Venice, Octob. 24. By some Volontiers returned since the taking of Castlenovo, we are informed, that though there was nothing wanting that could be expected from a prudent Conduct in the General, and a ready Obedience in the Army, accompanied with undaunted resolution, yet they were also extraordinatily affifted by goodFortune, for if the Castle had not been then either not willing or not admitted to Capitulate, which some opposed, it might have proved a doubtful matter; the Bassa's of Arcegovina, Bossina and Scutari, having raised above 3000 Men each, and were then joined and marching to the relief of this place, when they received the account of its furrender: After this enterprize the Auxiliary Gallies excused themtelves upon the account of the approaching ill weather, from being at present concern'd in any other, and are return'd home since the 3d Instant; so that Dulciono has tafted no more of this Expedition, than that two Men of War, with two Palanders, and some Galiots plyed thereabout, throwing Bombs into the Town from time to time, which was only done by way of diversion, and to keep their Troops at home, while the Siege was carried on at Castlenovo. and by the report of the Master and Passengers, we un 'er' fland, that as much as they had been elevated by the Viller's Letters magnifying his fuccels in sorcing the Christians over the Drave, they were no less dejected by the melancholy accounts that follow'd it, of their Army's being beaten on one fide of Ffleck, and falling into a Mutiny on the other; with the plundering the Visier's Tent, when they mis'd their delign upon himself, and taking from thence 4000 Parfes of Money, which were intended to bepaid amongst them the next day; which put that City into the greatest Consternation, and many of the wealthicft were preparing to withdraw themselves into Asia, when an Order came from the Divan to forbid my to remove under great Penalties, but however some are gone away by ftealth. The Grand Signior hearing whom the Army had fet up for their General, he thought fit to dissemble his Resentments, and as if this had been his own choice, he fent Harly Baila a Veit, with an Order to Command as Serasquier, recommending to him the care of the Army, and Safety of the State. That there went of the Army, and Safety of the State. a Whisper that the Visier himself was come privately to Constantinople, and lay concealed in the Caimacan's House. That the former Mufii who had been banished to Bursia, for giving his Opinion against the War, was recall d, and reftor'd to his Place; and that the present Musti was to be fent to Rhodes. That the Head of Als Bassa was fent for to Constantinople, he having been thought remis in the Commission he was fent upon into Alia for the raising of Men. And that the Balla's who communited at the Dardanelies in the Gulph of Lepanco, had been strangled: And much greater Alterations were expected before their Lesser Barram or Fait, which fails out about the middle of Ottober. The Captain of the faid Veilel reports, That on his way hither he met with the News, that a Squadion of 9 Ships returning within the Dardagelles, the Commander in Chief, and several of the Captains had their Heads struck off; and that it was confidently r ited, that the fame thing had hapned to the Captain-Eafla, who came with 18 Gallies to Tened s. That about 200 Soldiers, who had deferted the Army, were stoped at Gallipolic (whither they came to find a Passage into Asia) and forced to return towards Belgrade to join with 2000 more that were faid to be on the way to that Town. The faid Vellel, on the 26th Instant, mer in the Port of the Island of Sciros with General Venier, who was failing from thence with 18 Ships under his Command towards the Gulph of Andrameiro, beyond Negrapone, to ast according to the Orders he has received; The faid Master hath also brought Letters from General Merofins, by which we understand, that he had made some stop at Malvasia, and thrown some Bombs in it? By a Genouse Ship that sailed from Athens, the 22th of September, there are Letters sent, that give an account, that General Morefinst was there with his Fleet; that he arrived two days before in Port Lione, and fending to fummon the Town, the Greeks immediately declared thenselves all ready to fubmit; but the Turkish Garison of about 400 Men, gave out that they would preser their Duty before their Safety; and inorder to shew it, they retired into the Castle: But the faid Vessel making some stay at Zane, there arrived the 4th Instant a Febricca dispatched for Venice (thô she be not yet arrived through all we ther) with advice, that the Cathe also of Athens was delivered up the 24th of the last month. And by another Vessel from Zanr, we have Letters of the 11th, which mention, That General Moran sine, after the taking of lathens, and leaving a Garison there. Vienna, Ostob. 26. The removal of his Imperial Majesty and the whole Court to Presbourg, seems to be unalterably fixed for the 29th Instant, but it is not yet said what day the Ceremonics will be performed of the Arch-Dukes Coronation, which will depend on the adjusting of those Affairs that are referr'd to be Treated of there. Here arrived yetterday an Express from the Duke of Lorrain, with the account that before he proceeded on his march into Transilvania, he publish'd his Orders, enjoining the Army to abstain from all Violence and Rapine, and to live inostensively with the Inhabitants: That the Transilvanians had no where made any shew of opposition; the Town of Classense had quietly received a Garison, where were left 2000 bien of the Regiments of Count Guido Staremberg, and Count Serini; that the like number were sent to Harmanslat, and admitted. The Commissioners his Highness sent to Prince Abassi, were not then returned; and it was said that the Prince Abaffi, were not then returned; and it was faid that the Prince goagy, were not then rearried; and it was taid that the Frince had absented himself, and it was not known whither he was gone, which must argue in him a great district of the Emperor's Intentions towards him.
