WE, your Majesties most Dutiful Subjects, having a real Sense of your great Grace to all your Subjects, by your late most Gracious Declaration for Liberty of Conscience, we think it our Duty to return your Majesty our most hearty Thanks for your Favour and Care extended therein to all your Majesties Subjects, and by which we may Enjoy freely, and with all imaginable Security, our Religion and Properties. And we humbly crave leave to assure your Majesty, that as we shall always pray for your Majesties long and happy Reign, so we shall upon all Occasions express that Duty and Zeal for your Majesties Service, which becomes good Subjects to do towards so Gracious a Prince.

WE, Your Majesties most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, being highly sensible of the repeated Instances of Your Majesties Grace and Favour to Your Subjects, and particularly that of Your Majesties late Royal and Gracious Declaration, whereby Your Majesty hath been pleased to express Your Princely Resolution, of Maintaining all Your Subjects in the full Possession of their Rights and Properties, do with all Humility present Your Sacred Majesty with these our most hearty and unfeigned Thanks for the same, and all other Your Royal Bounties conferred upon us, and other Your Majesties Subjects: And as by Duty we are obliged, so by Inclination we choose, humbly to assure Your Majesty of our constant Fidelity to Your most Sacred Person and Government; and of our utmost Efforts (even of our Lives and Fortunes) to make the remainder of Your Majesties Glorious Government, as Pleasant, and as Easy, to Your most Sacred Majesty, as the beginning of it hath been Auspicious and happy to Your People. And that Your Majesties Reign over us may be Long and Prosperous, are, and shall be the constant Prayers of us, Your Majesties most Dutiful and Obedient Subjects. In Testimony whereof, we have caused our Common Seal to be hereunto affixed this 26th Day of October, in the Third Year of Your Majesties most Glorious Reign.

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Adreff of the Guild or Brothethood of Masters and Pilots, Seamen of the Trinity-hoife in Kingston upon Hull.

WE, your Majesties most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, having had as deep a Sense as others of your Royal Clemency and Goodness, manifested by your Gracious Declaration which hath influenced the whole Kingdom, such, that it hath not only given encouragement to all your Majesties Faithful Subjects, to follow their several Callings both by Sea and Land with Alacrity, but also a fresh Occasion to bless God that we are fallen under your Majesties happy Government. Yet considering the smallness of this Fraternity, made us thus hitherto we durst not presume to interrupt your Sacred Majesties most serious Thoughts and Occasions, untill we found your Majesty Graciously pleased to accept the like from many others. And therefore now, Most Dread Sovereign! we do hereby lay our selves and our dearest Concerns at your Majesties Feet, in all humble manner of Thankfulness, praying God to Bless your Majesty with a long and prosperous Reign here, and to Crown you with Eternal Happiness hereafter, &c.

Venna, Octob. 19. Here arrived yesterday a Courier sent from the Duke of Lorraine, with an account that he had at present laid aside the thoughts of making any stop at Great Waradin; that the Army had suffered enough to think of giving them some rest, and he look'd upon the securing a good Country for a Winter-quarter, to be of its great consequence as the taking any one Town could be; and therefore had thought fit to pass towards Transilvania, having sent before to Prince Anst, that he should not be disturbed at the approach of his Army, from which he should receive the least inconvenience that was possible; that he had given Orders for an exact Discipline to be observed amongst his Troops, and he would charge himself with the performance of it. His Highness arrived the 11th Instant at Habalone, the first Town at their Entrance into Transilvania, which made no difficulty to receive a Garison, and there was left there 100 Men of the Regiment of Serini: And the Duke continued his march towards Clausenberg, a considerable Town 7 Leagues further into the Country. Colonel Hussin was returned to the Army, who had been sent to an Assembly of the States of Transilvania at Hermannstat, where he was received very respectfully; and some of their Deputies were sent back with him, by whom, it is believed, not only that satisfaction will be given to his Highness in his present demands of Quarters, but that some Overtures also will be made of a nearer Conjunction with the Emperor, and breaking off all correspondence with the Turks. The Letters from Strassburg mention, That General Dunewald thinking it to be of greater Importance to reduce Zygeth, than to prosecute his Advantages in Sclavonia, and being encouraged to make the Tryal by some Advices he had received, that the Mutiny of the Army and Flight of the Grand Visier, added to their other Misfortunes in all places, had put them out of hopes of defending themselves; and that they were under that Consternation and Dejection, that it was thought that the appearance only of Force was sufficient to make them submit to it; he had thereupon repass'd the Drave, leaving in Garison at Esseck 18 Companies of Foot, and 16 Troops of Horse, under the Command of Count Aspremont, besides a sufficient number at Walpo and Budzin; and the Bridge at Esseck was repaired for the conveniency of a Communication with the places on this side the River. We have no good account how the revolted Army have disposed of themselves under their New General. There is a report that they had quitted Peter Waradin, having first demolished the Works to prevent their falling entire into the Imperialists hands, after the Example of Esseck; but it is said with greater certainty, that the Garisons of Valkowar on the Danube; and Virovitza on the Drave, had deserted those places, and that some others were ready to follow that pattern: The Grand Visier is supposed to be gone away Post for Constantinople; and that Tockeley continues with the Turkish Army. The care of Bombarding Palotta is committed to Baron Beck, Deputy-Governor of Buda, who is now before it with 10000 Men, and an Artillery well provided; and the design is not only upon this place, but upon another also neighboring to Alba Regalis, called Croallio, which two places being possessed by the Imperialists, Alba Regalis will be very much streightned, and many of the Emperor's Subjects tet at their Ease, who

now pay a Contribution to the Turks; the same being his vertue and effect of the Villages as far almost as the Gates of *Riad* and *Com Erbi*. We have had all along hopeful News from *Agza* and *Mograt*; but however they are still in the Enemies hands. We were told there was a discovery lately made of a design to deliver up *Mograt*, and that some were executed for it: But yet the Prince's *Riada* was not out of danger, for since there were those in the place that had begun to hearken to Conditions, if she did not prevent them by *Trooping* her self, they would soon grow weary of an endless piece of patience, without any possibility left of being relieved. The Elector of *Bavaria* parted from hence yesterday in order to his return to *Munich*; but the Elector's rays here yet some few days to recover of an Indisposition she is under.

Vizna, Octob. 23. There are now Letters from the Duke of *Lorraine* of the 12th Instant, which give the Emperor an Account, That the Transylvanian Deputies sent from *Harmansfa*, had been heard as to what they had to propose; which consisted in general Expressions of Respect and Submission to the Emperor, and of an Esteem for his Highness: And that the Prince had taken Care for Provisions and Refreshments of all sorts to be sent them, (which indeed were there in abundance) but being asked what they had to offer concerning the Assignments of Quarters, which was the chief thing expected from them; they waived all that matter, pretending they had no Instructions therein: Whereupon the Duke had thought fit to dispatch to Prince *Abassi*, the Lieutenant-General Count *Seckenberg*, and the Commissary *Falkenbergh*, to intimate to him, That they were not come to for for an Entertainment: That this was not a time, nor an Affair to be dallied in; that what was so necessary for the Emperor's Service, the Duke was desirous to make as easy to them as might be; and if it were otherwise it must be their own fault: The Prince might therefore consider of it as he pleased; In the mean time the Imperial Army was advancing into that County, and they must either find Quarters or make them. The *Sir S. Smith*, who had been sent by the Duke of *Lorraine* with a Body of Horse, to discover whether there were any Troops assembling about *Temeswar*, or elsewhere, to smother to the Assistance of the Transylvanians, was returned, having been almost as low as the Mouth of the *Theiss*, over-against *Begrac*; who reports, that he saw no appearance of any Force to give direction on that side. Here arrived yesterday a Courier from General *Dinnwaldt*, with an Account, that though he had repassed the *Drave*, in order to his march to *Sygeth*, which he undertook upon a suspicion he had that the Enemy was still at *Peter Mepadin*; yet having since received more certain Information, that they had blown up their Works there, and destroy'd their Bridges, and that they had all pass'd the *Sava*, being strengthened by all the Garrison Soldiers between the two Rivers uniting themselves to them, who by content, had burnt or forsaken every place they had the charge of; and that they were on their march towards *Adrianople*, giving out, that they would follow the Grand Viceroy to *Constantinople*, and since their Pay had not been sent them they would fetch it; and if they found the Grand Signior to have no more Consideration for them than the Grand Vicer had shewn; they would pay him no more Respect than they did the other; He then upon a return'd to take Possession of the abandoned Towns, and having put 1000 Men into *Poffiga*, from whence these Letters were written, he was then marching to *Grandis*. He had it to the *Sava* to do the like there. We are told, that there is an Express just now arriv'd with the News that *Paster* is a Capitulat, and was Surrender'd at the Imperialists.

W. repall Octob. 27. This day the Count of *Vallassine*, General of *Berata*, and Lieutenant-General of Dragoons, Envoy from the Governour of *Flandre*, had his Audience of Leave of His Majesty, being conducted by Sir *Charles Cottrel* Master of the Ceremonies.

Adrianople, Octob. 30. Yesterday being the Anniversary Festival of the Prince of the New Lord Mayor upon his Office, Sir *John Sayer*, the present Lord Mayor, went to *W. Minster* by *Water*, with the Pomp and Splendor that is Customary on these Occasions; And being Sworn there before the Barons of the *Exchequer*, he return'd in the same manner to *Black-Fryers* Church, from whence he began his Cavalcade to *Guildhall*, with the usual Solemnities observed in doing Honour to so great a Magistrate. The *Parades*, which make a great part of the Festivity were chiefly design'd to express the Benefits the City enjoys of Peace and Plenty under His Majesties Happy Government, and, particularly, the many Advantages of that Liberty which His Majesty has been pleas'd to graciously to indulge to his Subjects, tho' of different Persuasions: But that which gave the Lustre to that Day, and satisfy'd the Expectations of that infinite Multitude there assembled, was His Majesties Presence in the *City*, who, in Condescension to their humble Desires, was pleas'd to appear at *Guildhall*, whither He went, accompanied by His Royal Highness Prince *George of Denmark*, and attended by the *Chancellor* of the Court, the *Lords* of the Council, the *Barons* of the *Nobility*; The *Queen*, who intended them the Grace and Favour, was prevent'd, by being indispos'd: It

can scarce be properly said, that His Majesty was received by the repeated Acclamations of his People, since it seem'd to be but one continued Cry, which, after a short Entrance into the City at *T. St. Dunstons*, (where He was met by the Two Sheriffs, in a most useful Manner,) till he came to *Guildhall*, where there was an Entertainment prepared, that shew'd the Graceness or the Respect of those who made it, by the Variety and Quantity of the Provisions, and the good Order they were serv'd up in. Amongst other Tables in the Hall, there was one furnish'd for the Foreign Ministers, who were also invited, at which were present the Pope's Nuncio, and the *French* Ambassador; the Whole was Conducted very much to His Majesties Satisfaction, which He was pleas'd thereby to declare. This day the Aldermen and Two Sheriffs, with the Common Serjeant, waited on His Majesty, to return Thanks for the great Honour they had receiv'd, and to beg His Majesty to excuse whatever had been amiss, or unworthy of Him; whom His Majesty received very Graciously, and, as a Mark of His Acceptance of their Entertainment, He was Graciously pleas'd to confer the Honour of Knighthood upon Two of the Aldermen then present, *viz. John Baxden*, and *William Ashurst* Esquires.
