To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Bishop and Clergy of the Diocess of St. Davids,

fed lately to declare, That Your Majesty will protect and maintain Your Archbishops, Bishops and Clergy, and all other Your Subjects of the Church of England, in the fiee Exercise of their Religion as by Law established; and in the quiet and full Enjoyment of their Possession, without any Molestation or Disturbance whatsoever: We cannot but think our selves obliged in Duty and Gratitude, to return Your Majesty our brarty Thanks for these gracious Expressions of Your Kindness; and for all The former Assurances of Your Royal Favors to the Church of England, and humbly to exp ess our Lovalty, as becomes the True Sons of the Church of England, and

Your Majesties most Obedient and Dutiful Subjects and Servants.

Venice, Sept. 26. There has been some Reports spread by the Malters of Vessels of the taking of Castlenovo, but these are look'd upon only as good Wilhes, but yesterday arrived here a Felucca with Letters from General Carnaro of the 19 h Instant, giving an account that the Lines of Circumvallation were sinished the Trenches open'd, some Batterics raised, and that the Approaches went on well. That they had intercepted a Letter from the Basia of Arcezovina, exhorting the Besieged to a vigorous Defence, to manage their Sallies, and not expose their Men too rashly, that he was marching to their Relief with 4000 Men; whereupon Orders were given to the Commanders of the Popes and Malta Gallies to have a watchful Eye upon the Enemies motions, who sending out some Parties, they returned again to their Posts, without having made any Disoveries of them; but they were no looner retired, but the Turks, who had marched close along a Valley appeared, and attacked an advanced Post desended by some Troops of Cattaro and Montenegro, who were not strong enough to bear their Assault, and they had like, in the same hear, to have carried a second, where were stalians under the Command of Colonel Pessini, who was shot in the Face, but that they were seasonably assisted by the Albanese and Sclavonians, who stopt their Fury, and the Son of General's Paul getting himself ready to fall on them on their slank, gave time to those of Cattaro and Montenegro to rally again, so that setting upon them with an united litenath, they put them to Flight, killing several, and taking many Prisoners, she Basia himself, who was with 500 men in the Rear to support those that were engaged, seeing them running, he went away with the foremost. In this Action was killed an Aga Brother to the Basia of Scurari, with some other Officers of Note, and the Basia of Bossian was said to be wounded. There was brought back to the General 300 Heads of the slain, for which he paid as many Sequins, to be distributed to rhose that killed them, and then caused them too b

Journey.

Vienna, Sept. 28. By Letters from the Imperial Army of the 19th Instant, we understand that they were half way on their march between Zolnocke and Segedin. Some Regiments had suffer'd very much for want of ne-cessary Provisions, and the remainder of the way being through an unhospitable Countrey, the Duke of Lorrain bad endeavor'd to mitigate the fense of their present fra conveniencies by an affurance that at Zolnocke they should meet with a Supply of all they wanted. Here runs a Report that the Grand Visier and Aga of the Janizaries had been strangled in a Mu i wof the Soldiers, as a Sacrifice to so many of their Companions that had been dest. oyed by their unadvised passing the Drave, and that as soon as the Execution was over, there came an Order from the Grand Signior for the same purpose; but it seems rather to be grounded on the practice of a barbarous People who have been too apt to misplace their Rage, than that there is any foundation for it in Fact. It is faid that General Dunewaldt intended to put a Garifon into Budchin, which is a place of great natural strength, being accessible only on one side, which with a little cost and pains in making a regular Work, (which the Turks are generally neglectful of ) may be rendred impregnable, and it is scituate between the Fort of St. George and Verovitza conveniently to obstruct the ordinary passage to Zygeth; what Greeks and Valachians were found here in Arms, are now put to ferve among the Hungarians. We hear that the Garison of Agrid had made an unsuccessful Sally of the 15th Instant, wherein they had 100. of their Men killed, and 65 taken Prisoners: And that 400 of the Garifon of Segedin had laid an Ambuscade for those of Gyula, by sending part of their Number to drive away their Cattle, who being pursued as they wished to the place where they were expected, they cut them all off to the Number of 400, excepting the Commander with fome few others, whom they ranfomed for 7000 Ducats, besides 700 Hungarian Vests, 200 Furr'd Caps, and 700 pair of Hungarian Boots.

Ratisbonne, Sept. 26. The final Decree of the Empire is now passed concerning the granting the 100 Reman Months to the Emperor, which was demanded in March last for the support of the War against the Turks. The consent of two of the Colledges, viz. the Electors and Princes was obtain'd the 13th Instant without any Referve, the greatest difficulties arose from the third Colledge of the free Imperial Cities, which held the matter in suspense till the 22d Instant, and at last gave but a partial Confent. Some complained that this was now grown an unequal I nposition, for there were places that lay under a great abatement in their wealth and substance by a decrease of Trade and People, who yet found none in this Tax, but were chargeable to the heightn of their happier Circumstances, which must necessarily help on their utter decay; That many of them had made Levies both of Horse and Foot, which they had sent every year to the Emperor's Service, and had been at the Expense of providing Quarters for them in the Winter, and sending the nout Compleat again in the Spring; which

as it was a feasonable Relief to the Emperor, so it had been chargeable to themselves; and for their encouragement to undertake it, it had been declared that it should be consider'd as part of their Quota in the next publick Tax, and therefore they infifted that it should be inserted in the Conclusions that regard was to be had to the asfistance they had already given the Emperor, and that they were still ready to do it, in contributing, according to their Abilities, to the Subsidy now granted, and it was allow'd so to pass, to put a Period to this long Debate. There is lately passed through this place a Deputy from the Circle of Suabia, who is gone to Vienna, to make the Emperor the Compliment that their Troops shall continue in Hungary, or such Quarters as his Imperial Majesty shall please to assign them, if he thinks it more for his Service that they should not return home this Season. We are told that the Chianx arrived at Buda is furnished with ample Powers to make Offers of a large Extent in order to procure a Peace. In consideration whereof the Turks (it is faid) will be contented to deliver up all Hungary and Sclavomia, but if it be a doubt whether they are to free in their Proflers, it is none that the Emperor is already confidering how to have an Army in the Field next Spring fulfacient to force those Provinces out of their possession, to which end he has already begun to treat with some of the Princes for certain Numbers of Men to be fent for thwich to winter in the Hereditary Countries, that there may be no loss of time when there ikall be occasion to use them.

The Conferences about the Hamburgh, Sept. 30. Differences between the King of Demmark and Duke of Holpen, as they have been much pressed, so it is now faid that they are at lath really intended, and that the time and place appointed for them is at Altena toward the end of the next month, in order to which the Electors of Brandenburgh and Saxony have nominated their Commissioners, and it is expected the King of Denmark will do the like upon his return to Copenhagen. They write from Berlin, that the Sieur Hope, Envoy from the States of the United Provinces to the Elector of Brandenburgh, is in great credit and eliteem there; that he has been very industrious to clear up the misunderstandings that have given any occasion why the Electoral Prince should keep thus long at such a distance, and it is faid he is undertaking a Journey to Cassells where the Prince resides, to lay before him the Reasons that he can fuggest to him for his return to Berlin. Letters from the Polish Camp of the 5th Instant, make mention that Prince Faceb had been before Caminiec with the Army, but by the account of what was done there, it might pass rather as a Salute, than as an Attack, there having been only feveral Shot exchanged during the space of two days, without any confiderable damage on either fide, at the end of which time upon the report of Sultan Nuradin, Brother to the ham of Tartary, his approaching with a Reinforcement of the Ottoman Troops commanded by the Serasquier, the Polish Army, by the advice of the four Generals intiusted with the care of it under the Prince, retired to the Bridges they had prepared for their paffage over the Niefter, where they made a Stand, to confider what Resolutions they should next take, upon observation of the Enemies motions: But the Season as it is now advane'd is not like to admit of any great Undertaking, howfoever they may be well intention'd towards it. They write from Kiovia, that General Galitzen carrying with him to Moscow, Samueloutz the chief Commander of the Coffacks with his Son, there to answer his Treachery, in holding a fecret Intelligence with the Enemy, and discovering to them all that passed in the Army, had in the thean time placed at the Head of those Troops the Sieur Mareppa, a Person of great Reputation for his Valor and Conduct, who has Orders to continue on the Borysthenes, to hinder the Tartars from pading that River to enter in-to Poland that way. We are told of a double Marriage to be between the two Electoral Houses of B waria and the Palitinate, the younger Brother of the Elector of Bavares being to marry the Princels Marsana of N-wbur, and Prince Charles the second Son of the Elector

Palatine to marry a Sifter of the Elector of Bavaria, to whom it is fald that his Father defigns the Dutchy of New-
