

## MEMORANDUM.

Her Majesty has been pleased to dispense with the services of Captain George Thomson in the 3rd Aberdeenshire Artillery Volunteer Corps. Dated 5th September, 1864.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the registration for Marriage of a building named the Catholic Chapel, situate in Duncombe-street, formerly named Little Blake-street, in the parish of Saint Wilfred, in the city of York, in the district of York, which was a building licensed and used for public religious worship as a Roman Catholic Chapel exclusively, and which was duly registered for solemnizing marriages therein, pursuant to the Act 6 and 7 William 4, cap. 85, on the 27th day of October, 1837, was cancelled on the 5th day of September, 1864, and on the same day another building named Saint Wilfred's Church, situate as aforesaid, now used for the purpose of religious worship, instead of the building before mentioned, and which last-named building is a separate building, and was, on the 29th day of August, 1864, certified according to law as a place of meeting for religious worship to the Registrar-General of Births, Deaths, and Marriages, in England, was duly registered for solemnizing marriages therein in its stead.—Witness my hand this 12th day of September, 1864.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

CORK LIGHTHOUSE, ROCHE'S POINT, SOUTH COAST OF IRELAND.

*Change of Light, and Additional Light to mark position of Daunt's Rock.*

Ballast Office, Dublin,

September 1, 1864.

NOTICE is hereby given, that on the evening of the 1st of October, 1864, a fixed White Light will be exhibited from the Base of the Cork Lighthouse Tower (Roche's Point), and continued thenceforth from sunset to sunrise. This light will show to seaward, between the bearings of S.W. by W. and S.W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., or between Robert's Head and a distance of half a mile to the eastward of Daunt's Rock.

Mariners are cautioned, when approaching Cork Harbour by night, to keep to the eastward of the limits of the White Light, as described above, until they have passed Daunt's Rock.

*Change of Light.*

Notice is also given, that the fixed light now exhibited from the Lantern of the Cork Lighthouse (Roche's Point) will, on and after the evening of the 1st of December, 1864, be changed to a Red Revolving Light, showing its greatest brilliancy once in every minute.

*Fog Bell.*

A Fog Bell has also been erected at Roche's Point, which will in future be sounded eight times in a minute during thick or foggy weather.

Bearings are Magnetic. Variation 25° 10' W.
