make Allowances for the Actions of one bred up under Customs and Manners differing from their own. The States are preparing to send a Congratulatory Compliment to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, upon the Notice he has given them of a Marriage between the Princess his Daughter, and the Prince of *Mecklenburg*. And it is said, that the *Sieur Sas*, Secretary to the Admiralty of *Rotterdam*, will be sent by the said Elector as his Envoy into *Spain*.

Amsterdam, September 8. We have advice that one of our Ships, the *St. Peter*, belonging to the *West-India* Company, having 50 Men on Board, and 20 pieces of Cannon; met off of *Cape finis Terre*, in the Latitude of 44, with *Canary* the great Algerine Commander, with whom they engaged, and in the heat of the Fight, the Dutch Ship, by what accident it is not known, took fire, and the Men being too much employed in their defence against their Enemy, to attend the quenching it, the flame grew at last masterless; whereupon the Ship's Company fearing to be blown up with the Vessel, which happened soon after, they all leaped over Board; and there were ten of them only taken up alive, by one of whom we have these particulars from *Algiers*: For whence also we hear, that *Muly Ismael*, Emperour of *Morocco* threatens them with a War, grounding it upon the courage and Liberty they give to the *Sallee* Pirates, who carry in their Prizes, and sell them there, who were defrauded of the share he pretends a part of the same.

Paris, Septemb. 10. The Marquis de Lavardin parted from hence yesterday, in order to proceed on his Embassy to Rome. They write from Rome, that the Queen of Sweden was once inclined to have shewn some Repentments of that which she thought a violation of her Privileges, in seizing two of her Domestiques by the ordinary Officers of Justice, within the precincts of her Palace; but that she had since thought it more adviseable to avoid any open Contest with his Holiness in this matter; but was disposing her self to seek her Satisfaction in easier and softer ways. The particulars as we hear them of the late Battle turn all to the advantage of the Elector of Bavaria; We are told, that in the Visier's Tent there were found 4 Persons strangled with Chains on their Feet; there has been no Body yet that could give an account who they were; but it was guessed only by their Hair that they were Christians. Here runs an uncertain report of some new advantage the Imperialists have had over the Infidels; and that the Count Lobkowitz the Emperor's Envoy, went yesterday to *Marseilles* to acquaint the King with it; but it must have a further Confirmation to gain Credit.

Banbury, Septemb. 3. Yesterday about Eleven in the morning His Majesty left *Covenry*, having been pleased to accept of an Entertainment from the Corporation in the Town-Hall; and being attended to the Bounds of the City, and the Limits of the County, in the same manner he had been received. At the Entrance into *Oxfordshire*, His Majesty was met by the Earl of *Abingdon*, Lord Lieutenant of the County, with the High Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, and the rest of the Gentlemen of the same; who conducted His Majesty to this place, where He was received with all the Joy and Duty that we knew any way how to express: His Majesty on His way hither went to see *Edge-Hill*, that Field of approach to the English Nation; where the late unnatural Contention first displayed it self in Armies, not only of Brother against Brother, but what was yet worse, of Subjects against their Prince.

Oxford, Septemb. 5. On Saturday last His Majesty having been attended through the County by the Lord Lieutenant and Gentry of the same; and Dining that day at the Earl of *Archieb's*, at *Woodstock-Park* (where was a Noble Entertainment provided;) arrived here about 5 in the Evening, having been met on the way by the Vice-Chancellor of this University, accompanied by 24 Doctors of the several Faculties, the two Proctors, and 19 Masters of Arts; all appointed in Convocation to attend His Majesty in their Habits prescribed, and in that manner as was thought the most expressive of the highest Respect: The Mayor and Aldermen of this City richly habited in their Formalities (the High Steward, the Earl of *Abingdon*, appearing with them) waited at the utmost Bounds of their Liberty for His Majesty; who (the usual Ceremonies being performed, and the accustomed Presents made) was thus conducted through Ranks of Scholars placed in order from the West-Gate to *Christ-Church*; where the Kings of *England*, since the building of that Colledge, have been pleased constantly to lodge as often as they have Honoured this University and City with their Presence: Within the Gates of it, His Majesty was received by the Dean, Canons, Students, and other Members of that Royal Foundation, ranked in order: An universal Joy discovering it self in all parts of this City upon this Grateful Occasion, and in all the ways it was possible to be declared. The next day the Vice-Chancellor waited upon His Majesty with the usual Presents of the University; and this day His Majesty, attended with all the Nobility and Gentry, was pleased to visit the publick Library, and to accept of the Entertainment of a Banquet in *Selden's Library*. His Majesty, as might be expected from a Learned Body, was Congratulated here in several Elegant Speeches, all pronounced on their Knees; by the Vice-Chancellor at their first appearance before Him, by the Dean of *Christ-Church* when He entered the

Colledge, by the Orator at making their Presents, and by the Senior Proctor at the Schools; and their whole behaviour was such as became those that have always been the Patterns of, as well as Persuaders to Loyalty.

Whereas His Majesty has been informed by the Merchants Owners of the Diamonds robb'd out of the *Holland Mail* on the 25th of June last past, between *Colchester* and *Harwich*, That two of the Persons concerned in the said Robbery have lately been discovered and apprehended at *Paris*, with whom there was taken part of the Diamonds: And the said Merchants having humbly besought His Majesty that (inasmuch as the greatest part of the Diamonds are yet missing) His Majesty would be Graciously pleased to renew His Promise of a Pardon to the rest of the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, Provided, and in Case, they Restore their Share of the said Diamonds within Thirty days: His Majesty has been pleased to Grant the said Merchants Request, and does accordingly hereby Declare and Promise, that in case either or all the rest of the Persons that have been concerned in the Robbery above-mentioned, do within the space of Thirty days from the date hereof, Return to the Owners that part of the Diamonds which he or they had for their Shares, His Majesty will Grant unto the Person or Persons so restoring his or their Share of the said Diamonds, His Gracious Pardon for the said Robbery, as also for Robbing the Coaches at the same time, besides a Reward of Ten per Cent. of the value of the Diamonds that shall be restored, which the Merchants will pay upon the Delivery thereof.

One of the Persons who committed the Robbery on the King's Mail going for *Holland* on the 25th of June last, and took thence the Diamonds, is taken and in Prison beyond Seas; he declares, that one *NATH. MAHEW*, and one *THO. HERDON* were principal Actors with him in the said Robbery. *NATH. MAHEW* is a Man of an indifferent Stature, well sett, broad Shoulders'd, dark brown Hair, and blackish Eye-brows, a ruddy Complexion almost like a flushing, with Pock-holes in his Face, long Visaged, with a Roman Nose rising much in the middle, and about 35 years of Age; went away with his Wife (who is a tall well-shap'd Woman, of a fresh Complexion, light brown Hair, and grey Eyed) on Sunday morning the 21th of August, 1687. from *Sarfen* in *Suffolk*, both on a darkish brown Horse, about 14 hands high, with a white Star in his Forehead, and a white Foot behind. *THO. HERDON* is a middle sized Man, well sett, with Pock-holes in his Face, somewhat swarthy and full faced, his Hair inclining to red, grey eyed, and speaks broad like a North-Country-Man. Whoever shall apprehend either the said *NATH. MAHEW*, or *THO. HERDON*, so as they be delivered into the hands of Justice, they shall receive immediately One hundred pound for each, or either of them, from the hands of Mr. Will. Arwell, and Mr. Adrian Courteney, Goldsmiths in Exchange-Alley in London; and Twenty pounds for the securing of *NATH. MAHEW's* Wife; and if the Diamonds be recovered, they shall have the Reward of Ten per Cent. promised in the Gazette besides.
