Revolving Red Light on Little Hope Islet.

Also, that on and after the 15th day of November, 1865, a light will be exhibited from a light-house recently erected on Little Hope Islet, on the south-east coast of Nova Scotia.

The light will be a *revolving red* light, attaining its greatest brilliancy every *minute*. It is 40 feet above high water, and in clear weather should be seen from a distance of about 11 miles.

The tower is 31 feet high, and rises from the centre of the keeper's dwelling, in lat. 43° 48' 31" N., long. 64° 47' 15" West of Greenwich.

Fixed Light on Green Island.

Also, that on and after the 25th day of November, 1865, a light will be established on Green Island, near the south-east end of Madame Island, Cape Breton Island.

The light will be a *fixed white* light, at 70 feet above high water, and in clear weather should be visible at a distance of about 14 miles.

The tower is 31 feet high, and rises from the centre of the keeper's dwelling, in lat. 45° 28' 51" N., long. 60° 53' 40" West of Greenwich.

NOTICE is hereby given to the Officers, Seamen, and Marines, and to all persons interested therein, that the distribution of the tonnage bounty of a slave schooner, name unknown, captured on the 9th August, 1862, by Her Majesty's ship "Mullet," will commence on Tuesday, the 26th instant, in the Prize Branch of the Department of the "Accountant-General of the Navy, Admiralty, Somerset House."

Agents and other persons holding powers of attorney, prize orders, assignments, or other instruments, by virtue of which they may be legally entitled to claim the share of any captor, serving in the above-named ship, are requested to present the same at this office.

Any Officer, Seaman, Marine, or other person, who may desire to receive his share from the Collector of Customs or of Inland Revenue within the United Kingdom, is required to intimate the same by letter to be addressed "On Prize Business, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, London," (enclosing his certificate of service, or an attested

copy thereof, excepting in the case of Commissioned Officers),—in which letter his own place of residence is to be precisely stated, as well as the place of the nearest Collector of Customs, or of Inland Revenue, from whom it would be convenient to receive such share of prize money.

INCOME TAX.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the 28th year of Her Majesty, cap. 30, for granting to Her Majesty certain duties of Customs and Inland Revenue, power is given for increasing in certain cases the number of persons appointed under the provisions made by the Act passed in the 5th and 6th years of Her Majesty, cap. 35, Commissioners for the general purposes of the Income Tax Acts, and persons to supply vacancies amongst such Commissioners in each district or division in Great Britain; and, it appearing to the Board of Inland Revenue that the number of persons so appointed for the Isle of Wight is insufficient for the proper discharge of the business therein arising under the Income Tax Acts, the said Board hereby authorise the increase in the number of the Commissioners for the said Island to any number not exceeding fourteen, and of persons to supply vacancies amongst such Commissioners to any number not exceeding fourteen; and we, the undersigned, three members of the said Board, do hereby convene a meeting of persons appointed for putting in execution within the said Island an Act passed in the 38th year of the reign of King George the Third, intituled "An Act for granting an aid to His Majesty by a Land Tax to be raised in Great Britain for the service of the year 1798," being respectively qualified to act as Commissioners, in the execution of the last-mentioned Act, to be holden at the Townhall, in Newport, in the said Island, on Saturday, the 21st day of October next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of choosing and appointing, according to the regulations of the said Act of the 5th and 6th years of Her Majesty, such number of fit and proper persons to be Commissioners for general purposes for the said Isle of Wight, and of persons to supply vacancies amongst such Commissioners, as may be sufficient to increase the number of such Commissioners to any number not exceeding fourteen, and of persons to supply vacancies amongst such Commissioners to any number not exceeding fourteen.
