Alicant, From on Board the Swan Frigat Captain Fre-rick Frowde Commander, July 31. We come now derick Frowde Commander, July 31. from the Goalt of Algiers, where we arrived the 22th Instant; Mr. Earlsman the Consul came on Board, acquainting us, that there were several of His Majesties Subjects brought in thither, whom that Government, in pursuance of the Articles they were under with His Majesty, found themselves obliged to set at Liberty: And accordingly they were sent on Board this Ship and the Mermaid, the 24th Instant, whose Names are as followeth.

Hogue, Septemb. 7. This day the Envoy from Miscowy had his Audience of Leave of the States; at which he took an occasion to excuse any Roughness they might have observed in his Behaviour during his stay here, hoping they would make Allowances for the Actions of one bred up under Customs and Manners differing from their own. The States are preparing to send a Congratulatory Compliment to the Elector of Brandenb 1gth, upon the Notice he has given them of a Mai riage between the Princess his Daughter, and the Prince of Mecklenboing. And it is said, that the Sieur Sas, Secretary to the Admiralty of Rotterdam, will be fent by the faid Elector as his Envoy into Spain.

Amsterdam, Septemb. 8. We have advice that one of our Ships, the St. Peter, belonging to the W. t-India Company, having 50 Men on Board, and 20 pieces of Cannon; met off of Cape finis Terræ, in the Latitude of 44, with Canary the great Algierine Commander, with whom they engaged, and in the heat of the Fight, the Dutch Ship, by what accident it is not known, took fire, and the Men being too much employed in their desence against their Enemy, to attend the quenching it, the slame grew at last masterless; whereupon the Ship's Company fearing to be blown up with the Vessel, which hapned foon after, they all leaped over Board; and there were ten of them only taken up alive, by one of whom we have these particulars from Algiers: Fut 1 lence also we hear, that Muly Islamdel, Empero of Ma ago threatens them with a War, grounding it u, p the Brown in their Prizes and sell them there was defrauded of the share he pretends a plant of the state of the stat

Paris, Septemb. 10. The Marquis de Lavardin parted from hence yesterday, in order to proceed on his Embally to Rome. They write from Rome, that the Queen of Sueden was once inclined to have shewn some Resentments of that which she thought a violation of her Priviledges, in feizing two of her Domestiques by the ordinanary Officers of Justice, within the precincts of her Pa-lace; but that she had since thought it more adviseable to avoid any open Contest with his Holiness in this matter; but was disposing her felf to feek her Satisfaction in easier and softer ways. The particulars as we hear them of the late Battle turn all to the advantage of the Elector of Bavaria: We are told, that in the Visier's Tent there were found 4 Persons strangled with Chains on their Feet; there has been no Body yet that could give an account who they were; but it was guessed only by their Hair that they were Christians. Here runs an uncertain report of some new advantage the Imperialists have had over the Infidels; and that the Count Lobko-witz the Emperor's Envoy, went yesterday to Marseilles to acquaint the King with it; but it must have a further Confirmation to gain Credit.

Banbury, Septemb. 3. Yesterday about Eleven in the morning His Majesty lest Covenity, having been pleased to accept of an Entertainment from the Corporation in the Town-Hall; and being attended to the Bounds of the City, and the Limits of the County, in the same manner he had been received. At the Entrance into Oxfordshire, His Majesty was met by the Earl of Abingdon, Lord Lieutenant of the County, with the High Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, and the rest of the Gentlemen of the same; who conducted His Majesty to this place, where He was received with all the Joy and Duty that we knew any way how to express: His Majesty on His way hither went to see Edge-Hill, that Field of reproach to the English Nation; where the late unnatural Contention first displayed it self in Armies, not only of Brother against Brother, but what was

yet worse, of Subjects against their Prince.
Oxford, Septemb. 5. On Saturday 1ast His Majesty having been attended through the County by the Lord Lieutenant and Gentry of the same; and Dining that day at the Earl of it hie d's, at Woodstock-Park (where was a Noble Entertainment provided;) arrived here about 5 in the Evening, having been met on the way by the Vice-Chancellor of this University, accompanied by 24 Doctors of the several Faculties, the two Proctors, and 19 Masters of Arts; all appointed in Convocation to attend His Majesty in their Habits prescribed, and in that manner as was thought the most expressive of the highest Respect: The Mayor and Aldermen of this City richly habited in their Formalities (the High Steward, the Earl of Abingdon, appearing with them) waited at the utmost Bounds of their Liberty for His Majesty; who (the usual Ceremonies being performed, and the accustomed Presents made) was thus conducted through Ranks of Scholars placed in order from the West-Gate to Christ-Church; where the Kings of England, since the building of that Colledge, have been pleased constantly to lodge as often as they have Honoured this University and City with their Presence: Within the Gates of it, His Majesty was received by the Dean, Canons, Students, and other Members of fence: Within the Gates of it, His Majesty was received by the Dean, Canons, Students, and other Members of that Royal Foundation, ranked in order: An universal Joy discovering it self in all parts of this City upon this Grateful Occasion, and in all the ways it was possible to be declared. The next day the Vice-Chancellor waited upon His Majesty with the usual Presents of the University; and this day His Majesty, attended with all the Nobility and Gentry, was pleased to visit the publick Library, and to accept of the Entertainment of a Banquet in Selden's Library. His Majesty, as might be expected from a Learned Body', was Congratulated here in several Elegant Speeches, all pronounced on their Knees; by the Vice-Chancellor at their first appearance before Him, by the Dean of Christ-Church when He entred the

Colledge, by the Orator at making their Presents, and by the Senior Pro Ctor at the Schools; and their whole behaviour was fuch as became those that have always been the Patterns of, as well as Persuaders to Loyalty.
