

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 52.)—MEDITERRANEAN—SOUTH COAST OF SPAIN.

Fixed and Flashing Light at Cape Sacratif.

THE Minister of Marine at Madrid has given notice, that on and after the 31st day of December, 1863, a light will be exhibited from a light-house recently erected at Cape Sacratif, in the province of Granada, on the south coast of Spain.

The light will be a *fixed* and *flashing* white light, showing a flash every *minute*. It will be placed at an elevation of 320 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 24 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the second order.

The tower is slightly conical, 56 feet high, of a red brick colour, and stands on the hill at the extremity of the cape, about 30 yards from the sea, in lat. $36^{\circ} 41' N.$, long. $3^{\circ} 28' 56''$ west of Greenwich, or about $1\frac{1}{2}'$ west of that of the Admiralty Charts.

Fixed Red Light at Honda Cove.

Also, that on and after the 31st day of December, 1863, a light will be exhibited from a light-house recently erected on Punta del Llano de Carchuna, the west point of entrance to Honda Cove, on the south coast of Spain.

The light will be a *fixed red* light, placed at an elevation of 44 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 8 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the fifth order.

The tower is slightly conical, 33 feet high, and of a dark brown colour, and said to stand 60 yards from the sea, in lat. $36^{\circ} 41' N.$, long. $3^{\circ} 25' 56''$ West of Greenwich.

Fixed and flashing Light on Sabinal Point.

THE Minister of Marine at Madrid has given notice, that on and after the 31st day of December, 1863, a light will be exhibited from a light-house recently erected on Sabinal Point, in the province of Almeria, on the south coast of Spain.

The light will be a *fixed* white light, varied by a *flash* every *two minutes*. It will be placed at an elevation of 105 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 18 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the third order.

The tower is white, slightly conical, and 102 feet high. It is 40 yards from the sea, and said to be in lat. $36^{\circ} 41' 20'' N.$, long. $2^{\circ} 44'$ west of Greenwich, or about 1' west of that of the Admiralty Charts.

Fixed Light at Roquetas.

Also, that on and after the 31st day of December, 1863, a light will be exhibited from a light-house recently erected at Roquetas, in the province of Almeria, on the south coast of Spain.

The light will be a *fixed* white light, placed at an elevation of 57 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 9 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the sixth order.

The tower is white, slightly conical, 30 feet high, and rises from the centre of the keeper's dwelling on the beach south of the town. It is said to be in lat. $36^{\circ} 45' 10'' N.$, long. $2^{\circ} 41' 46''$ west of Greenwich, or about $1\frac{1}{2}'$ west of that of the Admiralty Charts.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

(No. 54.)—MEDITERRANEAN—SOUTH COAST OF SPAIN.

Fixed and Flashing Light on Mesa de Roldan.

THE Minister of Marine at Madrid has given notice, that on and after the 31st day of December, 1863, a light will be exhibited from a light-house recently erected on the Mesa de Roldan, in the province of Almeria, on the south coast of Spain.

The light will be a *fixed* and *flashing* white light, showing a flash every *two minutes*. It will be placed at an elevation of 725 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 22 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the third order.

The tower is octagonal, 39 feet high, and painted white. It stands on the most salient part of the mount called the Mesa de Roldan, and said to be in lat. $36^{\circ} 54' 40'' N.$, long. $1^{\circ} 58' 16''$ west of Greenwich, or about 3' west of that of the Admiralty Charts.

MAJORCA ISLAND.

Fixed Light at Puerto Colom.

Also, that on and after the 31st day of December, 1863, a light will be exhibited from a light-house recently erected at Puerto Colom, on the south-east coast of the island of Majorca.

The light will be a *fixed* white light, placed at an elevation of 46 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the sixth order.

The tower is round, 26 feet high, and of a light gray colour. It stands at the north-east point of entrance to the port, and said to be in lat. $39^{\circ} 25' N.$, long. $3^{\circ} 18' 24''$ east of Greenwich, or about 3 miles north, and 2' west of that of the Admiralty Charts.
