which divides the said plantation called Coppies at Bloxham Lodge, and the close called Dog Kennel Meadow, and numbered 672 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, and the plantation called Bloxham Coppice, and numbered 667 upon the same maps, from that portion of the same down, which is numbered 681 as aforesaid, and from the plantation called Bloxham Lands, and numbered 682 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, and from the plantation forming part of that portion of the close called Bloxham Mead, which is numbered 665 upon the same maps, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the lastdescribed fence as far as the point at the extremity of the same fence, where such fence meets the fence dividing that portion of the close called Bloxham Mead as aforesaid, which is numbered 664 on the said two first-mentioned maps, from the plantation called Bloxham Coppice, and numbered 667 as aforesaid, and extending thence first generally north-westward along the middle of the last-named fence, and then north-eastward along the middle of the fence dividing the said last-named portion of the said close called Bloxham Mead, from the close called 'Adjoining Well Meadow,' and numbered 663 upon the said two first-mentioned maps as far as a point in the middle of the fence dividing the closes called 'Adjoining Well Meadow' and 'Adjoining Well Meadow' and numbered 662 and 661 upon the same maps from the aforesaid first-named close called also 'Adjoining Well Meadow,' and numbered 663 as aforesaid, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last described fence as far as a point in the middle of the before-mentioned road leading from Crofton Lane aforesaid to Bloxham Lodge and to Stock Common, such point being opposite to the middle of the north-western extremity of the said last described fence, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the same road to its northeastern extremity, and continuing thence in a direct line north-eastward across Stock Common aforesaid to a boundary stone inscribed '2 S. F. St. K. C. C. 1863,' and placed on the western side of the fence forming the eastern boundary of and dividing Stock Common from a certain garden now in the joint occupation of Henry Bartholomew, junior, and Sarah Smart, widow, opposite to the point in such fence where the boundary which formerly divided the enclosure (now part of the said garden) numbered 303 on the said two first mentioned maps, from the enclosure (now as to a portion of it part of the same garden) numbered 304 on the same maps, commenced and extending thence eastward across the said garden along the line of the said old boundary to a point in the middle of the fence dividing the close called Davis's Ground, and numbered 301 upon the said two first mentioned maps, from the aforesaid garden and from the close called the Three Cornered Ground and Roadway, and numbered 275 on the same maps, and extending thence first northward along the middle of the last described fence, and then eastward along the middle of the same fence to its junction with the fence dividing the close called the Long Ground, and numbered 295 upon the said two first-mentioned maps from the close called Three Cornered Ground and Roadway as aforesaid, and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named fence to its junction with the fence dividing the said close called the Long-Ground from the close called Woody Cow Leys and Brake, and numbered 288 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, and extending thence southeastward along the middle of the said last described fence for a distance of 205 yards (little more or less) to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed '3. S. F. St. K. C. C. 1863,' and placed extending thence north-eastward along the middle

on the northern side of the same fence, and extending thence north-eastward to such boundary stone, and continuing thence in a direct line north-eastward across the close called Cow Leys, and numbered 289 upon the said two first mentioned maps, to a boundary stone inscribed '4. S. F. St. K. C. C. 1863,' and placed at or near the junction of the fence forming the northern boundary of the last named close with the fence dividing the close called Hill Ground, and numbered 282 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, from the wood called Stock Gulley Wood, and numbered 284 upon the same maps, and extending thence northward to and along the middle of the last-described fence and of the fence dividing the said last-named close and the close called Munday's Ground, and numbered 280 upon the said two first mentioned maps, from the close called Great Mead, and numbered 279 upon the same maps, to a point in the middle of the road leading from Great Bedwyn to Marl-. borough opposite to a boundary stone inscribed '5. S. F. St. K. C. C. 1863,' and placed on the southern side of the said road in the middle of the northern extremity of the said fence dividing Munday's Ground from Great Mead as aforesaid, and extending thence westward along the middle of the last described road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the southern end of the droveway called Buttridge's Green, and numbered 226 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, and extending thence northward to and along the middle of such droyeway, as far as a point in the middle of the fence dividing the same droveway from the close called Bushel Leys, or more commonly Rushey Leys, and numbered 220 upon the said two first mentioned maps (including that portion of the same close called Five Acre Border, and numbered 230 upon the same maps), and extending thence westward along the middle of the lastdescribed fence to its junction with the fence dividing Five Acre Border and Bushel Leys or Rushey Leys aforesaid, from the closes called respectively Five Acre Robinson and Oat Leys or Bear Field, and from the plantation called Faggothy Coppice (which several closes and plantation are respectively numbered 229, 231, and 233 upon the said two first-mentioned maps) and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-described fence to its junction with the fence dividing the said close called Bushel Leys or Rushey Leys from the close called Bewley Field, and numbered 235 upon the said two first-mentioned maps; and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last described fence for a distance of seventy-four yards, or thereabouts, as far as a boundary stone inscribed ' 5A S. F. St. K. C. C. 1863,' and placed in the middle of such fence at the point where the same fence meets the fence dividing the said close called Rushey Leys from the droveway numbered 208 upon the said two first-mentioned maps, and extending thence northeastward across such droveway to a point in the middle of the southern end of the fence dividing the plantation called Bewley Coppice, and numbered 207 upon the same maps, from the said close called Bewley Field, and continuing thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-described fence to a point on the boundary dividing the said parish of Great Bedwyn from the said parish of Little Bedwyn, which point is situate at or near to the middle of the north-eastern extremity of the same last-described fence, and is opposite to a boundary stone inscribed '6. S. F. St. K. C. C. 1863,' and placed in the northeastern angle of the said close called Bewley Field, and extending thence first westward and then
