PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by The Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted (among other things) that Her Majesty in Council may from time to time make such Orders in Council as seem meet for the better execution of any of the purposes of that Act, and that the said Act shall commence on such day, not later than the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, as Her Majesty in Council thinks fit to appoint :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Her vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :—

Preliminary.

1. The said Act and this Order shall commence from and immediately after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

2. The Order in Council of the eleventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, under The Navy Pay and Prize Act, 1854, and that of the nineteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, amending the same, are hereby repealed, but not so as to revive any Order, regulation, practice, or other thing thereby expressly or virtually repealed or abolished, or to affect the past operation of the said Orders respectively, or the validity of anything done thereunder.

3. In this Order—

The term "pay" includes all wages, pensions, bounty money, grants, or other allowances in the nature thereof, due in respect of service in Her Majesty's naval or marine force to a person being or having been an officer, seaman, or marine, or the widow or any relative of a deceased officer, seaman, or marine :

Other terms have the same respective meanings as in the said Act.

Confirmation of existing Orders in Council, Queens Regulations, &c.

4. All Orders in Council, and all Queen's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, and

Instructions for Paymasters of the Navy, as far as they relate to naval and marine pay, and are in force at the commencement of this Order, and are not by this Order expressly repealed, are hereby continued and confirmed, subject, however, with respect to the Queen's Regulations and Admiralty Instructions, and Instructions for Paymasters, to such alterations as the respective proper authority in that behalf from time to time thinks fit to make therein.

Rating.

5. A seaman or marine discharged or transferred from one ship to another shall not be rated lower in the latter ship than in the former ship on or in consequence of such discharge or transfer.

Allotments and Remittances of Pay by Seamen and Marines, and other Remittances.

6. For the purposes of the provisions of this Order respecting allotments and remittances of pay by seamen and marines, and other remittances, the proper certifying authority shall be (in the several cases hereinafter mentioned), the following, namely :—

(1.) Where the allottee or payee resides in England, Wales, Scotland, the Isle of Man, or the Channel Islands, the minister and churchwardens or elders of the parish or district parish wherein the allottee or payee resides.

(2.) Where the allottee or payee resides in Ireland, the inspector or sub-inspector of constabulary for the county, and a churchwarden of the parish, wherein the allottee or payee resides.

(3.) Where the allottee or payee resides at Sierra Leone, the commissariat officer there.

(4.) Where the allottee or payee resides in any other British possession out of the United Kingdom, two of the principal merchants or tradespeople of the place of residence ;

and the ministers, churchwardens, elders, inspectors, sub-inspectors, commissariat officer, merchants and tradespeople aforesaid (when respectively the proper certifying authority), are hereby required to furnish, in the several cases in this Order provided for, such certificates as are requisite for the purposes of this Order, in case they respectively are satisfied of the truth of the matter required to be certified.

7. At places where there is not any resident naval cashier or paymaster, allotments and wages

remittances (home and foreign) shall be paid by a clerk of Her Majesty's Paymaster-General, or any officer of the revenue, or (if hereafter deemed expedient by the Admiralty and Her Majesty's Postmaster-General) a postmaster, who respectively shall comply in all respects with the instructions of the Admiralty printed on the authority for payment addressed to the paying officer.

8. The amounts so paid shall be repaid to the respective departments in the same manner as at present, subject to such alterations as the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury and the Admiralty from time to time direct.

9. Payment shall not be made, except on the production of the duplicate of the authority issued to the paying officer; or, in case of a remittance other than a foreign remittance, on production of the letter of advice or other equivalent document sent from the Admiralty Office to the payee.

10. An allotment or foreign remittance shall not be paid without a certificate from the proper certifying authority that the holder of the duplicate is the person named as allottee or payee in the duplicate.

11. Payment shall only be made to the allottee or payee personally, unless on any occasion the allottee or payee is unable from illness or bodily infirmity to appear personally, in which case payment on that occasion shall be made to the person producing:—

(1.) The duplicate authority together with the allottee's or payee's order in writing, signed and witnessed, for payment to that person; and

(2.) A certificate from the proper certifying authority of the allottee's or payee's being unable from illness or bodily infirmity to appear personally; or

(3.) A like certificate from the allottee's or payee's legally qualified medical attendant:

provided the paying officer does not doubt the authenticity of the order, or the truth of the certificate.

12. Payment shall not be made unless the paying officer is satisfied of the title of the claimant.

13. Where a wife is allottee, payment shall not be made except on due proof of the marriage.

14. If on any application for payment the paying officer entertains any doubt as to the claimant's title to payment, he shall inquire into the matter, and may require from the claimant such statutory declaration or declarations of the claimant alone, or with any other person or persons, as the paying officer thinks requisite.

15. On paying an allotment, the paying officer shall take a receipt duly witnessed on the usual list, and shall indorse on the duplicate authority the date and amount of the payment, and the term for which it is made.

16. On paying a remittance, the paying officer shall take a receipt on the authority for payment addressed to him, and shall certify thereon (where so required) to his having satisfied himself of the title of the claimant.

17. Where a seaman or marine having allotted becomes of unsound mind, and his wife, child, or other near relative is allottee, payment of the allotment may be continued, under the direction of the Admiralty, to the allottee, within the limits of the pay due.

18. Where a wife being allottee dies or deserts her children, or so misconducts herself as to be considered undeserving of support from her husband, the Admiralty, on a certificate to that effect from the proper certifying authority, may stop further payment under the allotment.

If, in any such case, there is a child of the allottee unprovided for, the Admiralty, on a certificate to that effect from the proper certifying authority, may revoke the authority for payment to the wife, and make out a new authority in favour of a proper person resident in the parish where the child is, recommended for the purpose by the proper certifying authority, and that person shall apply to the maintenance of the child the money allotted.

19. Where a wife being allottee becomes of unsound mind, the Admiralty, on receipt of a certificate to that effect from the proper certifying authority, may stop further payment under the allotment, and may revoke the authority for payment to the wife, and make out a new authority in favour of a proper person recommended for the purpose by the proper certifying authority; and that person shall apply for the benefit of the wife and the children (if any) of the allottee the money allotted.

20. Where the death of an allottee comes to the knowledge of the proper certifying authority, or of any one of the persons constituting such authority, immediate notice of the death shall be given by such authority or person to the Admiralty, or to the officer by whom the allotment is payable, who shall indorse the date of his receipt of the notice on the authority for payment, and return the same to the Admiralty.

21. Every certificate under this Order shall state the character in which each person certifying subscribes the same.

Unclaimed Pay.

22. Pay shall be deemed forfeited if, within six years from the first day of January next following the time when it became payable—

(1.) it is not claimed; or

(2.) a claim made to it is not proved to the satisfaction of the Admiralty.

23. The Admiralty may, however, if they see good cause, in any case remit such forfeiture.

Stoppage of Pay by R.

24. A person against whose name the letter R. is placed in the books of the ship to which he belongs, as denoting a deserter, shall not, while the R. so remains, be entitled to receive his pay; but the Admiralty may, in any case, if they think fit, order the R. to be removed, and authorize the payment of the pay accrued.

Persons of Unsound Mind.

25. Where it is made to appear to the satisfaction of the Admiralty that an officer, seaman, or marine, or other person entitled to pay, is of unsound mind (though not found lunatic by inquisition), the whole or any part of such pay may be paid over, under the direction of the Admiralty, to the wife or relative or other person having the care and maintenance of such person, to be applied for his maintenance and benefit.

Vouchers.

26. Certificates of payment of monthly advance to seamen and marines, or of the payment of the balances of the pay of officers, seamen, and marines, other certificates founded on the books of Her Majesty's ships, certificates of allotments by seamen and marines paid by Her Majesty's Paymaster-General, certified effective lists of the payment of marine pay, certified vouchers of the payment of wages in Her Majesty's dockyard and victualling and other naval establishments, and

certified lists of wages and bounty to Naval Coast Volunteers, shall, when duly attested by the several officers or other persons whose duty it is to attend and attest such payments, be received by all authorities and persons for all purposes as sufficient vouchers in proof of the several payments in such certificates or lists respectively charged, conformably with the practice which has hitherto prevailed.

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the ninth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Radlet, in the parish of Aldenham, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church called Christ Church, situate at Radlet aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Cotton, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Aldenham, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church called Christ Church, situate at Radlet as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Radlet.'

"And with the like consent of the said Joseph Cotton, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester (testified as aforesaid), we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to

be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Radlet, being:—

"All that part of the parish of Aldenham, in the county of Hertford, and in the diocese of Rochester, which is situate mainly to the east of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides such parish from the parish of Elstree, in the same county and diocese, at a point in the middle of the turnpike road leading from London to Saint Alban's; and extending thence, north-westward, along the middle of the said turnpike road for a distance of thirty-eight chains or thereabouts, to a point near to Medbourn Farm, and opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of a certain cross road leading to the Wrestler's Inn; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of twenty-nine chains or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the southern end of Sawyer's-lane; and extending thence northward, to and along the middle of the last-named lane, for a distance of fifty-four chains or thereabouts, to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'R. Ch: Ch: D.C. 1865, No. 1,' and placed at an angle of the said lane near to the north-eastern corner of the close numbered 354 upon the title computation map of the said parish of Aldenham, and upon the map hereunto annexed; and extending thence north-westward to such boundary stone, and continuing thence in the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of twenty-one chains or thereabouts, across the closes numbered respectively 351 and 319a upon the said maps, to a boundary stone inscribed 'R. Ch: Ch: D.C. 1865, No. 2,' and placed at the north-eastern corner of the close numbered 336 upon the said maps; and continuing thence still north-westward, and in a direct line, for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts, to a point in the middle of the road leading from the new church called Christ Church, situate at Radlet to Butler's Green, opposite to the middle of the southern end of a certain other road, called Gill's Hill-lane, which leads past the cottages at Gill's Hill to Darnhill's Farm; and extending thence first north-westward and then north-eastward to and along the middle of the last described road, for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts, to a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'R. Ch: Ch: D.C. 1865, No. 3,' and placed on the western side of the same road, in the middle of the south-eastern end of the fence dividing the close numbered 274 upon the said maps, from the closes numbered respectively 271 and 272 upon the same maps; and extending thence north-westward to the said boundary stone; and continuing thence still in the same direction along the middle of the last described fence to a boundary stone inscribed 'R. Ch: Ch: D.C. 1865, No. 4,' and placed at the north-western extremity of the same fence, at a point on the southern side of the road leading from Darnhill's Farm aforesaid, past the Folly, to High Cross; and continuing thence still north-westward, and

in a straight line for a distance of twenty-five chains or thereabouts crossing the said road, to a point at the south-eastern corner of the close numbered 214 upon the said maps, in the middle of the fence forming the boundary which divides the said parish of Aldenham from the new parish of Frogmore, in the county and diocese aforesaid.

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time, to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit;

And whereas an Order in Council has been made, directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyard hereinafter mentioned, from the time specified in such Order; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyard be postponed;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyard be postponed as follows; viz.:

In the churchyard of Hogsthorpe, Lincolnshire, to the first of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council, relating to the "cattle plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity

with the requirements of the 18th section of their Lordships' Order of the 23rd November, 1865:—

CATTLE PLAGUE NOTICE.

County of Nairn.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Justices of the Peace for the county of Nairn, in Special Sessions assembled, this day, in pursuance of an Order by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, with a view to prevent the spreading of the cattle plague, resolved and declared as follows:

1. That it is expedient that for the period from this date to the 1st day of March next, none of the animals referred to in said Order, that is to say, cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, shall be brought from any place in Great Britain, other than from places within the counties of Nairn, Elgin, Inverness, Ross, Cromarty, Sutherland, Caithness, and Orkney and Shetland, into any place within the county of Nairn, and such animals are hereby excluded accordingly.

2. That it is expedient to prevent the removal of all such animals to any market or fair, or to any place whatever, within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, for exhibition or sale, during the same period, and such removal is prohibited accordingly.

And notice is further given, that every person offending against the said Order in Council, will incur a penalty not exceeding £20.

THE CATTLE PLAGUE.

Lewes Market and all Fairs and other Markets in the Lewes Petty Sessional Division.

WE, the undersigned Justices of the Peace acting in and for the Lewes Petty Sessional Division of Lewes and Pevensy Rapes, in the county of Sussex, in Petty Sessions assembled, and as such the Local Authority for such Petty Sessional Division, as constituted by an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, do hereby declare that it is expedient that, until the 1st day of March next, all cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, and calves shall not be brought from any place in any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said Petty Sessional Division, unless sent by railroad and intended for immediate slaughtering at the place to which they are sent, and except as provided for by the said Order in Council, Clause 18.

And we do hereby further declare that no animal landed at any port within the said division shall be removed to any place, either within or beyond such division, except by railroad or ship, and for such purpose shall be shipped or loaded on the wharf or railroad station nearest to the place of debarkation.

And we do hereby give notice, that any person bringing or sending any such animals into any place within our said jurisdiction in contravention of this declaration will be liable to forfeit a sum not exceeding £20.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Petty Sessional Division of Stratton.

WE, the undersigned Justices of the Peace, acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division of Stratton, in the county of Cornwall, by virtue of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November now instant, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder, commonly known as the Cattle Plague, do, by this notice, declare that it is expedient to prevent, until the 1st day of March next (unless this notice be in the meantime revoked), the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, absolutely to any market or fair, or to any place whatever, within the said Petty Sessional Division of Stratton, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

And, with the like view, we do by this notice further declare, that it is expedient, until the said 1st day of March next (unless this notice be in the meantime revoked), that all or any animals of the description hereinbefore named, absolutely, shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said Petty Sessional Division of Stratton.

And notice is hereby given, that after the publication of this notice, it is not lawful for any person to bring or send any such animal as aforesaid into any such market or fair, or to any place within the said Petty Sessional Division, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animals so brought or sent.

And notice is hereby further given, that after due publication of this notice, it will not be lawful for any person to bring or send any such animal as aforesaid, from any place in Great Britain beyond the said Petty Sessional Division of Stratton, into any place within such Petty Sessional Division, except with such licence as specified in the said Order of the 23rd day of November instant. And any person acting in contravention to this notice, will, for every offence, be liable to forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Under the authority of an Order by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, and made by virtue and in exercise of the powers given by an Act passed in the Session of the 11th and 12th years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter 107, intituled "An Act to prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers subsequent Acts; and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the 28 and 29 years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter 119.

WHEREAS a contagious or infectious disorder now prevails among the cattle of Great Britain,

which is generally designated the "cattle plague:"

And whereas the Petty Sessional Division of the county of Dorset, called the Dorchester Petty Sessional Division, comprises the several parishes or places following, namely:—Abbotsbury, Athelhampton, Bincombe, Bradford Peverell, Broadmayne, Broadway, Buckland Ripers, Burlestone, Charnminster, Chickereall West, Chilfrone, Compton Abbas (or West), Compton Valence (or East), Dewlish, so much of the parish of the Holy Trinity, Dorchester, as lies without the boundary of the municipal borough of Dorchester, Evershot, Fleet, so much of the parish of Fordington as lies without the boundary of the said municipal borough of Dorchester, Frampton, Frome Vauchurch, Kingston Russell, Knighton West, Langton Herring, Littlebredy, Litton Cheney, Longbredy, Maiden Newton, Melbury Sampford, Osmington, Owermoigne, Piddlehinton Piddletown, Portesham, Portland, Poxwell, Preston and Sutton Pointz, Punccknowle, so much of the parish of Radipole as lies without the boundary of the municipal borough of Weymouth and Melcombe Regis, Rampisham, Stafford West, Stinsford, Stratton, Swyrc, Tincton, Toller Fratrum, Toller Porcorum, Tolpuddle, Upwey, Warnwell, Watercombe, Whitecombe, Winterborne Abbas, Winterborne Came, Winterborne Herringstone, Winterborne Monkton, Winterborne Saint Martin, Winterborne Steepleton, Woodsford, so much of the parish of Wyke Regis as lies without the boundary of the said municipal borough of Weymouth and Melcombe Regis, and Wyndford Eagle:

And whereas the Justices acting in and for the said Petty Sessional Division are "The Local Authority" within such division as defined by the said Order in Council:

And whereas at a Petty Sessions held in and for the said division of Dorchester, this 25th day of November, 1865, we, the Justices assembled, do resolve that to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, it is expedient that the provisions of the 16 and 18 clauses of the said Order in Council shall be brought into operation. Now, therefore, we, the Justices aforesaid, as such local authority as aforesaid, do hereby declare that it is expedient to prevent the removal of all animals as defined by the said Order in Council (except sheep, lambs, and swine), to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said Petty Sessional Division of Dorchester, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, for the space of three calendar months from the 30th day of November instant. And we do further declare that it is expedient for the space of three calendar months from the said 30th day of November instant, that animals as before defined (except sheep, lambs, and swine), shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any part of the said Petty Sessional Division of Dorchester:

And we do hereby give notice, that from and after the due publication hereof, it shall not be lawful during the said period of three calendar months for any person to bring or send any such animal or description thereof (except as aforesaid) unto such market or fair, or to any place within the said Petty Sessional Division of Dorchester, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell, any such animals so brought or sent, or for any person to bring or send any such animal or description thereof (except as aforesaid) from any place in Great Britain beyond the said Petty Sessional Division of Dorchester, into any place within the said Petty Sessional Division. And that every person offending against the provisions of the said Order in Council will be

liable to forfeit for every such offence any sum not exceeding £20, which the Justices, before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.
