THE following Addressees have been Presented to the King, which His Majesty received very Graciously.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Bailiffs, and Common-Council, of Your Majesties Ancient and Loyal Borough of *LANCASTER*.

WE Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, being highly sensible of the great Happiness we and all other Your Majesties Subjects do most amply Enjoy, under the Influence of Your most Gracious Government, do render unto Your Sacred Majesty (as in all Duty and Gratitude obliged) our most sincere and thankful Acknowledgments for Your Majesties late most Gracious Declaration; and particularly for Your repeated Assurances therein, to preserve us in our Liberties, Properties, and Established Religion: For which, and all other Your Princely Favours, we do unanimously assure Your Majesty, whensoever Your Honour or Safety shall require, That then our Lives, Fortunes, and Estates, shall be most readily and freely devoted to Your Majesties Service: In the mean time, we shall ever be praying to Almighty God to preserve Your Majesty in a long, happy, and prosperous Reign over us.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the High Sheriff, the Grand Jury, and the Justices of Peace; with the rest of the Gentry assembled at the Assizes held at *LANCASTER* the 11th day of *August*, One thousand six hundred eighty and seven, for Your Majesties County Palatine of *LANCASTER*.

Great SIR,

WITH Joy we behold Peace ushered into Your Kingdoms by You, as it was to the World by God, when he was made Man: To Men of good Will, with the Angels we glorify God, and thank You for this great Blessing Your Royal Declaration of Indulgence hath established this in all Your well minded Subjects; and none but the Envious, and such as forget to do as they would be done by, can mutter or repine at it: The Storms are ceased, and we venerate that Power that Commands the Winds and the Waves. The cause of this great Happiness imboldens us to the Expression of our Zeal and Duty to and for Your Sacred Majesty; and to make an humble Offering of our Lives and Fortunes in Your Majesties Service and Defence: These we heartily and sincerely prostrate at Your Majesties feet; and we promise all our Concurrences to render all Your Inclinations easy: And hope all Your Dutiful Subjects will unanimously join with us in this, and also in daily Prayers and Wishes for Your continued Health and long Reign over them and Your Dutiful Subscribing Subjects.

Allicant, From on Board the *Swan* Frigate Captain Frederick Frowde Commander, July 31. We come now from the Coast of *Algiers*, where we arrived the 22th Instant; Mr. *Earlsman* the Consul came on Board, acquainting us; that there were several of His Majesties Subjects brought in thither, whom that Government, in pursuance of the Articles they were under with His Majesty, found themselves obliged to set at Liberty: And accordingly they were sent on Board this Ship and the *Mermaid*, the 24th Instant, whose Names are as followeth.

William Hodges, Boatswain of the *Two Lyons*; *Henry Curtis*, *Abraham Vanderhull*, *Paul Bryan*, *Daniel Dalrymple*, *Thomas Cox*, *John Brampton*, *Jonas Hogg*, *Mary Loveland*, *Ann Van Hattam*, and *Audry* her Daughter, *Ann Neale*, *Elizabeth Cooke*, *Mary Smalles*, and *Henry Vandeuws* her Son, *Dorothy Vander Ist*, with *Abraham* and *Hannah* her Children, *Elizabeth Reeves*, and *Ann* her Daughter, *Elizabeth James*, and *Edward* her Son, *Isisua*

Green, *John Duren*, *Richard Banke*, *Andew Spencer*, *Roger Williams*, and *John Curromy*: The first was taken out of a Dutch Pink in the Channel; and the two last were Passengers on a French Ship coming from *Andria*, and brought in here as prize. It is not to be expressed with what thankfulness to His Majesty these poor People owned their deliverance; and we are taking the first opportunity of sending them into *England*, which we hope to find either here or at *Malaga*: There remains yet at *Algiers* *Mrs. Awn* and her Daughter, with a black Boy born in *Barbadoes*; these have been likewise demanded by the Consul, Captain *Gifford* the Commander of the *Mermaid*, and my Self: And they were not otherwise denied, than that the Baisa told us, that these having been brought in whilst the Governor was upon the place, who is since gone to *Oran*, without having left any Orders concerning them, he could not take upon him to give them their Liberty without his pivity; but as soon as he returned, he would not fail to acquaint him with our Demand; and besides, that he would employ his endeavours that it might have its full effect.

On Board the *Anne* in the River of *Lisbon*, August 1: We arrived here Yesterday in the Afternoon in 8 days from *Plimouth*, and came to an Anchor before the Palace: The King came immediately on Board, and carried the Queen on Shoar; they went directly to their Chappel, where having received the Benediction, the Marriage was consummated the same Night: The whole Town being illuminated; besides which, there were extraordinary Fire-works prepared; and all other Demonstrations given of a publick Joy, which are in use in these Countries upon the like Solemn Occasions.

Hague, September 7. This day the Envoy from *Moscow* had his Audience of Leave of the States; at which he took an occasion to excuse any Roughness they might have observed in his Behaviour during his stay here, hoping they would make Allowances for the Actions of one bred up under Customs and Manners differing from their own. The States are preparing to send a Congratulatory Compliment to the Elector of *Brandenburg*, upon the Notice he has given them of a Marriage between the Princess his Daughter, and the Prince of *Mecklenburg*. And it is said, that the *Sieur Sas*, Secretary to the Admiralty of *Rotterdam*, will be sent by the said Elector as his Envoy into *Spain*.

Amsterdam, September 8. We have advice that one of our Ships, the *St. Peter*, belonging to the *West-India* Company, having 50 Men on Board, and 20 pieces of Cannon; met off of *Cape finis Terre*, in the Latitude of 44, with *Canary* the great Algerine Commander, with whom they engaged, and in the heat of the Fight, the Dutch Ship, by what accident it is not known, took fire, and the Men being too much employed in their defence against their Enemy, to attend the quenching it, the flame grew at last masterless; whereupon the Ship's Company fearing to be blown up with the Vessel, which happened soon after, they all leaped over Board; and there were ten of them only taken up alive, by one of whom we have these particulars from *Algiers*: For whence also we hear, that *Muly Ismael*, Emperour of *Morocco* threatens them with a War, grounding it upon the courage and Liberty they give to the *Sallee* Pirates, who carry in their Prizes, and sell them there, who was defrauded of the share he pretends a part of the same.
