Falmouth, Jan. 29.

Bfterday arrived here the Moufes of Amfterdam, laden with Bcandy from Breit, with four or five other Ships in her company., from leveral Ports of France; the fame day put in here the St. Tho., mas of St. Schaftian, in four dayes from that place; having aboard her three hundred fouldiers, intend,

ing for Oftend. I This day arrived the Fofeph and Benjamin of Landon in fix weeks from the Barba dos, where the left all things in a quiet pofture, and Sir Fohn Harman, with his Squadron cleaning and victualling their Ships. This day alfo put in here an Oftend Man of War, with a French Prize of confiderable value s laden with Whale Oil and Anchors, intended for the Franch Floet. Seve al other Prizes taken by the impe Oftender, were by firels of weather [eperated, and as yet no fatther news of them.

Piymouth, Jan. 21. On Sunday in the Evening put into this Port between to and 40 Sail of Swedes, Datch, and Danish Merchants. Yellerday arrived a small Vessal from Rochelle, laden with Wines and Salt, and this day a Ship from New Haven, belonging to Barmick i bound for Rochelle.

Harwich, Jan. 23: On Fuelday last arrived here two Ships from Retterdam, laden with Rhenish wines, in tending for London. We have here confirmed the news of the death of the young Imperial Prince at Virana, to the great forrow of that Court, and of the fudden death of the Marquils de Cascene at Madrid. Letters from Bruffels advile us likewile of the deceale of the Duke of Lorain, of which we expect farther news; and that Don Fuan bring now fully refolved to take upon him the Government of the Countreys may in little time begin his voyage hither.

From Handburgh we are from a goodhand informed, that on the 17th inftant paffed by that City a Courrier from Stockholm, intending for Vienna, with a Treaty of a League concluded between His Imperial Majefty and the Crown of Sweden, but the particulars thereof not yet fully known.

Whitehall, Jan. 25. Here is lately arrived from His Molt Chrittian Majefty a Circulatory Letter fent to all the Princes and Potentates concerned in the Mediation for an Accommodation between the two Crowns, giving an Account of that Kings Refolution to march the first of the next Month, at the Head of his Army, into Framche Comte, where he intends to make himself Master of the most considerable Posts of that Countrey; giving alfo an Account of the Motives inducing him to this Design, to this effect:

The first, was, By this Expedition (if successful) to dispose the Spaniards to a Peace, wherein, he fayes, they have bitherto flown so invincible an Aversion, that they have let slip five of seven Months, intended for that Work of that though the Marquis de Castel Rodrigo as a Plenipotennary, had made choice of Aix la Chap-

pelle for a place of Treaty, yet their Ambaffadour at Rome declared they would never treat but either at Rome, Venice, or the Pyreneans. The fecond Motive was, That the Spanish Ambaffadour at Vienna, having by his Solicitations drawn the Emperour not onely to make New Levies, but to defign an Army to march the next Spring into the Dutchy of Burgundy, to divert the French Forces from the Neatherlands; he was in Prudence and Pol cy obliged to prevent this Evil, by endeavouring to take in those Posts before the coming in of the good weather, to fhur up the Passage into the Dutchy of Burgundy, and to prevent their Defign of attacquing him in those Parts. A third and an Accessory Motive. but of less force than the two former, was, To let the Governour of the Spanish Neatherlands, fee by the fuccefs of the French Armes, how much the King his Mafter may fuffer by the Marquiffes not closing with him for a Reciprocal Sufpenfion of Armes till March, which was with much fincerity offered by his Most Christian Majesty, In the mean time affuring the World, and convincing the faid Marquils, that he has no Defign by this Expedition to put any Obstacle to the Peace by pretending to higher or more advantageous Gonditions that what he was contented to have accepted till the end of March ; which were, That the Spaniards' fhould in good form give up those Conquests made on them in three Months of the last Campagne, or else an Equivalent for them, profeffing to draw no other fruit from this Expedition (if the Spaniards will take the benew fit of his good Intentions) than to difpole them. by this effectual means for a Peace.
