THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council, relating to the "cattle plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of the 18th section of their Lordships' Order of the 23rd November, 1865 :—

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Newark.

I, THOMAS SPRAGGING GODFREY, Esquire, Mayor of the borough of Newark, in the county of Nottingham, by authority of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November last, made in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament therein mentioned, do hereby declare, that it is expedient that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, be brought to any market, fair, or to any place within the borough of Newark, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, and that it shall not be lawful, except by special permission of me, the said Mayor, or of some other Justice of the Peace for the said borough, for any person to bring or send any such animal into such market, fair, or to any place within the said borough for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or for any other purpose whatever, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animals so brought in or sent as aforesaid, within the said borough, at any time from the date of this notice until the 1st day of February next, inclusive, nor, within the said dates, from any parish other than a parish within the Petty Sessional Division of Newark, within a radius of eleven miles of the said borough, except on the production of a certificate, signed by a duly qualified Veterinary Surgeon, and countersigned by a Magistrate resident within the Petty Sessional Division through which such animals are intended to be brought or sent, that such cattle are free from disease, and that the parish from which such cattle are brought is free from infection, and no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought into the said borough, unless such certificate as aforesaid shall have been submitted to me as Mayor of the said borough, or to some other Justice of the Peace of the said borough, who shall, if he think fit, issue an Order permitting such animals to be brought into the said borough for the purpose of slaughter in the said borough, within three days, inclusive of the day on which such animals shall be so brought; such Order, on

the arrival of the said cattle in the borough, to be delivered to the Superintendent of Police for the borough of Newark.

Any person offending herein, will for any such offence forfeit a penalty not exceeding £20.

THE CATTLE PLAGUE.

Ledbury Petty Sessional Division.

WE, the undersigned, Justices of the Peace acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division of Ledbury, in the county of Hereford, being the local authority acting in execution of an Order in Council dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, do, by this notice, declare that it is expedient to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, until the 1st day of March, 1866, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within our jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale. After the publication of this notice, therefore, it will not be lawful for any person or persons, within the period aforesaid, to bring or send any such animal to such market or fair, or to any place within our jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animal so brought or sent.

And we further declare, that it is expedient that until the said 1st day of March, 1866, no animal as hereinbefore defined shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within our jurisdiction. It will not therefore be lawful, within the period aforesaid, to bring or send any such animal from any place in Great Britain beyond our jurisdiction to any place within such jurisdiction. And notice is hereby also given, that any person offending against the said Order, will be liable, in pursuance of the Act of Parliament in that case made and provided, for every such offence to forfeit £20.

Every person offending against the above-named Order is liable to a penalty of not exceeding £20.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Peebles.

THE Justices of Peace of the county of Peebles, at a Special General Meeting, held the 15th day of December, 1865, resolved, in accordance with the 18th section of the Privy Council Orders relative to Cattle Plague of date 23rd November, 1865—"That it is expedient from the 16th day of December current to the 1st day of March, 1866, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine, from any part of Great Britain, into any place within the county of Peebles."

The said Justices of Peace, at a Special General Meeting, held the 15th day of December current, also resolved, in accordance with the 16th section of the said Privy Council Order,—"That it is expedient to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine (with the exception of fat stock for immediate slaughter), in the county of Peebles, for exhibition or sale, from the said 16th December current to 1st March, 1866, and that fat cattle or animals above described, removed for exhibition or sale within said county, shall, before leaving the owner's premises, have the hair clipped off the end of the tails, and shall be taken direct to the place of exhibition or sale, and after

exhibition or sale they shall not be taken to any farm or place within said county, and shall only travel on public roads after said exhibition or sale, to or from the Railway Station, at or near the place of exhibition or sale, or the place of slaughter if within the county."

Every person offending against the above Orders is liable to be prosecuted for a penalty not exceeding £20 for each offence.

other land or premises in his own occupation within such jurisdiction.

Every person offending against the above-named Order is liable to a penalty not exceeding £20.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of Postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant:

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of Letters by Post, and for the regulating the duties of Postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office."

And whereas it is expedient to alter the rates of British postage now payable upon the letters hereinafter mentioned:

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the said recited Acts and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order, direct, and declare as follows:

1. All letters exceeding half an ounce in weight posted in any part of the United Kingdom, addressed to Gibraltar, Malta, or Egypt, or posted in Gibraltar, Malta, or Egypt, addressed to the United Kingdom, and all letters exceeding half an ounce in weight transmitted by the post between Malta, Gibraltar, or Egypt, and any British colony or foreign country through the United Kingdom, shall, in lieu of being charged with the postage payable thereon, in respect of the transmission thereof respectively between the United Kingdom and Malta, Gibraltar, or Egypt by British packet-boat, via Southampton, or by private ship direct, according to the scale of weight and number of rates contained in or referred to by any Warrant or Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or otherwise, now in force relating to any such letters, be charged with the postage payable thereon, under such Warrant or Warrants respectively, or otherwise, according to the scale of weight and number of rates contained and set forth in the 3rd clause of this present Warrant.

2. All letters exceeding half an ounce in weight posted in any part of the United Kingdom, addressed to any of the colonies or places mentioned and set forth in the schedule hereunder written, and all letters exceeding half an ounce in weight addressed to any of such colonies or places, transmitted by the post to any of such colonies or places from any British colony or foreign country through the United Kingdom, shall, in lieu of being charged with the postage payable thereon, in respect of the transmission thereof respectively from the United Kingdom to the several colonies or places mentioned and set forth in the said schedule, by the respective routes and in the manner in such schedule also mentioned, according to the scale of weight and number of rates contained in or referred to by any Warrant or Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, or otherwise, now in force, relating to any such letters, be charged with the postage payable thereon under such Warrant or Warrants respectively or otherwise, according to the following scale of weight and number of rates following, that is to say:—

3. On every such letter exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two rates of postage; And on every such letter, if exceeding one ounce and not exceeding one ounce and one half of another ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid three rates of postage; And on every such letter, if exceeding one ounce and one half of another ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid four rates of postage; And for every additional half of an ounce in weight of any such letter above the weight of two ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid one additional rate of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of an ounce in weight shall be charged as an additional half of an ounce in weight, and

each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this Warrant, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under any such Warrant or Warrants, or otherwise, as hereinbefore mentioned, if not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight.

4. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, for the regulation of the duties of postage.

5. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby altered, or any of the orders, regulations, conditions, and restrictions hereby made, and may make, and establish any new or other rates, orders, regulations, conditions, or restrictions in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

6. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

Such stamps shall be stamped or affixed, at the expense of the parties liable to pay the fees, on or to the vellum, parchment, or paper on which the proceedings, in respect whereof such fees are payable, are written or printed, or which may be otherwise used in reference to such proceedings; and where any of such fees are payable in respect of any matter or thing to be done in the Office of the Queen's Remembrancer, and it has not been customary to use in reference to such matter or thing, any written or printed document or paper whereon the stamps could be stamped or affixed, the party or his solicitor requiring such matter or thing to be so done, shall make application for the same by a short note or memorandum in writing, and a stamp, denoting the amount of the fee so payable, shall be stamped on or affixed to such note or memorandum.

3. Every officer in the Queen's Remembrancer Office, who shall receive any document to which a stamp shall be affixed, pursuant to the provisions hereinbefore contained, shall immediately, upon the receipt of such document, cancel or deface the stamp thereon by obliterating the same by means

of a stamp and printing ink, shewing the date of cancellation, and no such document shall be filed or delivered out, until the stamp thereon shall have been cancelled or defaced in manner aforesaid.

4. Where stamps impressed upon adhesive paper are used, care should be taken so to select

the stamps required to make up the amount to be affixed to any document, as that no greater number of stamps may be affixed thereto than is actually necessary.

5. These rules shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.
