

“And also all that portion of the new parish of Saint Thomas, Bethnal Green, in the county of Middlesex and diocese of London aforesaid, which is situate to the south of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the new parish of Saint Peter, Bethnal Green, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of Birdcage-walk, opposite to the middle of the eastern end of Crab Tree-row; and extending thence, first westward, to and along the middle of the said row, and then north-westward along the middle of the same row to its junction with the Hackney-road; and continuing thence, still north-westward, to the boundary in the middle of such road which divides the said new parish of Saint Thomas, Bethnal Green, from the parish of Saint Leonard, Shoreditch, in the county and diocese aforesaid.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the ninth day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew, situate at Kinson, in the parish of Great Canford, in the county of Dorset, and in the diocese of Salisbury.

Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew, situate at Kinson aforesaid;

Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Walter Kerr, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury (testified by his having signed and

sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Great Canford, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew, situate at Kinson aforesaid, and that the same should be named The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew Kinson.

And with the like consent of the said Walter Kerr, Bishop of the said diocese of Salisbury (testified as aforesaid), we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed at such church; and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew Kinson, being:—

“All that the eastern part of the parish of Great Canford, in the county of Dorset, and in the diocese of Salisbury, which is comprised within, and is co-extensive with the limits of the tything and chapelry of Kinson, otherwise called Kingstone.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled “An Act to prevent, until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infec-
