The lame Letters add, That the Seralquier was still at Thebec, though there had been a Report of his being marched with the greatest part of his Troops to Larifa, the Capital City of Thessay, there to take up his Winter Quarter. The Turks are often giving them the Alarm at Athens, but it tends to no more than keeping them in breath and exercife. The General, to preferve his Discipline, hath difcarded all Profittutes from conversing with the Soldiers, which began to increase to a familalous Number. Those that are returned from thence, very much lament the de-Aruction of the Temple of Minerva, which being made a Magazine for Aumunition, was fer on Fire at the Attack by a Bomb that fell amongst the Stores.
