WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty

King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for rendering more easy the taking the Poll at County Elections," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time, on petition from the Justices of any county, riding, parts, or division, in England or Wales, in quarter sessions assembled, representing that the number of polling places for such county, riding, parts, or division is insufficient, and praying that the place or places mentioned in the said petition may be a polling place or polling places for the county, riding, parts, or division of the county within which such place or places is or are situate, to declare that any place or places mentioned in the said petition, shall be a polling place or polling places for that county, riding, parts, or division; and that the Justices of the Peace for the county, riding, parts, or division in quarter sessions, or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the Act passed in the session of the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, intituled, "An Act to settle and describe the divisions of counties, and the limits of cities and boroughs in England and Wales, in so far as respects the election of members to serve in Parliament," shall, conformably to the said last-mentioned Act, divide such county, riding, parts, or division into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place:

And whereas the Justices of the Peace, in and for the county of Durham, in quarter sessions assembled, on the second day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, have presented a petition to Her Majesty, representing that the number of polling places for the southern division of the said county is insufficient, and praying that Saint John's Chapel, in Weardale, within the said southern division of the said county should be made an additional polling place for the said division:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said petition into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to declare, order, and direct, and it is hereby declared, ordered, and directed, that Saint John's Chapel, in Weardale, shall be an additional polling place for the said southern division of the county of Durham, and that the Justices of the Peace of the said county, in quarter sessions or some special sessions assembled, as mentioned in the said Act, passed in the session of the second and third years of the reign of His said late Majesty, shall, conformably to the said Act, divide such county of Durham into convenient polling districts, and assign one of such districts to each polling place.
