**ORDER REGULATING THE USE OF LOCOMOTIVES
WITHIN THE PETTY SESSIONAL DIVISION OF
CARNARVON, IN THE COUNTY OF CARNARVON.**

WHEREAS it appears to me, the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the use of Locomotives, unless restricted as hereinafter mentioned, on any of the Turnpike Roads or Highways within the Petty Sessional Division of Carnarvon, in the county of Carnarvon, is dangerous and inconvenient to the public.

I do, hereby, by virtue of the provisions of "The Locomotive Act, 1861," by this Order, under my hand, prohibit the use of any kind of Locomotive whatever, propelled by steam, or any other than animal power, on any of the turnpike roads or highways within the said Division, except between the hours of nine at night and seven in the morning.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Notification issued by the Turkish Government respecting the importation of goods into Turkey, and of which the following is a translation :

OFFICIAL NOTIFICATION.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION OF INDIRECT TAXES.

Conformably to the stipulations of the Treaty of Commerce between the Sublime Porte and friendly Powers, by which the Government of His Imperial Majesty reserves his right to establish, by special provision, the measures to be adopted to prevent fraud, the general administration of the Customs of the Empire, with the double object of preserving the interests of the Exchequer, and of giving more security and guaranty to the operations of bona fide commerce, hereby notifies that the following regulations will be put in force throughout the Empire from the date of this notification :—

ART. I. Upon the arrival of any ship, whether a sailing-vessel or a steamer, in a Turkish port, the agent of the company, the master of the vessel, or his substitute, is required, before unloading any cargo, to remit to the Customs' authorities two copies of his manifest, signed and certified by him, and which must be counterpart of the original. The copies of the manifest which bear the marks, numbers, and quantity of packages, should comprise all the articles of the cargo destined to be unloaded at the port of arrival.

The original manifest should be presented at the same time as the two copies, and the Customs' authorities will have the right of comparing, immediately, the two copies with the original, which will remain in the possession of the presenter.

The Customs' authorities will name an officer who will note with the master, the agent of the Company, the consignee or their substitute, on both copies of the manifest, the packages taken on shore.

The discharge effected and the operations declared in form, one of the copies of the manifest, countersigned by the Customs' authorities, will be remitted to the master, agent of the Company, consignee, or other substitute, the other will be preserved with the Customs' records.

Should the packages discharged be fewer in number than is designated on the manifest for the port of destination, four events may arise :

1. That the package has not been disembarked ; or,
2. That it has been landed elsewhere than at its proper destination.

In either of the above cases, the master, the agent of the Company, or his substitute, will be required within a given time, to prove such to be the case.

3. Should the package be lost and claimed by the shipper or the person for whom it is destined, the master, agent of the Company, or their substitute, will be required to prove within a given period that he has repaid the value of such package.

The Customs' authorities will be unable to make any claim if the proofs mentioned in the above paragraphs, 1, 2, and 3, have been produced.

4. In the event of the package being lost, and not claimed, the master, agent of the Company,

or his substitute, must pay the Customs duty according to the value specified in the manifest. If the value should not be known, he will be required to pay to the Customs' authorities, as a fine, twice the amount of the freight paid or assigned.

The period allowed in order to produce the above-mentioned proofs, as well as those of damages, will be six months for all ports, without distinction.

If the required proofs cannot be furnished within forty-eight hours after the discharge, the agents of the steam-packet companies may give a written declaration engaging themselves to produce the necessary proofs within six months. In the case of sailing-vessels or steamers which have no permanent representative, the master must, before leaving the port, deposit with the customs the amount of dues or of fines which he would have to pay if he failed within six months to produce the above proofs, or else to give a satisfactory guarantee to the Customs for the payment of the said duties or fines.

No merchandize will be allowed to be landed on the Custom House Quays without permission of the Customs' authorities.

This permission will be accorded immediately upon the presentation of the two copies of the manifest.

As it frequently happens that it is indispensable to sailing-vessels having another destination, and to steamers which perform a regular service, to commence unloading their cargoes without delay, the Customs' authorities will permit their discharge into lighters during the process required for the formalities of presenting the two copies of the manifest. Nevertheless such merchandize cannot be landed until the master or the consignee has observed the regulations on this point, and has obtained the above-mentioned permission. The Customs' authorities will appoint a place for the purpose of inspecting the baggage, &c., of travellers, and from which no one will be exempted. Such articles as bear evidence of service as well as new linen, clothes, boots, and shoes, and such like articles, and objects which the Customs regard as intended for the personal use of travellers, will be exempt from Customs' duties.

ART. II. Merchandize of all kinds *in transitu* by land will be subjected to inspection.

Nevertheless, the Government, being anxious to afford to commerce every facility possible compatible with the safety of the interests of the Exchequer, has adopted, with regard to such merchandize, the following regulations :—

1st. The demand for a *Teskéret*, to enable merchandize to be carried *in transitu*, must be accompanied by a written declaration, signed by the merchant or his agent, stating the marks, numbers, quantities, and qualities of the said merchandize.

The Customs' authorities will verify at pleasure the contents of a package if the whole bulk is less than ten packages, and one of every ten packages if the bulk should be greater. The contents of the packages thus opened, and being found in conformity with the declaration, the duties on the whole will be regulated without further formality.

The same process will be observed for packages coming by land from foreign countries, and intended to continue their route immediately after the payment of the Custom-duties at the first Ottoman Custom-house.

The Customs' officers will be instructed to take the greatest care in opening packages, so that it may be easy to replace them in good condition.

If the contents of the packages should not accord in quantity or in quality with the above-mentioned declaration, the Customs' authorities, being unable to accept the declaration as precise, will have the right to open the whole of the remaining packages; and should the packages thus opened not be found in conformity with the declaration, they will be liable to the double transit or import duty, as the case may be.

The merchant or his agent will be required to restore to the Customs' administration within six months, or sooner if possible, the *Teskéret* obtained from that department to accompany the merchandize *in transitu* across the Ottoman territory.

This *Teskéret* should be countersigned by the last Custom-house, which should also certify that the said merchandize had arrived on foreign soil.

2nd. The transit *Teskéret* will be delivered on the entire payment of the transit duty fixed by the treaties, but the merchant will be required to furnish a security, satisfactory to the Customs' authorities, for the delivery, within six months, of the *Teskéret*, verifying the exportation of the merchandize from the Ottoman territory; in default of such proof being given within the prescribed time, the merchant or his security will be required to pay to the Customs, the surplus to complete the import duty. Nevertheless, should it be convenient to the merchant to deposit the amount of the import duty as a guarantee for the actual exportation of the goods from the Ottoman territory, the difference between the transit duty and the import duty will be restored to the Custom-house of departure, or to that through which the goods are exported, according to the agreement inscribed on the *Teskéret*.

If such agreement stipulates for repayment at the Custom-house of departure, the *Teskéret* proving the exportation of the merchandize should be taken to that Custom-house within the time above mentioned.

In the event of the loss, duly proved, of the transit *Teskéret*, countersigned at the last frontier Custom-house, that office will be required to deliver a certificate in substitution of the *Teskéret*, and in the case where it is proved that the goods have been totally lost by *force majeure*, the sum deposited as security for their actual exit from the territory will be repaid.

ART. III.—The stipulations of the Treaty of Commerce, with friendly powers providing that merchandize deposited on land for a limited time, in order to be placed on board the same vessel or other vessels to continue the voyage will pay no duty whatever, but must be deposited at Constantinople in the Custom's warehouse; and where in other places there is no entrepôt, under the surveillance of the Customs' authorities, the Government has ordered that such surveillance shall be effected in the following manner:—The merchant or his agent who has imported merchandize for a limited time into a Turkish seaport where there is no warehouse, shall be permitted to place such merchandize in a private warehouse fitted with double locks, the key of one of which shall be handed over to the Customs' authorities who shall have the right to place a seal on such warehouse should they deem fit. The length of time which merchandize shall be allowed to remain in private warehouses must not exceed one month, unless in proved cases of *force majeure*.

Such term elapsed, the Customs' authorities will levy a duty of 8 per cent., and the merchant must withdraw his merchandize, in default of which it will be liable in the Customs' transit warehouses, to *ardie* duty.

The difference between the import and transit duties will be returned conformably with the stipulations contained in the Treaty of Commerce if such merchandize is re-exported to a foreign country within six months from the day of arrival.

ART. IV. The General Customs' Administration has fixed the following hours for the inspection of merchandize:—

From the 1st April to the 30th September (12th October), inspection will take place from one hour and a half after sunrise, and terminate at one hour and a half before sunset.

From the 1st October to the 31st March (12th April), the inspection will commence one hour after sunrise and terminate one hour before sunset.

With reference to ports into which admission by night is accorded, the Customs' authorities will take steps to prevent embarrassment to navigation.

ART. V. The Treaty of Commerce providing that with regard to merchandize confiscated as contraband, a report of the case should be drawn up and communicated to the Consular authority of the foreigner to whom the goods belong, it has been decided as follows:—

Immediately after the seizure of the merchandize the director and the chief-accountant (*chef comptable*), together with two or three of the chief officers of the Customs, will form a commission, and after ascertaining the fact and interrogating such persons as may be thought fit, they will decide if there is a ground for confiscation, and will prepare a report.

This report should state the date of the seizure, the circumstances under which it was effected, the names, the condition, and the nationality of the seizers, of the witnesses, and of the defendant, the nature and the quantity of the merchandize, the proofs justifying the confiscation, and the defence made by the accused.

A copy of this report, signed by the Director of the Custom-house, will be sent within twenty-four hours after its preparation, to the Consul of the nation to which the accused belongs.

The Consul will acknowledge to the Customs the receipt thereof; unless opposition should be raised by the defendant, and communicated to the Customs within fifteen days, to reckon from the day of the delivery of the report, the confiscation will be definitive, and no appeal will be heard.

If, after the examination of the case by the Consular authority, the accused should consider it right to oppose, the written opposition shall be transmitted, if at Constantinople, to the Tribunal of Commerce, which must examine and rule as to the validity of the confiscation, or, if in provincial towns where no Tribunal of Commerce exists, to the Councils (*Medjiss*) of the locality.

The reports, drawn up by the Officers of the Government in commission, will be sworn to before the Councils (*Medjiss*).

The Tribunals of Commerce or Councils will examine only if the proofs specified in the reports are sufficient to justify the confiscation.

The defendants, the seizers, the witnesses for the prosecution or for the defence, will be heard.

If the judgment of the Tribunals of Commerce, or of the Councils, should declare the seizure invalid, the proprietor of the merchandize so seized, will, should he have suffered damage, have a right to an indemnity equal to the actual amount of the damage caused to him by reason of the seizure, it being incumbent on him to justify the whole before the said Tribunals or Councils under reserve of appeal.

If the judgment declares the objections groundless, the accused will be liable to a fine not exceeding 5 per cent. of the value of the merchandize seized.

The value of the merchandize or objects seized will be estimated for the liquidation of the damages or the fines incurred, to wit, the merchandize valued at tariff value, that which is admitted *ad valorem*, at the wholesale price at the place, with a deduction of 10 per cent.

The decisions of the Tribunal of Commerce at Constantinople are without appeal.

With regard to the decisions rendered in the provinces, either by the Tribunals of Commerce or by the Councils, the right will be reserved to the Customs and to the interested party to appeal before the Tribunal of Commerce at Constantinople, the decision of which will be definitive. Such appeal must be made without delay. In no case will the demand for appeal be received until the party concerned has deposited with the Customs the amount of the fine which shall have been inflicted, or else shall have furnished to the Customs a satisfactory guarantee for the payment of the fine.

In the case where a person, whose merchandize has been seized, wishes to contradict, *in toto*, the report, and to impugn individually or collectively the signature of such report, it will be referred to the Sublime Porte, and a criminal process will be instituted as is the custom when a similar complaint is brought against a Government functionary.

The Customs' administration will, previous to any judgment, have the right to compound with the accused for the infliction of a modified penalty according to the circumstances, and which must not be less than double the Treaty rates of duty. Should the offender accept this arrangement, the objects seized will be restored to him after payment of the fine.

ART. VI. The Steam-packet Companies are exempt from payment of the *ardie* duty for packages in litigation, misdirected or retained unavoidably; but should such packages as may be misdirected or detained unavoidably, be, in consequence of a change of destination, withdrawn for local consumption, they will be liable to the *ardie* duty.

No *ardie* duty will be levied upon packages detained by the Customs in consequence of sequestration duly made and notified, nor upon those detained on account of average.

ART. VII. The Customs will effect a sale of packages left in the warehouses beyond one year and one day, in the following manner:

At the expiration of the aforesaid term of one year and one day, the Custom's Administrator will announce the sale at Constantinople, by a notice inserted in two newspapers of that city, one Turkish, the other French: and in the provinces, by a notice in Turkish affixed to the Custom-house and at the entrance of the residence of the Governor, Caimakam, or Mudir.

One month after such notice, the Customs will proceed to open the packages intended for sale, in presence of, first, two delegates of the Tribunal of Commerce, and where there is no such tribunal, of two delegates from the council of the locality. Secondly, of a delegate of the Consulate or of the authority to which the owner of the package is subject: and should the person to whom it is addressed be unknown, of a delegate from the Consulate or the authority representing the nationality of the vessel in which the package has been brought.

The Customs' authorities, and the said delegates, will draw up an inventory of the contents of the packages, and will fix the day and hour of the sale which ought to be preceded by the same announcements as those above specified.

On the day named the Customs will proceed to sell these packages by public auction in presence of the delegates above named, who will sign the report of the sale.

The report will contain, in addition to other matter, the names, surnames, and capacity of the purchaser of each article sold.

Should the Consul's delegate be absent on the day and at the hour fixed for the sale, he will be considered to have left the decision to the Customs' authorities, who will at once proceed with the sale, provided that two delegates of the *Tidjaret* are present; in the absence of these, the presence of two members of the Councils is imperative.

The objects will be sold at once to the highest and last bidders, and must be paid for in cash.

The costs incurred on account of the sale will be repaid entirely from the proceeds of the sale, as follows:—

1. The cost of sale, including that of announcement, placards, &c.
2. The Customs' duties calculated at the price of adjudication, less the cost of selling.
3. The freight and expenses assigned.
4. The *ardie* duties.

These costs refunded, the remainder must be paid to the authority of the nation to which the consignee belongs; and should the consignee be unknown, to the authority representing the nationality to which the vessel belongs.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Chargé d'Affaires at Hamburg, enclosing the following translation of a Notification relative to the payment of Pilotage Dues, which has been issued by the Harbour Board of that city.

**NOTIFICATION respecting the Pilotage-duty
for ships employing Hamburg Pilots.**

In the pilotage duty of 9 and 12 marks respectively per foot depth of water, fixed by sec. 14, of the Regulation for the Pilot Cruiser of 6th July, 1861, is included the river pilotage duty of respectively 1 and 2 marks per foot for the use of the River Pilots from Cuxhaven to the Bosch inclusive. Now, whereas, by the Ordinance of December 29th, 1862, ships of 60 lasts and under are exempted from the obligation to take a Pilot; the pilotage duty for those ships, when they arrive at Cuxhaven with a Sea Pilot, and from thence sail higher up without a Pilot, is fixed henceforth at only 8 marks per foot in summer, and 10 marks per foot in winter.

The same relief is extended to those ships which use a Hamburg Sea Pilot, and either do not enter the Elbe, or only arrive at Cuxhaven, without sailing higher up the river.—Hamburg, June 18, 1863.
