NOTIFICATION OF BLOCKADE.

IT is hereby notified, that Earl Russell, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Her Majesty's Vice Consul at Vera Cruz, a notification, addressed to him by the Commander-in-Chief of the French Naval Forces in the Gulf of Mexico, and dated the 5th of September, 1863, of the Blockade by the French naval forces, on and from the 6th September, 1863, of the Coast of the Gulf of Mexico, with the exception of Tampico, Vera Cruz, Alvarado, Goatzacoalcos, Tabasco, and Carmen. The following is the official communication received by Earl Russell:—

NOTIFICATION DE BLOCUS.

NOUS soussigné Contre-Amiral Commandant-en-Chef les forces navales de Sa Majesté l'Empereur des Français dans le Golfe du Mexique,

Vu l'état de guerre existant entre la France et le Gouvernement de Juarez, agissant en vertu des pouvoirs qui nous appartiennent:

Declarons,

Qu'à partir du 6 Septembre courant les ports et leurs issues, les rivières, havres, rades, criques, &c., des côtes du Mexique qui ne sont point occupés par nos troupes, et qui reconnaissent encore le pouvoir de Juarez, depuis la lagune à 10 lieues au sud de Matamoros, jusqu'à et y compris Campêche,

entre 25° 22' Nd.—99° 54' Ot.

et 19° 52' Nd.—92° 50' Ot.

(Méridien de Paris)

seront tenus en état de blocus effectif, par les forces navales placées sous notre Commandement, et que les bâtiments amis ou neutres auront un délai de 25 jours pour achever leur chargement et quitter les lieux bloqués.

(Les points à excepter du blocus sont Tampico, Vera-Cruz, Alvarado, Goatzacoalcos, Tabasco et Carmen).

Il sera procédé contre tout bâtiment qui tenterait de violer le dit blocus, conformément aux lois internationales et aux traités en vigueur avec les puissances neutres.

NOTIFICATION OF BLOCKADE.

WE, the Undersigned Rear-Admiral Commanding-in-Chief the Naval Forces of His Majesty the Emperor of the French in the Gulf of Mexico,

In view of the state of war existing between France and the Government of Juarez, acting by virtue of the powers which belong to us,

Declare,

That from the 6th of September instant the ports and their outlets, the rivers, harbours, roadsteads, creeks, &c., of the coasts of Mexico which are not in the occupation of our troops, and which still acknowledge the power of Juarez, from the lagoon, 10 leagues to the South of Matamoros, up to and including Campêche:

Between 25° 22' N., 99° 54' W.

and 19° 52' N., 92° 50' W.

(Meridian of Paris).

shall be held in a state of effective Blockade by the Naval Forces under our command, and that friendly or neutral vessels shall have a delay of twenty-five days to complete their cargoes, and to quit the places blockaded.

The points excepted from the Blockade are Tampico, Vera Cruz, Alvarado, Goatzacoalcos, Tabasco, and Carmen.

Proceedings in conformity with International Law and the Treaties in force with Neutral Powers will be taken against all vessels which shall attempt to violate the said Blockade.

THE Secretary of State for War has received a Despatch from Lieutenant-General Cameron, C.B., Commanding the Troops in New Zealand, of which the following is a copy:

Head Quarters, Queen's Redoubt,
August 4, 1863.

MY LORD,

WITH reference to the reports I have forwarded to your Lordship, relative to the operations in which the troops in this province have

been engaged during the past month, I beg to state that their success has been owing in great measure to the valuable assistance rendered by Captain Sullivan, Senior Naval Officer at this station, and by the officers and men under his command.

A large party of seamen and marines of Her Majesty's ship *Harrier* have been encamped on the bank of the Mangatwhiri river since the 11th ultimo, and their services have been of the greatest advantage to the force under my command, all the boats employed in conveying troops and supplies across to the Koheroa having been entirely manned by them.

At my request Captain Sullivan has superintended the construction of six large flat bottomed boats, especially adapted for the transport of troops up the Waikato. Two of these have been brought overland from Auckland, a distance of thirty-five miles, to the Mangatawhiri, where they have been extremely useful.

Without the aid of such boats, operations up the Waikato could not be carried on, as there is no road on either bank of the river.

For these services I am much indebted to Captain Sullivan, as well as for his cordial co-operation on all other occasions since the commencement of hostilities.

I have also to acquaint your Lordship that the small colonial steamer *Avon*, was brought into the Waikato from the Manukau by Commander Mayne, of Her Majesty's ship *Eclipse*, and is now at anchor off the Bluff Stockade, at Havelock. In reporting to Captain Sullivan the performance of this important and hazardous duty, Commander Mayne speaks highly of the assistance he received from Captain Greaves, Acting Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General, by whom the lower part of the river was surveyed last summer.

In justice to Captain Greaves, who is a most zealous and talented officer, I beg to forward Captain Sullivan's letter regarding his services on this occasion.

The *Avon* is the first steamer that has ever been brought into the Waikato, as it was supposed, previous to the survey made by Captain Greaves, that the numerous shoals in the lower part of its course rendered the passage of a steamer impossible.

The *Avon* can carry 200 men; her bulwarks have been made bullet-proof, and she is armed with a 12-pounder Armstrong gun.

I have no doubt that she will be of great service in our operations up the Waikato.

ORDER REGULATING THE USE OF LOCOMOTIVES ON THE ROADS OF THE ARRINGTON TRUST, IN THE COUNTY OF CAMBRIDGE.

WHEREAS it appears to me, the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that the use of Locomotives, unless restricted as herein-after mentioned, on or along the road from Cambridge to the Old North Road near Arrington Bridge, in the county of Cambridge, and highways adjacent thereto, is dangerous and inconvenient to the public:

I do hereby, by virtue of the provisions of "The Locomotive Act, 1861," by this order under my hand, prohibit the use of any kind of Locomotive whatever propelled by steam or any other than animal power on the above road and highways, except between the hours of twelve o'clock at night and six o'clock in the morning.

Revolving Red Light near Morecambe Bay.

THE Corporation of the Trinity House, London, has given Notice, that a light vessel has been placed in the vicinity of Morecambe Bay, on the west coast of England.

The light is a *revolving red* light, showing a *flash every half minute*. It is elevated 38 feet above the level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 10 miles.

The light vessel has her "name" painted on her sides, a globe at the mast head, and is moored in 9½ fathoms at low water springs, with St. Bees Head lighthouse bearing N. by E., distant 38 miles; Walney lighthouse N.E. by E. ¼ E., 12½ miles; Foot of Wyre lighthouse E. ¾ S.; 14 miles; Blackpool church S.E. ¼ E., 13½ miles; Skerries lighthouse W. ¾ S., 51½ miles; Calf of Man lighthouse N.W. by W., 51½ miles.

The vessel is in lat. 53° 53' 30" N., long. 3° 24' 30" west of Greenwich.

Certain Omnibuses, &c., to use Cannon-street.

1. Every omnibus, metropolitan stage carriage, van or other carriage, licensed for the conveyance of passengers at separate fares passing eastwards through St. Paul's-churchyard, and proceeding to or whose destination as stated on such vehicle or in its license shall be London-bridge, or to any place over London-bridge, shall, when it reaches the south-east corner of St. Paul's Cathedral, pass down Cannon-street, and thence over London-bridge, and every such carriage making the reverse journey shall traverse the like route, and the driver of every such omnibus, metropolitan stage carriage, van or other carriage, licensed for the conveyance of passengers at separate fares, shall drive the same pursuant to this regulation.

No loads with more than Four horses between nine A.M. and six P.M.

2. No person shall drive any vehicle through the streets between the hours of nine in the morning and six in the evening laden with goods, materials, articles, or things whatsoever, which shall be of a nature so heavy as to require more than 4 horses to draw it.

No Locomotives between six A.M. and ten P.M.

3. No person shall drive or conduct any kind of locomotive propelled by steam (except a steam fire-engine actually going to or returning from a fire) within any street between the hours of six in the morning and ten at night.

Limiting height and width of loads between nine A.M. and six P.M.

4. No person shall drive any cart, waggon, dray, or other vehicle for the conveyance of goods, wares, and merchandize, through the streets, between the hours of nine in the morning and six in the evening, laden to a greater height than 16 feet, measuring from the ground or laden to a greater width than 7 feet, or the breadth between the outside of the wheels of which vehicle (except it shall have been in use before or on the 28th day of July, 1863) shall be greater than 7 feet.

No Timber, &c., exceeding a certain size, between nine A.M. and six P.M.

5. No person shall drive any cart, waggon, or other vehicle wholly or partially laden with timber, scaffolding, or other poles, logs of wood, masts, spars, or other articles or things, whether consisting of wood, metal, or any other material exceeding 25 feet in length, or 8 feet 6 inches in breadth, through any street between the hours of nine in the morning and six in the evening.

No Coals, &c. to be delivered in certain streets between the hours of nine A.M. and five P.M.

6. No person shall, between the hours of nine o'clock in the morning and five o'clock in the evening, deliver any coals, beer, wine, or other liquid

in casks, conveyed by means of any waggon, cart, van, carriage, or other vehicle, in the following streets, viz., Gracechurch-street, Bishopsgate-street Within, Threadneedle-street, Cornhill, Lombard-street, Leadenall-street, Fenchurch-street, Tower-street, Eastcheap, Cannon-street, King William-street, Upper or Lower Thames-street, Fleet-street, Ludgate-hill, Ludgate-street, Newgate-street, Cheapside, The Poultry, Gresham-street, Prince's-street, Lothbury, Throgmorton-street, or Old Broad-street.

Drivers to keep the near side in meeting, and take the off side in passing.

7. Every driver of any waggon, cart, carriage, or other vehicle, shall, in meeting any other vehicle, keep his waggon, cart, carriage, or vehicle to the left, or near side of the street; and every such driver, in passing any other vehicle, shall keep his waggon, cart, carriage, or vehicle on the right or off side of the street (except in cases of actual necessity or some sufficient reason for deviation).

Persons not to hinder others passing them.

8. No person shall in any manner wilfully prevent any other person from passing him, or any waggon, cart, or other carriage, or horse, mule, or other beast of burthen under his care, in any street, nor by negligence or misbehaviour prevent, hinder, or interrupt the free passage of any person, waggon, cart, or other carriage, or horse, mule, or other beast of burthen in any street.

Prohibiting certain obstructions.

9. No person shall slide upon any footway, nor stand, loiter, or remain together with other persons on any street or footway without reasonable cause, nor hawk or expose for sale any shell or other fish, bird, game, fruit, greengrocery, meat, toy, or other article or thing of any kind, in any street, or on or near any footway, so as in either of such cases to obstruct or incommode the free passage of any such street or footway.

No wilful obstructions.

10. No person shall by any other means than herein provided, wilfully obstruct the free passage of any street or footway, nor insult, jostle, or annoy any person passing along any street or footway.

Obstructions of Footways by goods, &c.

11. No person shall suffer any goods or merchandize, empty hampers, cases, or barrels, or any coal or fuel intended for any warehouse or house, to remain in the street or on the footway, for a longer period than shall be necessary for the housing or removing thereof.

Vegetables, Fruits, &c., not to be sold on Trucks in certain Streets between nine A.M. and six P.M.

12. No person shall expose for sale any vegetables, fruit, fish, or other article carried upon any truck, barrow, cart, or other vehicle in any of the following streets, viz.:—London Bridge, Blackfriars Bridge, Gracechurch-street, Bishopsgate-street Within, Threadneedle-street, Cornhill, Lombard-street, Leadenhall-street, Fenchurch-street, Tower-street, Eastcheap, Cannon-street, King William-street, Upper or Lower Thames-street, Fleet-street, Ludgate-hill, Ludgate-street, Newgate-street, Cheapside, The Poultry, Gresham-street, Princes-street, Lothbury, Throgmorton-street, or Old Broad-street, between the hours of nine in the morning and six in the evening.

Vehicles to stand parallel to the Pavement.

13. The driver of every dray, cart, van, waggon, carriage, or other vehicle whatsoever shall cause the same to stand with the side thereof parallel to the foot pavement when loading or unloading, or stopping for any other purpose.

Persons to obey Directions of Police in certain Cases.

14. Every driver of any waggon, cart, carriage, or other vehicle, and the rider of every horse or other animal, shall obey the direction of the constable on duty in any street with regard to the street or portion of street to be used by him, or the direction or route he must take through any street in any case when an obstruction is in any way wholly or partially caused, or likely to be caused, to the free passage of any street, or whenever the diversion of the traffic is necessary by reason of its amount or nature, or on account of any accident, fire, the passing of artillery-waggon or troops, the repairs of streets or pavements, or other emergency or occasion.

Standings for Shoeblocks.

15. The streets or places mentioned in the first column of the schedule hereto shall be and are hereby appointed places at which street shoeblacks may stand to exercise their calling, and the number of such shoeblacks who may stand at each of such places shall not exceed the number specified in the second column of such schedule, provided that the Commissioner of the City Police shall, and he is hereby empowered, from time to time, and as often as he shall think necessary, or the public convenience may require, to alter the standing places in any street, or to increase the number of standings in the same, or to allot standing places in other streets, and to fix, alter, or increase the number of shoeblacks at any standing place, so that the number of standing places do not exceed 150, and the number of shoeblacks do not in the whole exceed 300.

Obstructions at standings prohibited.

16. No shoeblack, other than those authorized by the Commissioner of Police, shall be permitted to occupy the appointed standings nor remain there after being required by a constable on duty to leave, nor shall any person or persons, other than those requiring and using the services of a shoeblack, assemble or remain at such standings or in the immediate proximity thereof after being requested by any constable on duty to leave, nor shall any person or persons molest or obstruct any authorized shoeblack in the exercise of his calling.

Interpretation Clause.

17. In the interpretation of these bye-laws the word "street" shall include any street, lane, road, square, court, alley, passage, place, bridge, or other public way.
