Vienna, Novembi 30. The Actions of the Campagne being at an end; there is nothing at prefent that does for much employ the Curious, as the Enquiry after what is doing at Presburg, where more Difficulties daily arife to take up time than were at first apprehended; and for the better understanding of what is transacting there, it will be neceffary to fet down at large the Propositions des livered by his Imperial Majesties Commands at the opening of the Hungarian Dyet, which are as follows:

His Imperial Majeity having by the Divine Affiftance fo glorioufly furmounted all those Difficulties and Hazards, which not only threatned the Kingdom of Hungary, whole Prefervation and Prosperity has been an Object of his Majefties immediate Care, as well as that of his Predeceffors, ever fince their Subjection to them from the time of Ferdinand the First, but have also endanger'd his Majefties Sacred Perfon and Crown, whil'ft he freely exposed both in their Defence, in opposition to the despetate Attempts' of his and their Enemies; whose Defigns have not only been dilappointed, and their Force repelled, but by the continued Succeffes in the Field, the taking of Buttay and feveral other important Places; 'that Kingdom has been leveral other important Places; that Kingdom has been almost entirely deliver'd fioth that intolerable Yolde they fo long groan d'under. His Majefties next Concorn and Application has been, to relettle thole dillbasted Coun-tries, and to provide convenient Remedies, that the Mile-ries and Calamities they have hitherto kiedifd anders might be prevented for the Future. In order the which, his Majefty is perfuaded, there could be nothing more-grateful to the future, of a General Affembly of the tended, than a convening of a General Affembly of the States of the Ringdom, and the propoling to them the most Serene Prince the Archduke Jofeph for their King, under whole aufpicious Influences (bleffed by the Divine Gobdnefs,) a Peace and Calm may descend upon these Provinces to be continued to After-Ages. And though his Majefty Knows what Rights he could pretend to by Conquest, and how justifiable it would be, to thake what Alterations he thought fit in the Constitutions of a Countrey recover'd from an Enemy, by his own Armis; after fo, many Years of possession; yet his Majely who has always confider'd them as his Subjects, and values not thing more in his Victory; than the opportunity it gives him to fet them at Eafe, and make them fenfible of the difference there is between being govern'd by a fightful Sovereign, or an oppressive Ulurper, is willing to restore to them the free enjoyment of all their Laws and Privia ledges, as fat as may be confiltent with the Nature and Principles of Government, and this to be confirmed to them by the Oath of the new King ; as also that there be annexed to the Crown, under forne few Restrictions and Qualifications, the diffinembred parcels of the Kingdoffrito be governed by the fagte Laws with the reft. And what "litis

his Imperial Majefty expects from them in return to his Grace and Goodnels is, That the Hereditary Succession to the Crown, which has formerly been acknowledged to be the Right of the Auftrian Family, however it has been fince controverted through the finitter Interpretations of fome Men, who made use of the unhappy Conjunctures of Affairs to oppose it, should now recover its ancient Nigor, and be established, beyond all dispute, by a folemn Decree of the States; And moreover that there be a formal Authentick Revocation of that Claufe in the Corobation Oath, which was confented to by Ferdinand the First, in purfuance of a Decree made by King Andrew in the Year 1222, which makes it lawful for Subjects to Rife up in Arms against their Prince as often they conceive that he acts contrary to the Establish'd Laws; it being unrealonable to impose an Oath that to directly contradicts all Divine as well as Human Sanctions, a compliance wherein must inevitably expose the Kingdom to the Tame divisions and animolities that have already been the occasions of fo much milery and ruine, by granting an impusity to the notorious Diffurbers of the publick Peace, who under pretence of fanding up in the defence of the Laws, have themfelves acted against all Rules of Justice, chooling rather to enflave their Country than be debarred of the pernicious fatisfact on of fettering their Prince; but there is none now needs to be taught, that to over-turn the Government is an Ill way to establish Liberty; His Imperial Majefty is very fentible, that in a Diftemper'd State, and which has been long afflicted with War, many things mult neceffarily have happened to afford jult matter of complaint, and that are fit to be redreffed, it not being pollible that Unerring Juffice, and the first Laws of Property (which are the truits and benefit sof Peace) fhould be observed amidft the violence and confusion of Arms, yet it must be confider'd from whence the occasions of these diforders sprung, and the whole blame must be laid to their charge, who have been the unhappy Authors of those differences that have been attended with fo great mischiefs which cannot be hoped to be totally removed till Peace be again refto ed ; His Majefty therefore re-commends it to them to digeft into Heads fuch things as may be proper for the prefent conjuncture; especially what relates to the Inauguration intended, and to prefent the fame to his Majelly within 12 or 14 days, that there be no los of time, which is fo neceffary to be employed in preparations to profecute the reft of the War; and for what shall remain now unfinish'd, it is offered to be referred to Commitfioners to be chosen for that purpole, or to the next Allembly of the Dyet.

Norwithstanding that a dispatch was fo much prefs'd, and that formany feveral days here have been pitch'd upon for the Ancheukes Coronation, the time is yet uncertainly spoke of, and most believe that it will not be before Tine/pe-side : For though the Point of the Succession be determined, yet the Deputies fill infilt, That they may have a puesent, Aufwer to what they feek a Remedy in, without being put off to Commiflioners, from whom they can hope for no good Illue : And it is believed that the Emperor will gratifie them in their Demands, fome of which arer That the Scaffold may be taken down upon which fo many had been Executed by Count Caraffa, on the account of the late Confpiracy, that there might be a moderation of Taxes, with a regard to the mifery and poverty of the Inhabitants, and that it be alcertain'd what they are to pay towards the Entertainment of the Army. On the 26th Instant, the Duke of Lorran arrived at Presburg, and was received by their Imperial Majefties, as his great Services to the Empire deferved ; he will fay there but few days before he goes to Infpruck, where the Queen-Dowager of Poland his Dutchels refides. There is a Report that Teckeley lay in wait to intercept him in his Yaffage, and that he milt him but by one hour when he passed the Therffe; as alto, that the Garifon of Agria expected only his Return that way, to deliver up the Town to him ; But there is fo much only of this last true, that the Balls finding the Impoffibility to fublift much longer, nath fent to the Marquis Doria; commanding the Blocade, for Leave to acquaint the Neighbouring Garifons, effectially thole of Temifinaer, with the Condition he is in promi-fing that if no Succor be fent him within 15 days, at the Expiration thereof he will furrender, which hath been granted him accordingly.

Marseilles, Novemb 24. The Sieur d'Anfreuille the younger, being out at Sea in the Rose Tree an Arguer Prize of 35 Guns, and 250 Men, met off of the Coatt of Sardinia with 4 Argierine Men of War, which he engaged, forcing them to retire, after having killed many of their Men, and being himielf much difabled, is now return'd to Thoulon. Molt of the Algierine Ships are faid to be cruifing towards the East. We have advice from Smyrna, of the 8th of October, That the late Vilier, who was im-prifoned at Rhodes by Command of the Grand Signior; was beheaded there, and his Head carried to Conitantinop!e.

Whitehall, Decemb. 6.
