5. That all letters which shall be sent by the post, under the regulations of this Warrant, shall be subject, in addition to the British rates hereby fixed, to the payment of any foreign postage which

shall be chargeable thereon.

6. On every letter posted in any part of the United Kingdom for transmission by the post under the authority of this Warrant, addressed to any seaman in Her Majesty's Navy, or to any serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier in Her Majesty's Royal Marines, employed in any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels on any foreign or colonial station, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, either in money or by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps being affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such letter near the address, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant.

7. On every letter addressed to any part of the United Kingdom and sent for transmission by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, from any seaman in Her Majesty's Navy, or from any serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier in Her Majesty's Royal Marines, employed in any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels on any colonial station, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted, by means of the proper postage stamp or stamps being affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on 'the outside of every such letter near the address, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon, under or by virtue of this Warrant.

8. If any letter shall be posted in any part of the United Kingdom for transmission by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, addressed to any seaman in Her Majesty's Navy, or to any serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier in Her Majesty's Royal Marines, employed in any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels on any station at any colony to which ordinary unpaid letters may be forwarded without any postage having been paid thereon, either in money or in postage stamps, every such letter shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of postage to which it would have been liable under this Warrant if the postage had been paid when posted, together with a further and additional rate

of postage of sixpence.

If any letter shall be posted in any part of the United Kingdom for transmission by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, addressed to any seaman in Her Majesty's Navy, or to any serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier in Her Majesty's Royal Marines, employed in any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels on any station at any colony to which ordinary unpaid letters may be forwarded, and the postage paid thereon, or postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto shall represent a less amount than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable, under and by virtue of this Warrant, every such last-mentioned letter shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the postage so paid thereon, or postage stamp or stamps so being thereon or affixed thereto, and the postage to which such letter would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of postage of sixpence.

10. If any letter addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, and sent for transmission by the post under the authority of this Warrant, from any seaman in Her Majesty's Navy, or from any said Court.

private soldier in Her Majesty's Royal Marines, employed in any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels on any colonial station, shall be posted without any postage having been paid thereon by means of the proper postage stamp or stamps being affixed thereto, every such letter shall be forwarded charged with the amount of postage to which it would have been liable under this Warrant if the postage had been paid when posted, together with a further and additional rate of

postage of sixpence.

11. If any letter addressed to any part of the United Kingdom and sent for transmission by the post under the authority of this Warrant, from any seaman in Her Majesty's Navy, or from any serjeant, corporal, drummer, trumpeter, fifer, or private soldier in Her Majesty's Royal Marines, employed in any of Her Majesty's ships or vessels on any colonial station, shall be posted, and the postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto shall represent a less amount than the rate of postage to which such letter would be liable under and by virtue of this Warrant, every such last-mentioned letter shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the value of the postage stamp or stamps so being thereon or affixed thereto, and the postage to which such letter would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of postage of sixpence.

12. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year

of the reign of Her present Majesty.

13. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed or altered, or any of the orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, directions, regulations, and conditions in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

14. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred

and sixty-five.
