(No. 15.)—MEDITERRANEAN—ISLAND OF CYPRUS.

Red Light on Cape Kiti.

THE Turkish Government has given notice, that on and after the 15th day of March, 1864, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected at Cape Kiti, on the south side of the island of Cyprus.

The light is a *fixed red* light, placed at an elevation of 92 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather at a distance of 6 miles.

The tower stands about 90 yards from the extremity of the cape, at 6 miles southward of the town of Larnaka, in lat. $34^{\circ} 49' N.$, long. $33^{\circ} 36' 50'' E.$ of Greenwich.

COAST OF KARAMANIA.

Red Lights at Mersina.

Also, that on and after the 20th day of March, 1864, two lights would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected at Mersina or Mersyn, on the coast of Karamania.

The lights are *fixed red* lights, placed vertically; the upper light is 49 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen at a distance of 5 miles.

The tower stands at about half a mile to the south-west of Mersina, and said to be in lat. $36^{\circ} 45' 50'' N.$, long. $34^{\circ} 40' 40'' E.$ of Greenwich, or about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south and $2\frac{1}{4}$ east of that of the Admiralty Charts.

COAST OF SYRIA.

Red Light at Tripoli.

Also, that on and after the 25th day of March, 1864, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Ramkine islet, off Tripoli, on the coast of Syria.

The light is a *fixed red* light, at an elevation of 56 feet above the mean level of the sea. It is seen all round the horizon, and visible from a distance of 5 miles.

The tower stands on the highest part of Ramkine islet, at the outer extremity of the chain of islets and rocks forming Tripoli roadstead, in lat. $34^{\circ} 30' N.$, long. $34^{\circ} 45' E.$ of Greenwich.
