GIBRALTAR.

Lighthouse on Europa Point.

THE Corporation of the Trinity House, London, has given notice, that the light on Europa point, Gibraltar, has recently been much improved, and that with a view to mark the position of the Pearl rock, a strip of *red* light would, on and after the 24th day of November, 1864, be shown therefrom in the direction of the said rock.

The *red* light is visible over an arc of 23° when bearing between N.E. by E $\frac{1}{2}$ E. and E. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., and extends half a mile southward of the Pearl rock.

(No. 68.)—MEDITEBRANEAN—SOUTH COAST OF Sicily.

Revolving Light on Cozzo Spadaro Hill.

THE Minister of Marine at Turin has given notice, that on and after the 1st day of December, 1864, a light will be exhibited from a lighthouse recently erected on Cozzo Spadaro Hill, the most prominent part of the slope of Torre Nobile, near Cape Passero, south coast of Sicily.

The light will be a *revolving* white light, attaining its greatest brilliancy every *two minutes*. It is placed at an elevation of 269 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of 18 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the first order.

The tower is 115 feet high, of a truncated pyramidical form, with an octagonal base, and stands in lat. 36° 41' 15" N., long. 15° 8' 50"., East of Greenwich.

From this date Cape Passero light, which is about a mile eastward of it, will be discontinued.

(No. 69.)-WEST INDIES-NORTH COAST OF CUBA.

Fixed Light at Puerto de Nuevitas.

THE Commandant of Marine at Havannah has given notice, that on and after the 15th day of September, 1864, a light would be established at Barloventa or Pilots point, on the east side of the entrance to Puerto de Nuevitas, on the north coast of Cuba. The light is a *fixed* white light, at an elevation of 49 feet above the mean level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen at a distance of 9 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, of the sixth order.

The keeper's dwelling is quadrangular, painted yellow, and a white mast rises from the middle of it, from which the light is shown. It is said to be in lat. 21° 37' 50" N., long. 77° 13' 16" West of Greenwich, or about one mile north and 7' west of that of the Admiralty charts.

Fixed Light at Lucrecia Point.

Also that a temporary *fixed* white light is now exhibited from a tower on Lucrecia point, on the north-west coast of Cuba, until the tower in course of construction is completed.

The light is at an elevation of 52 feet above the sea, and should be visible at a distance of 6 miles.

The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses, and the tower white. It is said to be in lat. 21° 4' 38'' N., long. 75° 45' 55'' West of Greenwich, or about 8' west of that of the Admiralty charts.
