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Falmouth, Jan. 15.

Efferday went out of this Harbour, to fail of Merchant fhips bound for the Streights. We are this day informed that an English fhip laden with Sugars and Oranges from Lisbonne, intended for London, is lately caft away about

Padftow.

Swanfor, Jan. 16. The 8th inftant, the Joseph of Rochell, laden with Salt and Fifth, homewards bound from 'Newfound-land, having fome days before spent her Main and Mizen Maits, with all her fails, was by the violence of the weather forced on share at Soilly, the Mailer, Pilot, and one of the Company washed over-board and loft, the ship much bulged, and the Salt spoiled, but the other lading with the men laved. The same day were driden with Oyls, and a vessel of Barnstable laden with 'Salt and Sugars from Portugal, and are both of them fince failed thence or their intended Ports.

Plymouth, Jan. 17. On Wedneiday last arrived here a vessel of this place from Morlaix, where the Coalts are continually haunted by the Offenders. Yesterday put in there two ships from the Canaries laden with Wine and bound for London.

- Portsmouth, Jan. 19. Yesterday was driven in hither the Bieffing of London, a Elyboat of 200 Tuns, with one other vessel laden with Sugars from the Barbadoes. Two other thips that were of their company, were by the weather foparated, one of them gove for Cowes, the other to the Windward. On Friday last they met with the Mary-Rofe with Two thips under her Convoy, intended for the Freights.

On Tuelday last the French Ambassador had an Extraordinary Audience from the Pope and the Cardinal Patron, which continued about four hours, part of his Negotiation as 'tis faid, concerning the restitution of Castron, a point not over-pleasing to this Court.

Hambourg, Jan. 14. From Warfam we are advertiled, that the Collacks Agent, Dedes Aga, is difpatcht and difmifled from that Court, having, betides a rich Prefent of Plate received a Thouland dollars from His Majefty defray the expences of his journey; but as yet the Ireary of peace made with the Tartars by General Radziouskis, is not ratified, to that 'tis believed the People would be easily inclined to returnagain into Poland, were they not fitting. We are also advised, that the Collacks inhabiting about the Dniper, having a ftrong Army of 200000, men have closed with the Mulcovites, and willing to declare themselves enemies to the Turks and Tartars, whenloever they shall be invited to it by the Mulcovites.

The Mukovites Amballadors have deily conferences with those of Poland, and endeavour to establish a perpetual League between both Growns, offering a very confiderable succour against all the Bnemies of the Grown of P.g.land.

The fame Letters likewife re'l us the Czierkowiff Colfacks are fallen into Crym Zartany with a confiderable bady of mens where they have much endamaged the Countrey, and releafed above 6000 Christians which were above in bondage.

From Stackholm we are informed that a Ireaty is there on foor with the Emperour, in order whereunto, feveral projects have been proposed, but as yet nothing fully concluded; and that the Chancellor of that Kingdom having lately in the Senate proposed fomewhat in favour of the French Intereff met with a warm opposition from A of the Senators, which growing high between them, the Chancellor begen to exhibit fome particular Charges againft them, but the whole Senare interpoling in favour of their Members, the Chancellor fubmined, ecknowledging the juffice of their proceeding, and was fince reloved to retire himfelfe in fome difguft to his Country-houle abour 2, miles diffant from that City; but 'is fince reported, that the Chancellor being ready to take his journey, thole differences were friendly compoled, and his journey flopped.

Two large Men of War, which are building upon the V ublick Account, will in few dayes be finisht, many hands being employed upon them, and may be ready to put to Sea towards the beginning of *Lent*, the Senate having already appointed two experienced Captains to command them and hasten them out to Sea.

Seignior Businet's our Refident at Milan, intended by Order of the Senate to be employed to feveral Princes of Germany, to negotiate for the affittance of this Republick, for the defence of Candia, is lately fallen fick of an Apo-'plexy; that fome other perfor will be fuddenly appointed for that employment.

Vienna, fan. 15. This Court is now fill'd wish fadnels, by the death of the young Imperial Prince, who lately falling into a great diftemper, died the 13th. inftant about ten of the Cleck in the Morning; his body afterwards opened, was deposited in the Church of the Capucins, without any Ceremony; his Heart was in a Silver Urn fent to the Chappel of our Lady of Lorette, and his Bowels enterred in St. Stephens Church. The Court is now taking mourning, and the intended Divertifements put off to a more convenient feason.

The New Levies are to be published the 20th. instant by the beat of Drum and found of Trumpet, General Montecuculi is by a late Order commanded to leave Raab, and to attend his Imperial Majesty, to confult about the Military Affairs. The States of Hungary are to meet in a full Affembly at Edenbourgh on the 10th of March.

The Duke Ulrich of Wartenbourgh flas a Penfion of 4000 Rixdollers a year conferred on him by the Emperour, with the Command of the Regiment of sullibach confifting of 2000 Horfe.

The Duke of Bauaria is faid to have already rai.ed a Body of 4000 Horle.

From Conft antinople 'tis faid that the Janizaries having ill referted the late kindnefs of the Sultan to the Grand Vizier in Candia, and the Prefert of a Robe and Cymiter, which were fent to him; which they have fhown by a fharp Mcffage to the Emperour; who is using all possible care to appeale, and reduce them to Obedience.

Paris, Jan. 28. From Rochelle we are informed of the arrival there of an English Ship much endamaged by florm, which came lately from *Lisbon*; and with her arrived an Envoye from the Queen of *Portugal*; who is upon his way for this place. The former Envoye from the same place has had his Audience from his Majelty, and is in few dayes to pass for *Sivoy*; according to his Orders.

Here are newly arrived three Deputies fent from the Duke of Loraine to his Majefty, viz. the Prefident of his Parliament, his Governor-Gen. and his Secretary, to complain of fome ill ulage which fome of his subjects have received, contrary to the Treaty formerly made with him.

The Duke de Beaufort is intending in few dayes for Breft, to take order for the speedy fitting up of his Fleet, or at the least, a confiderable Squadron of them, that they may be in a fit pofture to put to Sea in March following.

Bruges, Jan. 29. Some few Jays fince a ftrong party of French drawn out of the Garrifons of Fuernes, Berghen, and other parts, marched up to a small Fort, built for the better security of the River between Dixmuid and Ipres, called Knock Fort, which they immediately stormed, and after a shour resistance made by Captain Spindoles who commanded it, with about 60 Souldiers, they in little time made themfelves mafter of the place, and the Governour with his Souldiers prifoners of Warre 3 after fome little time of poffeffion, the French thought fit to demolift the Fort, returning home with their plunder and prifoners. Yefterday a party of 300 French Hotfe sppeared before Niexport, furprizing fome few of their Horfe-Guards which were abroad, and after fome hours flay within view of the Town, retired without any farther adventure.

From *Bruffels* we are informed, that on Tuefday laft arrived there the young Prince of *Tufcany*, having been attended about 4 Leagues diftant on the way, by the Marquifs de Caftel Rodrigo's Guards and his own Chariot, in which the Prince made his t ntry; being allo met and attended into Town by His Excellencies Coach, with a great Train of others of the Nobility which met him at the Gates ; the next day he was vilued in his Lodgings by the Marquifs, and invited to a Ball, where he was yefternight entertain'd with all the respect due to his Perfon and Quality, where there was a great appearance of all the Ladies of Quality about the Town, that Entertainment concluding in an excellent Collation.

The fame Evening arrived here 2 Deputies from the States General of the United Provinces, to impart to his Excellency the later resolution of the States in reference to these Countries, and the effectual means they intended to use to procure an Accommodation between the 2 Crowns of *spain* and France.

From Holland we are told that General Wurtz, being informed of his Election into the Charge of Field-Marchall, has left Hambourg, and may in few dayes arrive at the Hague, to take the Oath ufully administred on such Occations. That the States of Holland and Weß-Friefland have concurred to the Election of Prince Maurice, and the Heer Beverning to be fent in Quality of Amballadors Extraordinary to the Emperor, who are accordingly Ordered to prepare for their speedy journey, in the mean time care is taken to perfect their Instructions.

Hull, Jan. 19. Five Ships of this place are lately put to Sea, intending for Holland, laden with Lead. Cloth, and other Commodities of this Countrey; feveral other Ships are making ready, and in few dayes may put to Sea.

Plymouth, Jan. 19. This Evening arrived here from Bourdcaux and Rochelle, a Fleet of 28. Sail of Dutch and Hamborough Merchants, laden with Wines and Sake homewards bound. This Evening came in also the Richmond Fre gat from Briftol, with Naval Provisions for his Majeflies Service.

Lyme, Fan. 20. This last Evening arrived here the Elifabeth of this place from St. Ma'ses, informing us that by reason of the great throng of Oftend Privateers and Men of War, which are continually cruifing upon the French Coafts, their Trade is extreamly interrupted not onely at Sr. Maloes, but in most of the other Ports of France, where their loss of Ships and Goods have been very great ; that about 20. Sail of their Merchants Ships have been in few dayes taken in their return from Bourdoaux 3 but for a remedy for this great.evil, they are at St. Maloes fitting up three Ships of confiderable force; and by the French Kings Order leveral other frout Ships are letting out from other Ports, to clear the Coafts, and guard the Merchants in their Trades fome of them are already out at Sea, and have taken one of the Oftenders, and by their fevere ulage endeavour to deterre the reft, having hanged up most of the menthey took, at the Yards-arm.

Tarmouth, Jan. 20. On Thursday last a laden Collier ran unhappily upon the Sands call'd the Middle-grounds, about 7 miles to the Northwards of this place, where the was cast away, but the men got all of them faste to land. Yesterday and this day passed to the Northwards about 60 fail of light Colliers, the greatest part of them putting out from this Harbor, and belonging to this place. This day came in Tao ships belonging to this Town, both of them from Roterdam laden with Merchants Goods.

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
