And therefore now, Most Goncerns at your Majesties Feet, in all humble manner of Thank-fuhnels, praving God to Blefs your Majesty with a long and prof-prous Reign here, and to Crown you with Eternal Happinels hereafter, &ce.

V cma, Octob. 19. Here arrived yesterday a Courier fent from the Duke of Lorr.un, with an accounty that he had at prefent laid afide the thoughts of making any ftop at Great Warsdin; that the Army had fuffered chough to think of giving them fome rest, and he look'd upon the fecuring a good Country for a Winfor-quarter, to be of as great confequence as the taking any one Town could be; and therefore had thought fit to pais towards Tranfilvania, having fent before to Prince Abaja, that he should not be diffurbed at the approach of his Aimy, from which he should receive the least inconveniency that was possible; that he had given Orders for an exact Difcipline to be observed amongst his Troops, and he would charge himfelt with the performance of it. His Highnel's arrived the 11th Inftant at Habalone, the first Town at their Entrance into Transilvinia, which made no difficulty to receive a Garifon, and there was left there 100 Men of the Regiment of Serini : And the Duke continued his march towards Claufemberg, a confiderable Town 7 Leagues further into the Country. Colonel Huffin was returned to the Army, who had been fent to an Affembly of the States of Transivania at Hermanstat, where he was received very respectfully; and some of their Deputies were fent back with him, by whom, it is believed, not only that fatisfaction will be given to 14 Highness in his present demands of Quarters, but that fome Overtures also will be made of a nearer Conjunction with the Emperor, and breaking off all correspon-dence with the Turks. The Letters hom Set arthin mention, That General Dunewaldt thinking it to be of greater Importance to reduce Zygeth, than to profecute his Advantages in Sclavonia, and being encouraged to make the Tryal by fome Advices he had received, that the Mutiny of the Army and Flight of the Grand Vifier, added to their other Misfortunes in all places, had put them out of hopes of defending themselves; and that they were under that Confernation and Dejection, that it was thought that the appearance only of Force was fufficient to make them fubmit to it; he had thereupon repassed the Drave, leaving in Garifon at Effect 18 Companies of Foot, and 16 Troops of Horle, under the Command of Count Aspremont, beficles a fufficient number at Walpo and Budzin; and the Bridge at Effeck was repaired for the conveniency of a Communication with the places on this fide the River. We have no good account how the revolted Army have disposed of themselves under their New General. There is a report that they had quitted Perer Waradin, having first demolished the Works to prevent their falling entire into the Imperialists hands, after the Example of Effeck ; but it is faid with greater cer-. tainty, that the Garifons of Valkowar on the Danube; and Virovitza on the Drave, had deferted those places, and that fome others were ready to follow that pattern: The Grand Visier is supposed to be gone away Post for Constantinople; and that Teckeley continues with the Tur-kith Army.
