We have just now Advice by the way of Barletta in Apulia, that the Commander of Castlenovo had offer'd to Capitulate, but infilting upon terms higher than was thought fit for their prefent condition, the General Cornaro refused them, and refolved to carry the place by Affault, which was fo happily executed, that after a Refiftance of two hours, in which 16 Knights of Ma'ta fell, they entred the Breach, putting all to the Sword that were in Arms, and became abfolute Mallers of the Town, where were found 700 Chri-itian Slaves whom they had taken this year, and laid them in Irons in the Caftle ; befides a confiderable Booty, which confifted most of the Robberies they had made: And we are expecting to hear from Vensce the Particulars of this great Victory, which is to be prized equal with any other of the furprizing Succeffes they have had this Campague, as well from the Confequence of the place, as that it was gain'd with great difficulty and opposition, the Advantages got here being as much owing to their own Courage, as the relt were to their Encmies Fears,

Vienna, Septemb. 21. It is to be expected now, that the News from *Hungary* should decrease as the Winter draws on, but that there should be none from thence fince the 7th Instant, is in part attributed to the frequent Excursions of small Parties of Turks and Tartars, that render the ways unfafe both on the fide of Peft and Buda; but it is concluded, that the Duke of Lorrain marched about the time he intended to Segedin, and having to pass through a Country quite depopulated, he was obliged to carry with him all Provisions necessary, as well for Horfes as Men! They expect to meet on the Borders of Trane filvania, with Supplies of whatever they may want; for it is faid that Prince choofes to furnish them there, rather than they should go further into his Country to look for The Envoy of Transilvania has made his Propositions, and is now preparing to follow the Duke of Lorrain, from whom they are to receive their last finishing : He would have infinuated, that the Turks had the fame Intentions of Quartering on that fide; but that is not like to deter the Imperialists from taking Possefion before them of what may be for their conveniency : And at all Adventures the Duke is marched with his whole Train of Artillery, as if he had thoughts he might one time or another make use of them in those Parts. The Fatigues of these Journies, and the Severity of the Weather, have fent many fick to the Holpitals of Buda, where it is to be hoped that many of them will foon recover through the care that is taken of them, but in the mean time the Army is not a little diminished. They write from Croatia, that the Governor being defilous to recover the Body of Colonel Voinovitz, who was kill'd in the late Expedition to Costonitza, in order to his Interment according to his Quality and Merit, offer'd the Tirks inflead of it any two Prifoners at their own choice, which yet they refused to deliver upon any other Confideration than that of a round Sum of Money, fo little valug value have the Farks generally one for another, that they won't exchange the living for the dead. The 19th Inftant, the Elector and Princes of S.txony received inveftiture from the Emperor of their refpective Territories, with the ulual Ceremonies.
