

to suspect that such cattle and other animals labouring under the Cattle Plague. Yet, inasmuch as it may happen that such cattle and other animals may be labouring under the disease, it is highly expedient that inspection should be made of them before they leave the Penrith and other Stations in Leath Ward aforesaid, on their route for their place of destination, more particularly as it is understood that the authorities of those places to which the cattle and other animals are to be sent, have given Orders that such animals shall not be received without an Inspector's certificate, and that in case the owners of such cattle shall bring back such cattle into Leath Ward, they will be liable to a penalty of £20.

Therefore the magistrates feel it to be their duty in order to carry out the spirit of the Government's Order in Council, to give instructions to the Inspectors of Leath Ward District, to inspect all cattle and other animals which may be found at the Penrith Station, or other stations in Leath Ward, on their route, and to give a certificate only for such cattle as they may find free from the Cattle Plague, but to deal with any for which such certificate cannot be given, as by law they are authorised to do.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Petty Sessional Division of Staincliffe West, in the West Riding of the county of York.

NOTICE is hereby given, that in pursuance of an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, and with a view to prevent the spreading of the Cattle Plague, we, the undersigned, being Justices of the Peace acting in and for the said Petty Sessional Division, at a Petty Sessions holden at the Court House, in Settle, on the 12th day of December, 1865, hereby declare that it is expedient to prevent the removal of cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, and calves from and after the 17th day of December instant, until the 1st day of March next, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said Petty Sessional Division, for the purpose of exhibition or sale. And we give notice, that during such period it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any such animal into such market or fair, or to any place within such Petty Sessional Division, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell, any such animals so brought or sent; and we further declare that it is expedient that, from and after the said 17th day of December instant, until the 1st day of March next, cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, and calves shall not be brought into any place within the said Petty Sessional Division, from any other part of Great Britain whatever. And we give notice, that during such period it shall not be lawful so to bring or send any such animal: provided, that nothing herein contained shall be held to prohibit any person from exhibiting or selling on his own land or premises, any such animal belonging to him, which has been on such lands or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale, or to prohibit any person sending or carrying any such animals by railway through the said Petty Sessional Division, or to prohibit any person bringing or sending with the license of any two Justices of the Peace acting in and for

the said Petty Sessional Division, any such animals from any land or premises in his own occupation, and beyond such Petty Sessional Division to any other land or premises in his own occupation within such Petty Sessional Division. And we hereby give notice, that the following townships comprise the Petty Sessional Division of Staincliffe West, above mentioned:—

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Notice.

County of Dumfries.

By virtue of the powers conferred by an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd November last, notice is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Dumfries, in Sessions assembled at Dumfries, on the 13th December current, declared and hereby declare that it is expedient from the 19th of December current, until the 1st day of March, 1866, to prevent the removal of animals of the following description, viz., cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, for the purpose of exhibition or sale; and that it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any such animal or description thereof, into any such market or fair, or to any place within the jurisdiction of said Justices, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animal so brought or sent.

Further notice is hereby given, that said Justices declared, and hereby declare, that it is expedient, from the said 19th day of December current, till the 1st day of March next, that animals of the following description, viz., cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder, generally designated the "Cattle Plague," shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices. And it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any such animal, or description thereof, from any place in Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of said Justices into any place within their jurisdiction.

Persons contravening any of such Orders are liable in a penalty not exceeding £20.
