notice of the intention to make such representation, shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representations, has made representations, stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials shall be discontinued therein:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the third day of February last, to give notice of such representations, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twenty-second day of March last, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued (except as is herein otherwise directed), as follows; viz.:

WEMBLEY.—Forthwith wholly in the church of St. John, and in the churchyard, except so far as may be compatible with the following regulations: That, with the exception of now existing family vaults and graves, the burials be restricted to the bodies of persons dying within the ecclesiastical parish of St. John, Wembley: that burials be conducted in accordance with Nos. 1, 3, 5, 6, 7, and 8, of the official regulations for new burial-grounds, and that no grave or vault be excavated to a greater depth than seven and

EAST BARNET.—Forthwith in the church, and, with the exception of now existing family vaults and graves, in all that part of the churchyard which lies to the south of a line drawn along the south side of the church.

BENGEWORTH, -- Forthwith in the church.

GREETLAND, HALIFAX. — Forthwith in the burial-ground of the Wesleyan chapel, except in as far as burials are conducted in accordance with the seventh and eighth official regulations for new burial-grounds.

Ruger.—Forthwith in the new churchyard, except in vaults and walled graves in which each coffin shall be embedded in charcoal, and separately enclosed by concrete, or by masonry or brickwork properly cemented; and except in earthen graves not less than four feet deep, which can be opened without disturbance of human remains, and which are to be used for the burial of the widowers, widows, parents, or unmarried children, of those already buried in the churchyard.

HAWARDEN.—In the churchyard of Broughton on the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, except in graves not less than five feet deep, which are free from water and remains.

CHIPPING SODBURY.—In the church forthwith, and in the churchyard on the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, except in now existing vaults and walled graves, in which each coffin shall be separately enclosed by brickwork and masonry, properly cemented; and except in graves not less than five feet deep, which can be opened without disturbance of entire bones, or exposure of coffins.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the twentieth and twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to order such acts to be done by or under the directions of the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of any vaults or places of burial, for preventing them from becoming or continuing dangerous or injurious to the public health; and that every such Order in Council shall be published in the London Gazette, and that such churchwardens or other persons shall do or cause to be done all acts ordered as aforesaid, and the expenses incurred in and about the doing thereof shall be paid out of the poor rates of the parish: Provided always, that no such representation shall be made until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the churchwardens or other persons, or one of the churchwardens or other persons, having the care of the vaults or places of burial to which the representation relates;

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation having been duly given to the churchwardens or other persons having the care of the vaults and graves in the undermentioned church has made a representation, stating that he is of opinion that, for the purpose of preventing the said vaults and graves from becoming injurious to the public health, an Order should be made for the adoption of the measures which are hereinafter set forth;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the churchwardens or such other persons as may have the care of the said vaults and graves in the undermentioned church do adopt, or cause to be adopted, the following measures, viz:—

That the floor of Oundle Church be forthwith covered with a layer of concrete of such a thickness and of such an extent as will prevent the escape of noxious emanations from the vaults and graves beneath that church.
