ORDER REGULATING THE USE OF LOCOMOTIVES WITHIN THE PETTY SESSIONAL DIVISION OF CARNARVON.

WHEREAS it appears to me, the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the use of Locomotives, unless restricted as hereinafter mentioned, on any of the Turnpike Roads or Highways within the Petty Sessional Division of Carnarvon, in the county of Carnarvon, is dangerous and inconvenient to the public.

I do, hereby, by virtue of the provisions of "The Locomotive Act, 1861," by this Order, under my hand, prohibit the use of any kind of Locomotive whatever, propelled by steam, or any other than animal power, on any of the turnpike roads or highways within the said Division, except between the hours of nine at night and seven in the morning.
