N the 6th Initant, his Excellency Siv William Trumbull, His Majelties Ambaliador to the Port, had his first Audience of the Caymacan; the late Ambaliador the Loid Chandois, and the present Ambaliador, went both together to their Audience, as they dor the Loid Chandois, and the present Ambaskador, went both together to their Audience, as they pasted from Gala:a to Constantinople; and likewise at their Return, they were saluted not only by the English, but by the French and Dutch Ships also. They were met at the Water-side by the Chiaux Bassa, attended by 50 Chiauxes; and there were 100 Horse sent from the Grand Sigmor's, and the Me chants, so that the Cavalcade coassisted of 150 Horse. The 50 Chiauxes muched first, and were followed by the Ambasladors Januzaries, and their Liveries, on Foot. Next went the Draggermen on Harseback, and the Chiaux Bissa, immediate y before their Excellencies; the Lord Chandois having the Upper Hand as they went, and Sir William Trumbull as they re urned. The Grand Signier, who had the Curiolity to see them pass, was in a Chamber upon the Wall of the Senglia from mg the Cai nayan's Gate, looking through a Lattice. The 1 te Ambassa dor having acquainted the Crymacan that he was come to re ign his Othice to his Succ. Br., Sir William Trumbull then made his Complements, presenting His Majesties Letter for the Grand V sir, with another of his own. The usual Ceremonnes observed on the Soca ions being passed, the Ambassadors, with 28 of their R tinue, were vested, the Gaymacan shown of great Respect and Civility to the Ambassadors in their Reception, which was on the Saspass, that they returned in the same Order, the Grand Signier being at that time in the Kiosk of the Seraglia on the Waters side.

Upon this Notice, Solyman immediately sent before to Constantinophe the Testentar and Reys Essential with the Seal and Standard of Makonge; and followed privately himself, arriving here the first Instant, hild concealing himself, as is said, in the Capmacan's House! "The Grand Signior hath pardon'd him his Life, but whether hil is to be banished, or otherwise disposed of, is not yet known. He hath given Liberty to all his blaves that were near him, as is usually done here by great Men, when either under sear of Death, or upoh joy of some great Deliverance. This new Vision is by Birth a Giragliany and was formerly, a Slave of ohe surpris, who bred him up as one of his Pages, and afterwards employed him in Quality of Gapigelar Kasi, or Master of the Genemonies; his Son, Amet Kaperli, manied his Sister to him, and preferr'd him to be for some time Master of the Ceremonies; his Roma Mullafa; he is a Person of a good Presence, and of about 60 years of Age, but he has not hitherto had the opportunities of giving any great Proof of his Abilities, either as to the War, or the thanagement of other State Affairs. At the Return, of the Solidar Age from the Army, there are some Akerations expected to be made amonght the great Officers; and the Cappaga can being to intimate Friend and Creature of the late Vision, it is believed they will fall together. His Majeffies next Concern and Application has been, to reletile those next Concern and Application has been, to reletile those distributed Countries, and to provide convenient Remedies, that the Micries and Calamities they have hitherto habout distributed might be prevented for the Future. In order to which, his Majeffy is persuaded, there could be nothing more grateful to them, or more effectual to the purposer intended that a convening of a General Assembly of the tended, than a convening of a General Assembly of the States of the Ringdom, and the proposing to them the most Serene Prince the Archduke Joseph for their King, under whose auspicious Influences (blessed by the Divine Goodness,) a Peace and Calm may descend upon these Provinces to be continued to After-Ages. And though his Majesty knows what Rights he could pretend to by Conquest, and how justifiable it would be, to thake what Alterations he thought fit in the Constitutions of a Countrey recover'd from an Enemy, by his own Arms, after fo many Years of possession; yet his Majesty; who has always confider'd them as his Subjects, and values no thing more in his Victory, than the opportunity it gives him to fer them at Eafe, and make them fentible of the difference there is between being govern'd by a fightful Sovereign, or an oppressive Ulurper, is willing to restore to them the free enjoyment of all their Laws and Privial ledges, as far as may be consistent with the Nature and Principles of Government, and this to be confirmed to them by the Oath of the new King; as also that there be annexed to the Crown, under forne few Restrictions and Qualifications, the dishembred parcels of the Kingdoff to be governed by the factie Lawe With the rest.
