**N**OTICE is hereby given, that His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales will, by command of The Queen, hold Levees at St. James's Palace, on behalf of Her Majesty, on Wednesday, the 2nd of March next, and on Saturday, the 12th of March next, at two o'clock.

It is The Queen's pleasure that Presentations to His Royal Highness at these Levees shall be considered as equivalent to Presentations to Her Majesty.

#### REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the

cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

**T**HE Secretary of State for War has *this day* received Despatches from Lieutenant-General Cameron, C.B., Commanding Her Majesty's Forces in New Zealand, of which the following are copies :

*Head Quarters, Rangiriri,  
November 25th, 1863.*

MY LORD,

I HAVE the honour to report that a force consisting of 800 Infantry, Regulars, and Militia, and 50 Colonial Cavalry, embarked on the 16th instant, under command of Colonel Carey, 2nd Battalion, 18th Regiment, on board Her Majesty's ships "Miranda" and "Esk," and the Colonial steamer "Coris," with instructions to land at Haurangi, on the coast of the Frith of the Thames, and to march from thence upon Pukorokoro, a native settlement on the same coast.

I had received information that many of the marauding parties in the bush came from the Thames district, and that Pukorokoro was the point where they landed, and from whence they obtained supplies and reinforcements. I therefore directed Colonel Carey to take possession of the place, to seize all the canoes and provisions he could find, and to establish a post there.

Another object of the expedition was to make a reconnoissance of that part of the country, it being my intention to establish a line of posts between the Frith of the Thames and the river Waikato, with the view of shutting the natives out from the bush on the south and east of Auckland, and thereby enabling me to withdraw or reduce a great many of the posts inside that line, which absorb a large number of men, but have hitherto been necessary for the protection of the settlements and of our line of communication through the bush.

The expedition was detained by bad weather till the 23rd instant, on which day the troops disembarked at Hauratri, and arrived the same evening at Pukorokoro without meeting with any opposition.

I herewith enclose a copy of Colonel Carey's report of his proceedings.

*Camp Pukorokoro,*  
*November 24th, 1863.*

SIR,

I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of the Lieutenant-General Commanding the Forces, that the troops under my command reached this place at half-past six o'clock last evening, after a very harrassing march over a most difficult country, having left Huaratri at eleven o'clock.

The men were ashore by half-past eight o'clock A.M., and the horses at forty-five minutes past ten; each horse had to be landed separately.

The boats of the Royal Navy, under the command of Captains Jenkins and Hamilton, with the provision cutters, arrived off the mouth of the stream about the same time.

On landing it was found that the natives had recently held the position. The mouth of the river is staked across, and the entrance strongly defended by rifle pits (traversed), and others partially dug; these were at once occupied by Blue Jackets, Royal Marines, and the Baggage Guards of the Troops, and the disembarkation of the camp equipage, &c., &c., commenced, and is now being continued.

On reaching the settlement here fires were found still alight in the Whares, boxes locked, furniture, cooking utensils, a bell-tent, and a bag of bullets, &c., &c., giving evidence of a hurried departure.

A whale boat, a war canoe, and other canoes, were also found in the neighbouring creeks.

Owing to the deep mud and the impracticability of the creek for ships boats, except at high water, the landing of the baggage, &c., will be very tedious.

I would strongly recommend two flat-bottomed boats, of very light draught, being sent here at once.

The site for the post has been chosen, and the redoubt will be commenced as soon as the "materiel" is landed and carried up the hill to the encampment.

The redoubt will require a small open work, on a hill a few hundred yards to the southward, which will command it, but which being very steep and more distant from the landing place, would not be a suitable site for the redoubt.

I purpose establishing a Commissariat Store immediately below the redoubt, upon a flat spot round which the creek runs, and on which supplies can be landed by small boats at high tide.

Being commanded by the redoubt, the Commissariat Stores will merely require a small guard over them.

The steam-ship "Corio" will return to Auckland to-night for the baggage horses. In the meantime I purpose reconnoitring the country towards Paparata, and fixing the site of the post, if necessary, midway.

I take this opportunity of bringing to the notice of the Commander of the Forces, the very efficient manner in which the disembarkation of the troops and horses was effected by the Royal Navy under Captains Jenkins and Hamilton, without loss or accident, and beg to testify to their extreme kindness and attention to the wants of the officers and men during the week of our detention off Waiheki Island, on board the "Miranda" and "Esk."

MY LORD,

AFTER the evacuation of their position at Mere-Mere, reported in my last despatch, the rebel natives collected twelve miles higher up the Waikato River at Rangiriri, were, previous to the outbreak of hostilities, they had constructed a very strong line of entrenchment across the narrow Isthmus which divides the Waikato from Lake Waikare, thus completely barring the road up the right bank of the river.

Having reconnoitred this position in the "Pioneer," on the 18th instant, I determined on landing a force in rear of the line of entrenchment for the purpose of cutting off the retreat of the enemy simultaneously with attacking him in front.

With this view the head quarters 40th Regiment, 300 strong, under Colonel Leslie, C.B., were embarked on the 20th instant, on board the Colonial Steamers, "Pioneer" and "Avon," which, with four gunboats, proceeded up the Waikato, under command of Commodore Sir W. Wiseman, whilst with the force named in the margin\* I moved towards Rangiriri, by the right bank of the river.

Both arrived near Rangiriri at the same time, 3 P.M.

I halted the troops under the brow of a hill 600 yards from the enemy's position, and formed them for the attack in the following order.

200 men of the 65th Regiment, under Colonel Wyat, C.B., on the right, one half in extended order, and the rest in support.

Between them, a detachment of the 72 men of the 65th Regiment, under Lieutenant Toker, with scaling ladders and planks; Captain Brooke, with ten men of the Royal Engineers was attached to this part.

The detachment of the 1st Battalion, 12th Regiment, under Captain Cole, and 2nd Battalion 14th Regiment, under Lieutenant Austen, prolonged the line of skirmishers and supports to the left of the 65th Regiment.

Captain Mercer's two Armstrong Guns and the naval six-pounder Armstrong, under Lieutenant Alexander, of Her Majesty's Ship, "Curacoa," in the centre of the line of skirmishers. The detachment of the 40th Regiment, under Captain Cooke, and the remainder of the 65th Regiment in reserve.

The enemy's works consisted of a line of high parapet and double ditch, extending, as I have before stated, between the Waikato and Lake Waikare, the centre of this line being strengthened by a square redoubt of very formidable construction, its ditch being 12 feet wide, and the height from the bottom of the ditch to the top of the parapet 18 feet. The strength of this work was not known before the attack as its profile could not be seen either from the river or from the ground in front.

Behind the left centre of this main line and at right angles to it, there was a strong entrenched line of rifle pits facing the river and obstructing the advance of troops from that direction.

About 500 yards behind this front position was a high ridge, the summit of which was fortified with rifle pits.

As the left of the line of entrenchment could be enfiladed and taken in reverse by the fire from the steamers and gunboats, I selected that part of the enemy's works for the attack.

The skirmishers of the 65th Regiment were to cover the advance of the ladder party, and when the latter had succeeded in escalading the entrenchment, were to follow with the support. The whole

then bringing their right shoulders forward were to attack the line of rifle pits facing the river, and having driven the enemy out of it, were to storm the centre redoubt.

The 12th Regiment were to join in the attack on the centre redoubt, and the 2nd Battalion 14th Regiment, to keep the enemy in their front in check until the 65th and 1st Battalion 12th Regiment were in the redoubt.

The troops were hardly in position when the enemy opened a heavy fire of musketry on every part of his line, but without effect, the troops being under cover of the brow of the hill.

I had arranged with Commodore Sir William Wiseman that the guns attached to the force under my command and those of the gunboats should, on a pre-concerted signal, open fire at the same moment when the "Pioneer" and "Avon" should also land the 40th Regiment. But the strength of the wind and current rendered the steamers and gunboats almost unmanageable, and at half-past 3 o'clock, when I gave the signal, only one of the gunboats was ready to open fire, and the steamers were still far from the landing place.

After shelling the enemy's works for an hour and a half—the day being now far advanced, and there being little prospect of the remainder of the gunboats getting into position, or of the steamers reaching the landing place—I gave the orders for the assault.

The whole line of skirmishers and supports rushed eagerly down the slope of the hill, and advanced towards the entrenchment at as rapid a pace as the rugged and uneven nature of the intervening ground would admit, exposed the whole time to a destructive fire from the enemy. The skirmishers of the 65th Regiment having approached to within 50 yards of the entrenchment and the scaling ladders having been quickly planted under cover of their fire, the skirmishers and the ladder party followed by the support, mounted the parapet, and forced their way over the enemy's first line, then wheeling to the left and charging up the hill, they carried the second line of rifle pits and continued to drive the enemy before them until their progress was checked by a deadly fire opened upon them from the centre redoubt, which the enemy appeared determined to defend to the last.

The remainder of the troops on the left, finding it impossible to penetrate the enemy's position on that side, joined the attack on the right, and with the 65th Regiment occupied positions round the central redoubt, almost completely enveloping the enemy.

Soon after the 65th had passed the main line of entrenchment, I had the satisfaction of seeing the 40th Regiment landing from the "Pioneer" and "Avon," not far from the spot I had selected. Colonel Leslie, without waiting for the companies to form, directed Captain Clarke to take the first 50 men who were landed, and attack the ridge in rear of the enemy's position, whilst he moved with 100 men round its base, for the purpose of intercepting the enemy. The ridge was carried at once, and a great number of the enemy were killed or drowned in endeavouring to escape across the swamp of Lake Waikare. A portion of the 65th Regiment, after passing the main line of entrenchment, joined the 40th in this attack.

Leaving a detachment to occupy the ridge, Colonel Leslie, with the remainder of his regiment, joined the force engaged at the central redoubt.

This work the enemy continued to defend with great tenacity and resolution. I ordered two successive assaults to be made on it, the first by the Royal Artillery, armed with revolvers, and led by Captain Mercer; the second by 90 men of the Royal Navy, armed in a similar manner, and led by Commander Mayne, under the personal direction of Commodore Sir William Wiseman. Both assaults were made with great gallantry, but the formidable nature of the work, and the deadly fire directed on the assailants, rendered it impossible for them to effect an entrance. An attempt was afterwards made by a party of seamen, under Commander Philimore, H.M.S. "Curaçoa," to dislodge the enemy from the work by hand grenades, but without success.

It being now dark, I resolved to postpone further operations until daylight, ordering the troops to remain during the night in the several positions they had gained.

At daybreak Colonel Mould, C.B., Commanding Royal Engineer, suggested that a breach should be made in the redoubt by labour with the pick and shovel, and this operation was in progress when at about six o'clock the enemy hoisted a white flag, and 183 men surrendered unconditionally, and laid down their arms.

I enclose a list of our casualties.

Our loss has been severe, but not greater than was to be expected in attacking so formidable a position. The proportion of officers is large, most of them who led in the different attacks having been killed or severely wounded.

I deeply deplore, in common with all under my command, the loss the service has sustained in the death of Captain Mercer, Commanding Royal Artillery in this colony, who died from the effects of the wound he received whilst gallantly leading his men to the assault on the redoubt. I regard it as a serious misfortune that the force should be deprived at such a moment of the services of so able and energetic an officer.

The loss of the enemy must have been very heavy. We found 41 bodies in and about the works, and a great many were shot or drowned in their flight across the swamp. They must have removed their wounded during the night, as none were found among the prisoners.

I have been unable to ascertain the exact strength of the enemy at the commencement of the attack, but I think it could not have been less than 700.

I have every reason to be satisfied with the conduct of the whole of the troops engaged on this occasion. The 65th Regiment, under Colonel Wyatt, C.B., and the detachment Royal Engineers, under Captain Brooke, particularly distinguished themselves by the impetuosity of their attack on the left of the enemy's position, and were most gallantly led by their officers, amongst whom Captain Gresson and Lieutenant Talbot, with the skirmishers, and Lieutenant Toker, with the ladder party, were most conspicuous; also Lieutenant and Adjutant Lewis, 65th Regiment, who collecting a handful of men of his regiment together gallantly led them against the redoubt, and was severely wounded in the attempt.

The rapid and spirited manner in which the 40th Regiment, under Colonel Leslie, attacked and carried the ridge in rear of the position, reflects great credit on that corps.

The Royal Artillery displayed great daring and intrepidity in the assault on the central redoubt;

Serjeant-Major Hamilton, and other non-commissioned officers and men standing on the top of the parapet and discharging their revolvers into the work.

Captain Brooke, R.E., was most active throughout the engagement, and after the assault by the Royal Artillery on the redoubt this officer, with the assistance of Lieutenant Pickard, Royal Artillery, and men of the Royal Engineers, succeeded in masking with planks and earth a narrow opening in the parapet of the redoubt, through which the enemy kept up a deadly fire, and prevented the wounded who were lying close to the work, from being removed, amongst them Captain Mercer, R.A., Assistant-Surgeon Temple, R.A., here performed an act of courage and devotion to his duty worthy of record, by passing this opening for the purpose of attending the wounded, although the extreme danger of his doing so was pointed out to him, every man but one (Lieutenant Pickard) who had previously attempted to cross having been killed or wounded.

I am much indebted to the Commanding Officers of the various corps and detachments for the manner in which they carried out my instructions, and particularly to Colonel Mould, C.B., for his valuable advice and assistance.

I beg to bring to your Lordship's special notice the invaluable assistance afforded me by the Officers of the General Staff, Lieutenant-Colonel Carey, C.B., Deputy-Adjutant-General, Lieutenant-Colonel Gamble, Deputy-Quartermaster-General, and Lieutenant Colonel Sir Henry Havelock, Deputy-Assistant Quartermaster-General, and also by my two Aides-de-Camp, Major McNeil and Lieutenant S. Hill.

Deputy-Inspector-General Mouat, C.B., Principal Medical Officer, was in the field, and under his superintendence the wounded were promptly attended to, and carefully conveyed on board the steamers.

I cannot conclude this despatch without drawing your Lordship's attention to the part taken by the Royal Navy in this engagement, for the success of which I am greatly indebted to the cordial co-operation of Sir William Wiseman, and to the zeal and gallantry of the officers and men under his command.

I beg to mention the names of Commander Mayne, Her Majesty's ship "Eclipse," and Lieutenant Alexander, Her Majesty's ship "Curaçoa," who particularly distinguished themselves, the former in the assault which he led on the redoubt, and the latter in the first attack on the enemy's left, in which he joined with the greater part of his detachment. Both officers were severely wounded, as were also Lieutenant Downes, Her Majesty's ship "Miranda," and Lieutenant Hotham, Her Majesty's ship "Curaçoa," who were prominent in the assault on the redoubt.

Captain Lacy, commanding her Majesty's ship "Himalaya," accompanied me in the march to Rangiriri, and was present during the whole of the engagement.
