

end of the West Hinder Bank, off the coast of Belgium.

The light is on the *revolving* principle, showing successively *two* white lights and *one* red light, at intervals of *half a minute*. It is elevated 40 feet above the level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 12 miles.

The vessel, having a skeleton framework in the form of a pyramid at the masthead, is painted black with red streaks, and *West Hinder* in large white letters on her sides, and lies in 17 fathoms at low-water springs, hard gray sand, at about 7 cables from the south end of the bank.

Nieuport lighthouse bears S. by E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E., distant 18 miles; Dunkerque lighthouse S.S.W. $\frac{3}{8}$ W., $19\frac{1}{2}$ miles; Red buoy on the north-east end of East Dyck bank S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles; South Foreland lighthouses west southerly, $42\frac{1}{2}$ miles; Galloper light vessel N.N.W. northerly, $29\frac{1}{2}$ miles; North Hinder light vessel N.E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. northerly, $15\frac{1}{2}$ miles; Ostende lighthouse S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., nearly $20\frac{1}{2}$ miles; and the outer buoy at the entrance to the Wielingen Channel E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. nearly 25 miles. The vessel is in lat. $51^{\circ} 22' 30''$ N., long. $2^{\circ} 26' 26''$ East of Greenwich.

The black buoy at about 2 cables W.N.W. of the light vessel still remains.

(No. 19.) MEDITERRANEAN—COAST OF SYRIA.

Fixed Lights at Alexandretta.

THE Turkish Government has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of April, 1864, two lights would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on the point west of Alexandretta, in the Gulf of Iskanderun, coast of Syria.

The lights are two *fixed* white lights, placed vertically; the upper light is 49 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 5 miles.

The tower stands about 22 yards from the extremity of the point, in lat. $36^{\circ} 35' 30''$ N., long. $36^{\circ} 9' 5''$ East of Greenwich.

Red Light at Latakiah.

Also, that on and after the 15th day of April, 1864, a light would be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected at Latakiah, on the coast of Syria.

The light is a *fixed red* light, at an elevation of 49 feet above the level of the sea, and should be seen at a distance of 4 miles.

The tower stands on the north part of the old castle, at the left side of entrance to the ancient port, in lat. $35^{\circ} 31' 10''$ N., long. $35^{\circ} 45' 35''$ East of Greenwich.

Fixed Lights at Haifa or Khaifa.

Also, that on and after the 25th day of April, 1864, two lights would be exhibited from a light-

house recently erected at Haifa or Khaifa, on the coast of Syria.

The lights are two *fixed* white lights placed vertically; the upper light is 66 feet above the mean level of the sea, and should be seen at a distance of 5 miles.

The tower stands on the old castle, to the right of the Sanitaire, in lat. $32^{\circ} 49' 12''$ N., long. $35^{\circ} 0'$ East of Greenwich.
