Naples, Octob. 14. The Viceroy continues in a declining condition, which gives great Apprehensions that he will not recover of his diffemper. Here have lately been Orders published against carrying of Daggers and unlawful Weapons, and an Officer of Capua being feized with one, is fecured in order to/make an exemplary Punifhment. The new Coin that has been to long expected here, is to be issued on the 6th of November, being the King's Birth-day. They write from Meffina, that the Duke of Uceda had caused the Cittadel to be view'd by the ablest Workmen, who found one of the Towers fo defective, that it must be taken down if they will not have it fall. There were arrived there two Barks with Prifonets taken at Caftlenevo. There has been lately a great Earthquake in Calabria, particularly about Tropaa, which was fo violent as to over-turn fome Houfes, and to do great damage to others.

Venice, Novemb. 1. The refolution of the Senate to promote General Cornaro to the Dignity of Procurator of St. Mark in Extraordinary, in confideration of his late grateful Services, having been approved the 28th part by the Grand Council; his Relations, as well to do Honour to one of their Family, who has deferved fo well of his Country, as to fhew their just efteem of this honourable Mark of the publi k Approbation of the Senate, have spared no cost in Illuminations, Entertainments, Charis ties to the Poor, and all other demonstrations of a liberal Joy ; and the conferring this Title was received here with fo much more general Satistaction, as there is left of Envy that accompanies the great Actions of the ancient Nobility, to which the House of Carnara may pre-tend among the first of that Rank. There are several Advices from Zante, that confirm the taking of Atheus, there were in it about 8000 Inhabitants, who have fub-mitted to the Venetian Government; the Strength of the place lay in the Caftle, which is built on a Rock, (for, merly called the *Acropolis*,) within the Town, (where, ftill are fome remains of the Temple of *Minerva*, and Lycurgus his Tower,) and the Houses are built on the Descent round about it : The Harbour to this Town, or the old Praus, through the Negligence of the Turks in not taking care to cleanfe it, is grown unferviceables, unlefs it be for fimaller Veffels; it has now changed its. Name for that of Port Leone, from the Figure of a Lion wrought in Marble, that flood there; and the Town has done the fame, which is now called Setina, by an eafie corruption of its later name of Atina; the Communica-tion, that was formerly made between the Town and Harbour, by two ftrong Walls, (which was the work of their great Captain Themester) is now quite demolifhed : And that City which was the Mother, not only of all uleful Arts and Knowledge, but even of the Religion too of thole times, is now like the relt of the Turkif Conquefts, overrun with their thick Ignorance, though there is that felicity in the Climate, that what Ingenuity is left in Greece is to be found there; the Athennans being ftill reputed the ableft Craftsmen in those inferior Trades and Professions, which the Turks only tolerate because they cannot want them, being fuch as are for the ordi-nary and neceffary vie of life; and they are almost the fole Merchants throughout all those Countries, which shews that there are still fome Seeds left of their ancient Politeness and Industry, enough to create an Idea, that when they shall recover breath, under a gentle Governa ment, and get off that ruft, which long Oppreffion and perpetual Difcouragements, have contracted; they are a People capable of making great Progress in whatever they fhall apply themfolio
