This event has awakened the hope that your Majesty's august lineage may long be continued to rule within these realms ; and we rejoice that the universal outburst of satisfaction and loyalty which has just greeted the Royal nuptials is also to be ascribed to the affection which all classes of your subjects bear towards your Majesty, and the deep sympathy with which they regard the virtues and memory of His Royal Highness the lamented Prince Consort.

THE Queen has been pleased to direct the following Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, for investing the Supreme Court of Hong Kong with Appellate Jurisdiction in certain cases of Civil Suits between British Subjects, heard and determined under the authority of Her Majesty's Order in Council of the 23rd day of January 1860 by British Consuls within the Dominions of the Emperor of Japan, and in substitution for the Letters Patent of the 30th of January, 1860, published in the London Gazette of the 27th February, 1860, page 850.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, &c. :

To all to whom these Presents shall come Greeting :—

Whereas, by an Ordinance passed by the Legislative Council of Hong Kong, in the year 1845, intituled No. 6, of 1845, " An Ordinance to repeal " Ordinance No. 15 of 1844, for the establishment of a Supreme Court of Indication at Hong Kong, and to substitute other provisions in lieu " thereof," it was enacted, that there should be within the said Colony a Court, which should be called the Supreme Court of Hong Kong.

And whereas by certain Letters Patent, bearing date the 30th January, 1860, provision was professedly made for investing the said Supreme Court with Appellate Jurisdiction in cases of Civil Suits, heard and determined under authority of Her Majesty's Order in Council, of the 3rd March,

1859, by British Consuls within the Dominions of the Emperor of Japan, but such Order in Council had been repealed previously to the date of the said Letters Patent, that is to say, by Her Majesty's Order in Council of the 23rd of January, 1860.

And whereas it is expedient that the said Letters Patent should be revoked.

Now, know ye, that, upon consideration of the premises, and of Our certain knowledge and mere motion, We have thought fit to direct and ordain and do direct and ordain, as follows:—

1. The aforesaid Letters Patent of the 30th day of January, 1860, are hereby revoked and determined.

And whereas by the 13th section of an Order in Council, bearing date the 23rd of January, 1860, it was ordered that, in the event of any suit of a civil nature, arising between British subjects within the Dominions of the Tycoon of Japan, it should be lawful upon the application of any party to such suit, for the Consul of the district within which the party sued should be found, to hear and determine such suit, subject in case the sum in dispute should exceed one thousand dollars to an appeal to the Supreme Court of the Colony of Hong Kong, and that every such appeal should be made and conducted in the manner and form, and under the same conditions as were prescribed by the said Order in Council in cases in which the defendant only was a British Subject.

And whereas by the 28th section of the aforesaid Order in Council, it was further ordered, that the Supreme Court of the colony of Hong Kong should have, and might exercise concurrently with Her Majesty's Consul, authority and jurisdiction in regard to all suits of a civil nature between British subjects, arising within any parts of the Dominions of the Emperor of Japan: Provided always, that the said Supreme Court should not be bound, unless in a fit case it should deem it right so to do, by writ of "Certiorari," or otherwise, to debar or prohibit the Consul from hearing and determining, pursuant to the provisions of the several sections of the said Order, any suit of a civil nature between British Subjects or to stay the proceedings of a Consul in any such matter.

2. We do further direct and ordain, that if any party to any such suit as aforesaid, heard and determined in Japan, and in which the sum in dispute shall exceed 1000 dollars, shall be dissatisfied with the decision given upon the said suit by the Consul, before whom the same shall be heard or tried, it shall be lawful for such party, within 15 days after such decision, to give to the Consul notice of appeal to the Supreme Court of Hong Kong, whereupon the Consul shall, with as little delay as possible, stamp with his Consular seal and transmit to the said Supreme Court all the documents which were produced before him, and none other, and also the notes taken by him of the evidence adduced in the said suit, together with a statement of the grounds on which he formed his decision, and an exact copy of the Order made by him, and shall forthwith notify to the several parties the transmission thereof. Provided always, that it shall be lawful for the Consul to require from any party appealing to the said Court, reasonable security, which shall consist in part of one or two sufficient sureties to be approved by the Consul, that such party shall and will abide by the decision to be given by the said Supreme Court, and pay all such costs of and incidental to such appeal, as the said Supreme Court shall direct.

3. And We do further direct and ordain that it shall be competent to the said Supreme Court, and the said Court is hereby required to take into consideration such documents and statements, and decide upon the same, and to communicate its decision to the Consul, who shall forthwith proceed to carry the same into execution.

4. And We do further direct and ordain that in any appeal to the said Court from the decision of a Consul, it shall not be open to any party, except as hereinafter is provided, to adduce any further evidence than that which was laid before the Consul, and that a party shall not be required to appear personally to prosecute an appeal or support a sentence. Provided always, that in all appeals from the decision of a Consul, it shall be lawful for a party to allege facts essential to the issue of the suit which have come to his knowledge subsequently to the decision of the Consul, and to produce evidence in support of such facts, and provided also that it shall moreover be lawful for the said Court to admit any further legal evidence besides that adduced before the Consul; on its being established to the satisfaction of the said Court by oath on personal examination or by affidavit that the party desiring to produce such further evidence was ignorant of the existence of such evidence, or was taken by surprise at the hearing before the Consul, or was unable to produce it before the Consul after due and reasonable diligence and exertion on his part in that behalf, or wheresoever under the particular circumstances of the case, it shall appear to the said Court that further evidence ought to be received.

5. And We do hereby give and grant to the said Supreme Court full jurisdiction, power, and authority to hear and determine all such causes, suits, matters, and things as are mentioned and comprised in the said 28th Article of the aforesaid Order in Council of 23rd January, 1860.

6. And We do further direct and ordain, that it shall be lawful for the said Court, to make such Rules, Orders, and Regulations, not being inconsistent with the provisions of the said Order in Council, or with these our Letters Patent, or with the laws in force in Hong Kong, as may, in the judgment of the said Court, be requisite for the speedy and effectual decision of the aforesaid appeals, and also of the said causes, suits, matters, and things. Provided always, that all such Rules, Orders, and Regulations, shall forthwith be communicated to the Governor of Hong Kong, and by him shall be transmitted to Us, Our Heirs and Successors, under the Seal of the said Court, for Our or Their approbation or disallowance, to be signified through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, to the said Governor.

In Witness whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent. Witness Ourselves at Westminster, the sixth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty three, in the twenty seventh year of Our Reign.

ARTICLE II.—That the Vestry Clerk for the time being, appointed under the authority of the Statutes in that behalf and this Order, shall perform the following duties, in addition to those set forth in the said Act:—

Under statute 25 and 26 Victoria, cap. 61, confirming Provisional Order made by the General or Quarter Sessions of the Peace, in and for the county of Leicester, for the alteration of Highway Districts in the said county.

Leicestershire to Wit.

AT the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the county of Leicester, held in and for the said county, on Monday, the 29th day of June, 1863.

Whereas, at a Court of General or Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the county of Leicester, held on the 6th day of April last, a Provisional Order was made in the words following; that is to say:

"Leicestershire.—At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden at the Castle of Leicester, in and for the county of Leicester, on Monday, the 6th day of April, 1863, before Charles William Packe, Esq., Chairman, Sir Frederick Thomas Fowke, Baronet, and the Reverend Henry James Hoskins, Clerk, Deputy Chairmen, and others their fellows, Justices assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen, in the county aforesaid, it is ordered provisionally as follows:—

"Whereas Thomas Calvert Beasley, Esq.; the Reverend Frederick John Norman; George Norman, Esq.; Thomas Dickenson Hall, Esq.; and William Fletcher Norton Norton, Esq.; being five of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, acting in and for the county of Leicester, have, by a writing under their hands, dated the 19th day of February, 1863, required William Freer, Esq., the Clerk of the Peace for the said county, to add to or send with the notice required by law, to be given of the holding of the then next Court of General or Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the said county, a notice in the form marked (A) in the Schedule to the Act of the 25th and 26th years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter sixty-one, intituled "An Act for the better Management of Highways in England," or near thereto as circumstances admit, that at such Court of General or Quarter Sessions a proposal would be made to the Justices then and there assembled to alter the present Highway District of Belvoir, in the said county of Leicester, by disannexing the parishes of Eastwell, Eaton, Harby, Saltby, and Statherne from the Melton Mowbray Highway District, and uniting the same with the Belvoir District of the said county, and did also require the said Clerk of the Peace to send by post, in a prepaid letter, notices in the form aforesaid to the Churchwardens and Overseers of each and every of the parishes above-mentioned.

And whereas, at a Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the said county, held at the Castle of Leicester, in Leicester, in and for the said county, on the 6th day of April, 1863, a proposal was submitted to the said Court by the said Justices that the present Highway District of Belvoir, in the said county of Leicester, be altered by disannexing the parishes of Eastwell, Eaton, Harby, Saltby, and Statherne from the Melton Mowbray Highway District, and uniting the same with the Belvoir District, of the said county.

And whereas the said Court have heard the said proposal and entertained the same, and have considered the premises, and it has been shown to the said Court that the notices aforesaid were duly sent to the Churchwardens and Overseers of each of the parishes mentioned.

Now, therefore, the said Court, in pursuance of the powers vested in the Court in and by the said Act, do, by this Provisional Order, direct that the said district, called the Belvoir Highway District, shall be altered by the addition thereto of the said parishes of Eastwell, Eaton, Harby, Saltby, and Statherne; and that such last-mentioned parishes be subtracted from the said district, called the Melton Mowbray Highway District.

And it is further ordered by the said Court, that no portion of the salaries of the officers appointed for the said Melton Mowbray Highway District, or of any other expenses incurred by the Highway Board of the said last-mentioned district for the common use or benefit of the several parishes

within such district, shall be charged to the said parishes of Eastwell, Eaton, Harby, Saltby, and Statherne, or any of them; but that such last-mentioned parishes shall be liable only to the district fund of the Belvoir Highway District.

Lastly, it is ordered that the confirmation of this Provisional Order by a Final Order shall be taken into consideration by the Justices at a Court of General or Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to be held at the Castle of Leicester aforesaid, in and for the said county, on the 29th day of June, 1863."

And whereas proof has been afforded to the satisfaction of this Court that the notices required by the said Act of Parliament of the making of the said Provisional Order, and of the appointment made by the said Justices in relation to the confirmation thereof have been duly given and published by the Clerk of the Peace for the said county.

Now, therefore, the Justices assembled at this present Court of General or Quarter Sessions of the Peace (being the Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace duly appointed for this purpose) in pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in them under and by virtue of the said Act of Parliament, having considered the premises, do, by this Final Order, confirm the said hereinbefore recited Provisional Order of the 6th day of April, 1863, without variation.

And whereas at the next Court of Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the said county, held at Denbigh, in the said county, on the 12th day of March, 1863, the said proposal was submitted to and entertained by the Justices assembled at the said Court. And whereas at the said Court of Quarter Sessions the Justices so assembled at the said Court, in pursuance of the powers vested in them by "The Highway Acts," did by a Provisional Order constitute the said parishes and townships mentioned in the said notice a

Now, therefore, at the Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the said county (being the then next Quarter Sessions of the Peace last mentioned), held at Ruthin on the 2nd day of July, 1863, the Justices assembled thereat having considered the premises, do by this Final Order confirm the said Provisional Order without variation, and do hereby order that the First Meeting of the Highway Board for the said district shall be held at the house of Edward Lloyd, Innkeeper, situate in the village of Trefnant, in the said district, on the 8th day of April, 1864, at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

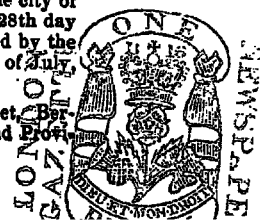
