HIS Majesty has been pleased to Command that this following Order be published.

JAMES R.

FOR the better preventing all Complaints that may be made touching any Orders that shall be hereafter contracted by Private Soldiers of Foot within Our Pay and Entertainment, We have thought fit hereby to declare Our Royal Pleasure to all Persons whom it may concern, within Our Garrisons or elsewhere, That no Private Soldier, of any Regiment, or Company, of Foot, be trusted on any Account or Pretence whatsoever, in their Quarters, And to the end every Private Foot-Soldier may be enabled duly and constantly to discharge his Quarters, and to pay for what shall be necessary for him: We do hereby further Direct and Require every respective Captain or Officer in Chief with any Company of Foot, to pay and Satisfie unto each Private Soldier under their Command, Three Shillings per Week, at two equal Payments to be made at the beginning and middle of each Week, in Subsistence-Money, without any Deduction whatsoever, And that they likewise Account every Two Months with each Soldier for Six Pence per Week more, allow'd by Us for the providing such Necessaries for each Soldier, to which the Off-Reckonings, or Residue of their Pay, shall not formerly be accountable: And We do likewise hereby Order the said Off-Reckonings to be employed by the Colonel of each respective Regiment, for the Cloathing and Poundage, and satisfying all other remaining Expences; for which a duplicate Account is likewise to be made unto each Soldier at the time of every Cloathing: It being nevertheless Our Pleasure, that the Officers of Our Regiments of Foot Guards do pay, by Advance, Four Shillings per Week; and the Officers of Our Royal Regiment of Fusiliers, Three Shillings and Six Pence per Week, allow'd by Us to each Private Soldier, in the respective Regiments, for their Sub'sistence; and do also Account with the Soldiers under their Command, for the remainder of their Pay as above-mentioned. And we do hereby strictly Charge and Command all Governors, Lieutenant-Governors, and Commanders in Chief, of Our Garrisons, or of any Regiment or Company of Foot in Our Service; to take especial Care that these Our Orders be duly observed and put in Execution.

UPON the Death of Dr. Clarke, late President of St. Mary Magdalen Colledge in Oxford, the Fellows of that Colledge, having chosen Dr. John Hough for their President, without any regard to His Majesties Letters Mandatory, which had been delivered to them before the day of Election, in behalf of another Person, pretending to justify their Disobedience from the Obligation they lay under to observe their Statutes, notwithstanding that His Majesty had been pleased to dispense with them in that case (as had been done in all times by his Majesties Predecessors) and the said Fellows obstinately persisting to render ineffectual those Methods which His Majesty in His Grace and Favor to them had made use of, to bring them to a sense of their Duty: His Majesty thought fit for the Maintenance of His Just Authority and Royal Prerogative, to appoint a Visitation of the said Colledge; And accordingly the Right Reverend Father in God, Thomas, Lord Bishop of Chester, Sir Robert Wright Knight, Lord Chief Justice of the Kings Bench, and Sir Thomas Jenner Knight, one of the Barons of

the Exchequer, being Authorized under the Great Seal of England, met at Oxford the 21st day of October last, where the said Fellows, with Dr. Hough, attending, and it there appearing to their Lordships, That the Pretended Election of the said Dr. Hough was made Null and Void, by a Sentence given by the Lords Commissioners for Ecclesiastical Causes; and for Visiting the Universities and Colleges, &c. and finding that he had in Contempt thereof, committed to reside there as Presidents, they Order'd him forthwith to depart the Colledge, striking his Name out of the Colledge Book, and declaring the Presidentship to be Void; And then Requir'd the Fellows to Admit the Right Reverend Father in God, Samuel, late Bishop of Oxford, into the Place of President, in pursuance of His Majesties Letters Mandatory, to that purpose, which all then present refusing, except one, the Visitors by Virtue of the Power granted them by His Majesty, Admitted the said Bishop of Oxford President, installing him by His Proxy, the Fellows still refusing to be so much as present at that Ceremony; But when it was afterwards demanded of them, Whether they would Acknowledge the President thus-Established, they all Submitted a Submission under their Hands, which they would again have Retracted, when it was proposed to them to own their Fault in the Opposition they had made to His Majesties Authority, and to ask Pardon for the same: Which they not only declined doing, but some of them carried themselves with very Disrespectful Behaviour. The Court meeting again according to their Adjournment on the 16th day of November, their Lordships admonish'd the Fellows of their Danger; if they continued in their Undutifulness to His Majesty, and should refuse to make their Submissions as became them, in the manner their Lordships had thought fit to prescribe; And finding them so little moved with it, that they withdrew, and immediately returned again with a Peremptory Refusal under their hands; their Lordships proceeded to their Censure, and besides the Exclusion of Dr. Hough and Dr. Fairfax, that had been done at the former sitting of the Court (which the last Incurred for his Disobedience to the Order of Suspension pronounced against him by the Lords Commissioners for Ecclesiastical Causes, &c. at Whitehall, upon the Account of his Singular and Refractory Behaviour when this Cause came first before them) they Pronounced the like Sentence against Dr. Charles Aldworth, Dr. Alexander Pudsey, Dr. John Smith, Dr. Thomas Bayley, Dr. Thomas Stafford, Mr. Robert Armour, Mr. Mathewaring Hammond, Mr. John Rogers, Mr. Roger Strickland, Mr. Henry Dobson, Mr. James Bayley, Mr. John Davies, Mr. Francis Bagshaw, Mr. James Eyrer, Mr. Joseph Harwar, Mr. Thomas Bateman, Mr. George Hunt, Mr. William Craock, Mr. John Gilman, Mr. George Fulham, Mr. Charles Peniston, Mr. Robert Hyde, Mr. Edward Terbury, Mr. Henry Holden, and Mr. Stephen Weeks, all Fellows of the said Colledge, whose Names were accordingly struck out of the Book, and the Sentence of Expulsion was affixed upon the Gates of the Colledge.

Vienna, Novemb. 20. The Archdukes Coronation will, in all probability, be Celebrated within 6 or 7 days; there is no longer any difficulty about the Entrail of the Crown, the States having consented, not only that it should descend by Succession to the next of Kin of the Emperor's Family, Male and Female, in their Order, but have also substituted the King of Spain, with his Lineage, to succeed, in case of Failure of the first; and this Point being so luckily got over, the Redress of Grievances being expected to accompany the Concessions of Subjects, some have from hence more earnestly insisted on a Remedy to be applied to their greatest Pressures; that which seemed to make the loudest Cry, was the Severities used by Count Caraffa, who, out of his Zeal to discover the Bottom of the late Conspiracy, had put many to the Torture, which they, to rescue themselves from, had confessed Crimes they were not Guilty of, immediately disowning them, and declaring, That they sacrificed Truth to Ease and Deliverance from Pain; the Endeavors on the other side are, to refer all matters of Complaint to Commissioners, or the next Diet that is to be assembled. The Duke of Lorraine is suddenly expected back, having concluded a very advantageous Treaty in Transylvania, the Particulars whereof are according to the following Extract. I. Transylvania submits to receive the Imperial Troops into Hermanstadt, Clausenberg, Zalvaras, Szafzabas, Bistritz, Monaster, Wilsmbourg, Deva, Wisserkel, and Dova, and no other place, unless it be by a New Treaty. II. The Principality shall furnish to the Troops 66000 Measures of Wheat, 1980 Tun of Flesh, 7000 Pieces of Wine, 120000 Measures of Oats, 9180 Tun of Hay, 480000 Truffs of Straw; Wood, Salt, and Candles, to be provided at the Charge

Charge of the respective Landlords. III. There shall be paid in Money 70000 German Florins, by the Payments following: On the 15th of November 15000. On the 1st of January 15000. On the 1st of February 125000. The 1st of March 100000. The 1st of April 100000. The 1st of May 100000. And the last day of June 50000. All which is to be paid by the Countrey without diminishing the Revenue of the Prince. IV. The Princes Palaces, and the Houses of the Nobility shall be exempt from Quarters; And if any shall be Billeted upon them, they shall be provided for elsewhere, according to their Condition. V. There shall be a Liberty of Worship to the Professors of the Four Religions Tolerated there, viz. Romanist, Lutheran, Calvinist, and Suetian. VI. The Prince and States shall be continued in the Enjoyment of their Rights and Privileges, without any Alteration to be made in the Magistracy and their Privileges, and the Donations and Collations of the Prince and States to be preserved. VII. The Liberty of Commerce to be maintained without any Injury to be offer'd to the Inhabitants in their Persons or Estates. The Weights and Measures not to be changed. And the Roads to be free for Goods and Passengers. VIII. The Prince and Noblemen not to be disturb'd, or hinder'd from dwelling in their Houses; and those that desire to remove, shall have leave to do it at any time. IX. There shall be no Accusation admitted against the Prince, nor any suffered to withdraw the Fidelity they owe him. X. There shall be a General Amnesty of all things past. XI. The Ammunition, Provision, and Magazines, of the Cities and Forts, shall not be touch'd, but the Imperialists shall content themselves with the Provisions furnished by the Countrey. XII. The Inhabitants shall keep a Guard in their Towns, together with the Imperial Troops; and are to have the Custody of the Keys of the Gates, which they are to open as often as they shall be required by the Officer commanding the Guard. XIII. The Prince may send to the Port to justify himself in these his Proceedings; and that whenever a Peace shall be concluded with the Turk, all things shall continue upon the Foot of the Treaty made at Vienna by the Envoy Jusseps. XIV. The Prince may hold a Diet as often as he thinks it necessary. XV. The Garisons shall stay out of their respective Quarters in the Spring, unless the necessity of the War require it otherwise, or that some other Treaty be concluded on this Winter, or else the present Articles shall have their full Effect.

Paris, Decemb. 6. We have at last received the long expected account of the Marquis de Laroussin's Entry into Rome, on the 16th of the last month, about Two of the Clock in the Afternoon; he was met without the Town by the Cardinal d'Efrees, with Six Coaches and Six Horses each, viz. 3 of Cardinal Majdashim's, 1 of the Duke of Bracciano's, 1 of the Prince of Belmonte, and his own, besides the Coaches of the Foreign Ministers: Before the Ambassador, marched a Guard of 50 Cavaliers; armed with Mousquetons, 30 Officers riding in Carriages; they were followed by 50 Wagons laden with Bales of Goods, and after them by 50 Mules, with Covers Embroidered with the Ambassador's Arms; next came 20 Pages, &c. immediately before the Ambassador, who rode in the First Coach with the Cardinal d'Efrees and the Ambassadors: They threw out Money several times to the People, who followed them all the way with loud Acclamations; several Coaches and Led Horses went after them: The Rear Guard consisted in the same number as the Van; and in the close of all marched 156 Officers of the Marine Regiments, and they were all drawn up in order in double Ranks before the Palace Farnese. Several Foreign Ministers have been to visit the Ambassador since his Arrival. It is now said that the Spanish Ambassador had acquainted the Pope with the Orders he had from Spain, to join his Endeavours with those of France, for the re-establishing the Frenches.

Whereas frequent Robberies have been lately committed on the Highways, and in some places Murder, to the great Disturbance and Discouragement of His Majesties good Subjects that Travel about their lawful Occasions. These are to give Notice, That there were lately taken at Gerrards-Cross-Inn in the County of Bucks, by the Servants, and others belonging to the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of England, Four notorious Highway Robbers, whose Names and descriptions of their Persons and Horses are as followeth, viz. Richard Abbrugh, a full Bodied Man, ruddy Complexion, his Face Pock-broken and fowled, nigh 40 years of Age. Richard Bradshaw, a smooth faced middle sized Man, about 23 years old, his Hair short dark brown, muzzel curled. John Skelton alias Turner, a rawny visaged Man, middle sized, full Bodied, his Hair black, a dark colour'd Wig, his Eye-brows very black, about 35 years of Age. Joel Corbet, a tall Man, somewhat long faced, his Nose indifferent long and high, hank brown Hair, and slender Bodied, about 23 years old. The Horses these Men rid upon, when taken, were a bay Mare, and a dem Gelding, about 15 hands high, and 4 white Feet. A black Stone-hor, about 14 hands high, and a little black Gelding. There are Two more of the Company that are not yet taken, viz. Thomas Wiltshire, a Taylor and Fencing Master, a litty Man, wearing a brown Perruwig; he liv'd in Drury-lane in King's-Head-Court, and rid a Bay Gelding, with a Star in his Forehead, about 15 hands high. And Thomas Eastare alias Sewkley, a Butcher, a litty

tall Man, wearing a dark brow'n Perruwig, about 50 years of Age; he formerly lived in a paved Alley near St. Sepulchres Church in London; he rid a dark bay Gelding about 14 hands high. These Persons are all of them suspected to have committed several Robberies within these 4 Months last past; particularly on three Coaches, and several Workmen, near Salisbury, the 26th of August last, where a Man was kill'd. Another Robbery upon several Persons going to Wayhill Fair, about 7 Miles beyond Reading. A late Robbery at Maidenhead-Thicket. A Robbery upon a Wagon coming from Portsmouth. A considerable Robbery about 5 weeks since in Norfolk. It is desired whoever knows the two last Persons, that they would cause them to be apprehended, and gives Notice thereof to the Master of Newgate. All Persons that have been robb'd by any of the aforesaid Persons, are desired to repair to the said Master of Newgate, where they may have a List of the Persons and Horses, and further Information concerning them, in order to their Prosecution. There is likewise abroad one Augustine King, formerly Convicted at Cambridge a Notorious Highway Robber, who made his Escape from the Gatehouse: He is a litty fat Man, about 31 or 32 years of Age, fresh coloured, full Ey'd, his own Hair, hank inclinable to black; he hath several more in his Company, who, some of most of them, are well known to some Inn-keepers not far distant from London, who will do well to cause them, especially King, to be taken before the next Sessions at the Old Bailey, for their own Indemnity.

On Sunday the 30th of October last, about 7 in the morning, was found lying dead on the Thames Shoar, near the Earl of Salisbury's Garden Wall, the Body of one Mr. Mich. Deskeene, then having a black Hat on his Head, and in a light buff close Coat.
