The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Nicholas, Plumstead, being :-

"All that part of the parish of Plumstead, in the county of Kent, and in the diocese of London, which is comprised within, and is bounded by, an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides such parish from the parish of Erith, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the line of the North Kent Railway; and extending thence, westward, along the middle of the said line of railway, as far as a point under the centre of the bridge which carries the Plumstead-road over such line of railway; and extending thence, north-westward, along the middle of the said road, as far as a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of Maxeyroad; and extending thence first southward to and along the middle of the last named road, and then south-westward along the middle of the same road (crossing over the line of the North Kent Railway aforesaid) as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of the road or street called "Swetenham Place;" and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the last-named road or street, to its junction with Pattison-road; and extending thence south-westward for a distance of thirty-nine yards or thereabouts along the middle of the lastnamed road to a point opposite to the middle of the western end of a certain passage leading to Hudson Road, the said western end of which passage is situate between the houses on the eastern side of Pattison-road aforesaid, which are respectively distinguished by the Numbers 67 and 69, and are numbered accordingly upon the map hereunto annexed; and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the said passage to its junction with Hudson-road aforesaid; and continuing thence in a direct line still south-eastward across the northern end of the lastnamed road to a point in the middle of Vicarageroad; and extending thence southward along the middle of the last-named road as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of Rose-street; and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of such street to its junction with Park road; and continuing thence first south-eastward and then southward along the middle of the last-named road to its junction with a certain road leading across Plumstead-common towards the cottages called 'The Slade;' and extending thence south eastward along the middle of the last-described road to its junction with Plumstead-common-road; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the lastnamed road for a distance of one hundred and thirty-two yards or thereabouts to a point opposite to the middle of the northern end of Hopgood'slane, otherwise called 'Timber Croft-lane;' and extending thence first southward to and along the middle of the last-named lane, and then southeastward along the middle of the same lane as far as a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of the footpath leading from the said lane across the close numbered 931, upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Plumstead, and upon the said map hereunto annexed into the road numbered 1090, upon the same maps; and continuing thence still south-eastward to and along the middle of the said footpath to its junction with the road numbered 1090, as aforesaid; and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the road last referred to for a distance of one hundred and three yards, or thereabouts, to

a point opposite to the middle of the north-western end of a certain lane leading past the southern side of Woolwich Cemetery to East Wickham; and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the last described lane as far as the boundary dividing the said parish of Plumstead from the parish of East Wickham, in the county and diocese aforesaid; and extending thence south-eastward or north-eastward along the said boundary to its junction with the boundary dividing the parish of Plumstead from the parish of Erith, as aforesaid; and extending thence northward along the boundary last referred to as far as the point in the middle of the line of the North Kent Railway, where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourteenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorising the sale and disposal of certain property formerly belonging to the Prebend of Saint Margaret's, Leicester, in the Cathedral Church of Lincoln, and now vested in us.

"Whereas under an Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and thirteen; and another Act of the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign; chapter thirty-nine; and by virtue of an Order of your Majesty in Council made under the provisions of the same Acts, bearing date the twelfth day of September, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three; and duly published in the London Gazette on the fifteenth day of the same month, all lunds, tithes, and other hereditaments, whatsoever then belonging to the said Prebend (except rights of patronage), became absolutely vested in us, for the purposes, and subject to the provisions applicable to other hereditaments vested in us.

"And whereas our estate in the lands, tithes, and hereditaments aforesaid consists of reversions
