## PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in aunouncing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

HEREAS by the 4!0th section of the "Mer-VV chant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that upon the completion of any new lighthouse, buoy, or beacon, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, fix such dues in respect thereof, to be paid by the master or owner of any ship which passes the same, or derives benefit therefrom, as Her Majesty may deem reasonable, and may from time to time alter the amount thereof; and that such dues shall be paid and collected in the same manner, by the same means, and subject to the same conditions, in, by, and subject to, which the light dues authorised to be levied by the said Act, are paid and collected:

And whereas the Port of Dublin Corporation are erecting and about to light a new lighthouse on the Black Rock, lying off Black-sod Bay, county Mayo, West Coast of Ireland:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct, that upon the completion and lighting of the said light, there shall be paid, in respect of the said light, for every vessel, whether British or Foreign, which may pass, or derive benefit from such light, the toll of three sixteenths of a penny per ton of the burthen of every such vessel, for each time of passing or deriving benefit therefrom, if on an oversea voyage; and one sixteenth of a penny per ton for each time of coasting voyage; and that the said tolls, in respect of the said lighthouse, shall be levied by the Port of Dublin Corporation, subject to the gross abatement or discount of sixty per cent., mentioned in an Order in Council, made under the authority of the said Act, and dated the twenty-fifth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one; and subject also to the regulations and exemptions contained in the consolidated tables of light duties sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and to the further exemption sanctioned by an Order in Council, dated the twelfth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty, chapter sixty; of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation for altering the boundaries of the district chapelry of Saint Paul, Clifton, in the county of Gloucester, and in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol.

"Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the twentysecond day of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-fifth day of the same month, a part of the parish of Clifton, in the county and diocese aforesaid, was assigned as a district to the consecrated church of Saint Paul, situate in such parish, and was called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Paul, Clifton.'

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that the boundaries of the said district chapelry of Saint Paul, Clifton, should be altered as hereinafter mentioned.
