CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Stirling.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Stirling, in Sessions assembled, at Stirling, upon the 10th day of January, 1866, in exercise and by virtue of the powers conferred upon them, as the local authority for the county of Stirling, by the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd November, 1865, resolved and do hereby declare that it is expedient for the period from the publication of this notice, to the 1st day of March next, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or goat be brought from any other part of Great Britain, into any place within their jurisdiction as local authority aforesaid, being the county of Stirling, without the limits of the burghs of Stirling and Falkirk, in terms and within the meaning of the 18th Section of the said Order in Council, and subject to the provisions therein contained.

And notice is hereby farther given, that every person offending against the said Order, and the foregoing resolution and notice, shall for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Glamorganshire.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, held by adjournment at the County Lunatic Asylum in and for the said county, on Thursday, the 11th day of January, in the year of our Lord 1866, before Robert Oliver Jones, Richard Bassett, Esquires, and others their associates, Her Majesty's Justices assigned to keep the Peace in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, tres-

passes, and other offences done and committed in the said county.

This Court, having taken into consideration an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 23rd day of November, 1865, for the prevention of the disease called the "Cattle Plague," doth hereby order, that, with a view to prevent the extension of the disease called the "Cattle Plague," the removal of any bull, cow, ox, bullock, heifer, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine, from any part of Great Britain to any market or fair, or to any other place whatsoever within the several Petty Sessional Divisions of this county, for exhibition or sale, from this day until the 1st day of March, 1866, be absolutely prohibited; Provided that nothing in this Order shall be held to prohibit any person from exhibiting or selling, on the farm and premises held by him, any animal which shall have been on such farm or premises not less than twenty-one days previous to such sale.

And it is hereby further ordered, that the bringing of any bull, cow, bullock, heifer, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine, from any other part of Great Britain into either or any of the Petty Sessional Districts in the county of Glamorgan, be absolutely prohibited; from the date hereof until the 1st day of March, 1866, except such animals as shall be fit and intended for slaughter, and which shall have been examined and certified to be healthy by some one of the Inspectors appointed by this Court; and provided that such animals so certified shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours of the giving of such certificate, at some place to be named in such certificate; provided that it shall be lawful for any person, with the consent, in writing, of any two Justices of the Peace of the said county, to remove any such animals from any premises in his own occupation, beyond the boundaries of this county, to any other premises in his own occupation, within this county.

And it is further ordered, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be removed from any place within any one Petty Sessional Division of this county to any place in any other Petty Sessional Division of such county: Provided that it shall be lawful to remove any such animal as shall be fat, or fit for slaughter, to the place of intended slaughter, after having obtained a certificate from one of the County Inspectors that such animal is healthy, and provided that such animal be slaughtered within forty-eight hours after such removal, at some place to be named in such certi-

ficatc ; provided also, that such animals may be removed from one such Petty Sessional Division to such other division, on the certificate of one County Inspector, or the written authority of any two magistrates resident in the division from which such animals are to be removed ; and that such animals, as well fat or store, shall, as far as practicable, be removed by railway, and not by being driven along any of the public highways.

And it is further ordered, that the several Superintendents of the County Police be, and are hereby appointed Inspectors for the County for the purposes of these Orders ; and that the following persons be also appointed Inspectors for the county ; but such Inspectors are in the first instance to act within and for the several districts hereafter specified ; that is to say :—

Caerphilly, Higher.—Alfred Kent, Merthyr Tydfil.

Caerphilly, Lower.—George Boddington, Canton ; and Charles Moir, Cardiff.

Cowbridge.—Thomas Whapham, Bridgend.

Dynaspowis.—George Boddington, Canton ; and Thomas Williams, Bonvilstone.

Kibbor.—George Boddington, Canton.

Llangefelach.— Small, Swansea.

Miskin, Higher.—David Nicholas, Aberdare.

Miskin, Lower.—

Neath.—

Newcastle and Ogmore.—Thomas Whapham, Bridgend.

Swansea.—Thomas Hutchinson, Park Mill, Gower.

Every person offending against these Orders shall, for every such offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, which the Justices before whom he shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

PUBLIC NOTICE.

Kent.

At the Annual General Session of the Peace holden (by adjournment) at Maidstone, in and for the county of Kent, on the 9th day of January, in the year of our Lord 1866, before the Right Honourable Charles Earl of Romney (Chairman), the Right Honourable John Robert Viscount Sydney, the Right Honourable William Pitt Earl Amherst, and others their fellows, Justices of our Lady the Queen assigned to preserve the Peace of our said Lady the Queen in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanours done and committed therein.

1st. It is ordered that all notices heretofore issued by the Justices of the several Petty Sessional Divisions in this county as the local authorities thereof, be revoked on and from the 15th of January instant.

2nd. It is further ordered that the chief constable of this county be appointed Chief Inspector for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by the Orders of the Lords of the Privy Council of the 23rd November and 16th December last, and the notices given by the Court within their jurisdiction ; that the superintendents and sergeants under the commands of the

said chief constable be appointed inspectors for the respective divisions to which they are, for the time being, attached. And that all inspectors already appointed by any person or persons acting as such local authority as last aforesaid, be hereby re-appointed inspectors for the respective division in which they were inspectors, immediately before the said 15th day of January instant.

3rd. Whereas this Court deems that it is expedient that the following Orders should be made :—It is now hereby ordered that on and from the 15th day of January instant to the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, sheep, goat, or swine shall be removed to any market or fair, or parish or place whatsoever within the jurisdiction of the Court, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.*

4th. It is further hereby ordered that on and from the 15th day of January instant to the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought or removed from any place without the jurisdiction to any place within the jurisdiction of this Court, nor be on, nor pass over, along, or across any highway or public road within the said jurisdiction. Provided always, that nothing contained in this Order shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway through or out of such jurisdiction, or to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea, from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction to the nearest convenient railway station for the purpose of carrying it through or out of such jurisdiction.

5th. It is further ordered that the authorities of corporate towns and boroughs within the county be invited to co-operate with this county.

6th. It is further ordered that the Chairman of this Court be requested to apply to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Home Department, for power to increase the police force for temporary purposes by any number of men not exceeding 80.

7th. It is further ordered that the said Chairman of this Court be requested to write to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Home Department further to call his attention to the inadequate provisions relating to sheep, swine, and other animals, and also as to the transit of skins, hoofs, hides, horns, offal, and manure, and to express the opinion of this Court that the movement of live cattle by rail ought as soon as possible to be stopped, and more stringent measures adopted with regard to the Metropolitan markets.

8th. It is further ordered that notice of the aforesaid Orders of Court be published in the several newspapers circulating within the jurisdiction of the said Court in which the county advertisements are usually inserted.

* NOTE.—That under the Order of Council of the 23rd day of November, 1865, the exhibitor, seller, or buyer of animals so removed will be guilty of an unlawful act, and be liable to punishment accordingly.

NOTE.—Any person offending against any of the above Orders will be liable to a penalty of £20 for each animal so unlawfully dealt with.

Wilts to wit.

BE it remembered, that at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at the Town Hall, Chippenham, in and for the said county of Wilts, on Monday, the 8th day of January, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, by adjournment from Tuesday, the 4th day of January aforesaid, at Devizes, in the said county, and by previous adjournment made to such 4th day of January, from Tuesday, the 2nd day of the same month, at Devizes aforesaid, before Sir John Wither Awdry, Knight, Chairman, Henry Alworth Merewether, Esquire, the Most Honourable the Marquis of Ailesbury, the Most Honourable the Marquis of Bath, the Most Honourable the Marquis of Lansdowne, the Right Honourable the Earl of Suffolk, the Honourable Jacob, Viscount Folkestone, and others, their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of the said Queen in the county aforesaid, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanours done and committed in the said county, it is ordered and declared as follows, that is to say:—

Whereas, by virtue of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, made under the authority of the several Acts of Parliament in the said Order recited, with a view to check the spreading of a contagious or infectious disorder now prevailing among cattle, within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, which disorder is generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," the said Justices of the Peace for the said county assembled as aforesaid, on the said 4th day of January, did order, that the removal of all cattle, as specified in the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, and defined in the 4th rule of the said Order, from any parish or place in the county of Wilts to any other parish or place in the said county, and the introduction of all cattle into any parish or place within the said county, be prohibited from the 4th day of January instant, for one month, and then, if required, the prohibition be extended to the 1st day of March next.

And whereas the said Justices have resolved to alter or vary such last recited Order of the said Justices.

Now therefore, by virtue and in pursuance as well of the said recited Order of Council of the 16th day of December last, as of another Order of the said Council, dated the 23rd day of November last, the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled as first aforesaid, do, by this notice, order and declare that it is expedient,

That the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, from any parish or place in the said county of Wilts, to any other parish or place in the said county, and the introduction of any such animal into any parish or place within the said county, and the moving of any such animal upon or along any highway in the said county, for a distance greater than one hundred yards, be prohibited for one month, from the said 4th day of January, and that then, if required, the prohibition be extended to the 1st day of March next.

That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf be removed, brought, or sent to any market or fair within the said county, for the purpose of ex-

hibition or sale, for one month from the said 4th day of January.

That in case of the appearance of the Cattle Plague in or upon any farm in the said county (so long as the preceding Orders of the said Justices shall continue in force), no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be removed from such farm, until it shall be pronounced by the inspector that it will be safe that such animal should be so removed.

And notice is hereby given, that from and after the publication of this Order, any person offending against the same, will be liable, for every such offence, to forfeit a penalty of £20.

WHEREAS by authority of the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Honourable Privy Council, dated 16th December, 1865, certain powers are given to Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace in Quarter Sessions assembled.

Now, we Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Pembroke, at a General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, held at Haverfordwest, on the 3rd day of January, 1866, in pursuance of the powers above referred to, and deeming it to be expedient to prevent the introduction and spreading of the cattle plague into and within the said county, do hereby order that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or other horned animal, be allowed to be brought, or enter by sea or land, into the jurisdiction of this Court after the due publication of this Order, until the 1st day of March next (except any animal aforesaid authorized to travel through such jurisdiction by railway), and also that no animal aforesaid be carried by railway from any one place within the jurisdiction aforesaid, to any other place also within it.

After the publication of this notice, any person offending against the above Order, will for every offence forfeit a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

2.—That the Chief Constable be appointed Chief Inspector for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by the Order of the Lords of the Council of the 23rd November last and the notices given by the Court within their jurisdiction; the Superintendents and Sergeants under his command be appointed Inspectors for the respective Divisions to which they are, for the time being, attached. That the following persons be appointed Inspectors for the respective Divisions of the county, namely:—

And that all Inspectors shall make such reports and returns to the Chief Inspector as he may from time to time require. That the police be required to perform the duties imposed upon them by these Orders, in accordance with the provisions of the 19 and 20 Vict. cap. 69.

3.—That it is expedient to prevent until the 1st of March next, the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the jurisdiction of this Court for the purpose of exhibition or sale. And notice is hereby given, that it will not be lawful, after the 15th day of January

instant, until the 1st of March next, for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, into any market, or fair, or to any place within the jurisdiction of this Court, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animal so brought or sent: Provided that nothing herein contained shall be held to prohibit any person from exhibiting or selling on his own land or premises any animal belonging to him, which has been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale.

4.—That it is expedient to prevent until the 1st March next, any such animal as aforesaid being brought or sent from any part of Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of this Court, into any place within the jurisdiction of the same: And notice is hereby given, that after the 15th day of January instant until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought or sent from any part of Great Britain, beyond the jurisdiction of this Court, into any place within the jurisdiction of the same: Provided that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal as aforesaid by railway, through such jurisdiction: And provided also, that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send, with the licence of any two Justices acting in and for this county, any such animal from any land or premises in his own occupation, and beyond such jurisdiction, to any other land or premises in his own occupation and within such jurisdiction: and provided further, that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to remove any such animal which was in the possession of such person at the date of such notice, and which shall be marked and licensed by an Inspector, from part to part of any contiguous land or premises situated partly within or partly without such jurisdiction.

5.—That if any such animal as aforesaid shall be brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain to any place within the jurisdiction of this Court, it is expedient to prevent during the period aforesaid, the removal of such animal from the place of disembarkation to any other place, or from place to place within the same jurisdiction: And notice is hereby given that after the 15th day of January instant, until the 1st of March next it will not be lawful for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, which shall have been so brought by sea as aforesaid from any place within the jurisdiction of this Court to any other place within the same jurisdiction: Provided that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into the jurisdiction of this Court, by the most direct route, to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying it through or out of the same jurisdiction.

6.—That it is expedient to prevent during the period aforesaid (but subject to the limitation hereafter mentioned) the removal of any such animal as aforesaid, from any farm within which the Cattle Plague shall exist or is broken out; and also to prevent the removal of any such animal as aforesaid, along a highway, or common, or unenclosed ground, within such farm, without the license of an Inspector; And notice is hereby given, that, after the 15th day of January instant until the 1st of March next, it will not be lawful for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, from any farm within which the Cattle Plague

shall exist or has broken out, nor to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf from one part of the farm to another part, along a highway, or common, or unenclosed ground, except with the license of an inspector, such license to be produced to any inspector or police constable on demand; provided that this prohibition shall in no case continue longer than six weeks from the date of the last disappearance of the Cattle Plague from such farm, which disappearance is to be certified to the chief inspector by the veterinary inspector of the division.

7.—That it is expedient to prevent, for the period aforesaid, the removal of any such animal as aforesaid along any highway, or common, or unenclosed ground, within the jurisdiction of this Court, except between one hour before sun-rise and one hour after sun-set: And notice is hereby given, that, after the 15th day of January, instant, until the 1st day of March next, it will not be lawful for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf along any highway, or common, or unenclosed ground, within the jurisdiction of this court, except between one hour before sun-rise and one hour after sun-set.

8.—Every person offending against these regulations, will, for every such offence, be liable to forfeit any sum not exceeding £20, which the Justices, before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence, may think fit to impose.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Warwick.

1. THE Justices assembled at the Quarter Sessions held in the first week after the 28th day of December, 1865, hereby declare that from the date hereof, until the 1st day of March next, it shall not be lawful to send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (hereafter in these orders called "animal") to any market or fair, exhibition, auction, or sale, in any place within the jurisdiction of the local authority of the county of Warwick.

2. That until the 1st day of March next, the introduction of any such animal as aforesaid into any places and parishes within the said jurisdiction, from parts beyond that jurisdiction be strictly prohibited, except under the provisos in the 18th clause of the Order in Council of 23rd November, 1865.

3. That, except for the purpose of immediate slaughter, no such animal shall be moved along any highway, unless under a license that may be granted by two Justices sitting in Petty Sessions, at their discretion to the owner of such animal, for the purpose of permitting him to move in the day-time any animal being his own property, or such as shall be held by the said Justices to be his own, from one farm to another farm, both in his own occupation. That a full description of such animal or animals shall be given to such Justices in Petty Sessions, and shall be inserted in the license for the moving of such animal or animals, as well as a description of the highway along which it shall be lawful for such owner to move the same. Such license shall be valid for not exceeding one month. Provided always that should the cattle plague be proved before any Justice acting for this county

to have appeared among the stock of such owner, or within one mile thereof, the said license shall cease and determine, and notice of the determination of such license shall be given by such Justice to such owner and to the police.

4. That the removal of fat stock shall be permitted during the day-time only on the application of the buyer for a license to remove such animal, accompanied by a declaration of the seller thereof, signed before a Justice, and witnessed by him, to the effect that there has been no cattle plague on his farm for one month past, and that such animal shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours of the time specified for removal thereof. The person in whose possession any such animal is found subsequent to the forty-eight hours specified in the declaration, shall be held to be the owner thereof, and such declaration shall be preserved by the Justice who witnesses the signature to the same, who shall issue a license to the the owner for the removal of such animal in accordance with the said declaration, and such license shall specify a mark to be made upon such animal before it shall be removed for the purpose specified in the declaration. Nothing aforesaid shall interfere with the power of the Inspector for the district to forbid the removal of any animal.

5. That the police constables of the county be instructed to keep a strict look out upon all turnpike roads and highways within the jurisdiction of the local authority of the county of Warwick, and whenever they shall discover any such animal or animals being upon, or being driven along any such road or highway, without any such licence as aforesaid, to give immediate information to the Justices of the Division or their Clerk.

Any person offending against these Orders will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20, one-half whereof will be paid to the informer, pursuant to statute 11 & 12 Vic., c. 107, s. 13.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the Shire Hall, at Taunton, in and for the county of Somerset, on Tuesday, the 2nd day of January, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord, 1866, before Sir William Miles, Baronet, Edward Aysford Sanford, Esquire, Chairmen, and others, their companions, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen, in and for the county of Somerset aforesaid, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors committed in the same county.

By virtue of an Act passed in the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter 107 (which Act has since been from time to time continued by subsequent Acts, and lastly by the "Expiring Laws Continuance Act, 1865,") and of Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, respectively

dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, and the 16th day of December, 1865.

The Justices of the Peace for this county in Quarter Sessions assembled on this the 2nd day of January, 1866, and sitting as a Court of Quarter Session on this 3rd day of January, 1866, do, as the local authority constituted by the said Order of the 16th day of December, 1865, hereby (by this notice to be published on the 6th day of January instant, in a newspaper circulating within the jurisdiction of this county) order,

That, with a view to prevent the spreading of the Cattle Plague, the former notices given by the late local authorities applying to cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, shall be effectual and valid, except in so far as the same are altered and varied by the notice, orders, and provisions hereinafter contained; and that the various appointments of inspectors by the late local authorities be not revoked.

And it is further ordered, that from and after the 6th day of January instant, and until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be removed from any parish within the jurisdiction of this county to any other parish within the same jurisdiction:

Provided that it shall be lawful for any person to remove any such animal from land in his own occupation, situate in any part of a parish within the jurisdiction of this county, to land in his own occupation in any other part of the same parish, or any parish next adjacent thereto, within the jurisdiction of this county, and that if such person desire to remove any such animal to land in his own occupation in a more distant parish, no such removal shall take place except with the license of two Justices of the Peace acting in and for the Petty Sessional Division into which the said animals are required to be removed, which license shall be in writing, and shall specify the number and kinds of the animals to be removed and the place to which they are to be removed, and shall be delivered to the drover as an authority for the removal of such animals, and such animals shall be removed to the place specified in such license within two days after such license shall have been signed by the said Justices.

And it is further ordered, that until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or pig, shall be removed from place to place within any parish within the jurisdiction of this county in which the Cattle Plague shall have been certified by a duly appointed inspector to exist or to have existed within twenty-one days:

Provided that it shall be lawful for any person in the occupation of any land within such parish, during the existence of the Cattle Plague in such parish certified by the Inspector duly appointed for the district, to remove any such animal from place to place within his occupation where such removal can be made without crossing or passing along any public road, highway, or occupation road, or any land not in his own occupation.

And it is further ordered, that until the 1st day of March next, the removal of the animals before specified to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the jurisdiction of this county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, be prohibited.

And it is further ordered, that no person shall bring or send any animal before specified from any place in Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of this county, into any place within the jurisdiction of this county.

And it is further ordered, that the following persons be appointed Inspectors of Cattle for the

4. Also, that no fair or market for the purpose of exhibiting for sale, or selling any cow, heifer, bull, ox, or calf shall be held within the said county until the 1st day of March next.

6. That all Orders heretofore made by any local authority within the county, except as regards the appointment of Inspectors, are hereby revoked.

7. That a copy of this Order be forwarded by the Clerk of the Peace to the Clerks to the Magistrates in the different Petty Sessional Divisions, and to the Chief Constable of the county, with a request that he will take the necessary measures to enforce obedience to this Order.

The animals must be accompanied by a license for the removal thereof, granted by a Justice of the Peace of the county from which the said animals are brought, obtained within forty-eight hours immediately previous to the said animals being brought into the said burgh, upon a declaration emitted by the owner that such animals have not been affected by the Cattle Plague ;

2. Every such animal on being brought into the said burgh must be immediately taken direct to the slaughter-house, situated at Stirling Bridge, and there forthwith slaughtered, and to no other place within the burgh :—

All in terms of the 18th section of the said Order of 23rd November, 1865, under the exceptions contained therein.

3. That from and after the 15th current inclusive, and up to the 1st day of March next, it is expedient that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine shall be removed from any place within the burgh of Stirling, within the meaning and in terms of the 4th clause of the said Order of 16th December, 1865, under the provisions contained in that clause, and under the further provision that this declaration shall not make it unlawful for any person to remove such animals, or any of them, if free from the Cattle Plague, from the premises where they may have been for twenty-one days at least prior to such removal, for the exclusive purpose of being taken direct to the said slaughter-house situated at Stirling Bridge, and there forthwith slaughtered, or of being conveyed forthwith out of the jurisdiction of the burgh of Stirling, provided that a license for such removal shall have been obtained within twelve hours previous thereto from a magistrate of the burgh of Stirling, upon a declaration emitted by the owner in his presence that such animals and the declarant's stock have not been affected by said Cattle Plague.

2. Also, that it is expedient that, for the same period, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain to any place within the said borough of Maidenhead.

3. That it is expedient that, for the same period, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be removed from any farm or place in the said borough of Maidenhead, to any other farm or place therein; and that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall, under any circumstances, pass over, along, or across any highway or public road from place to place within the said borough.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Vienna, enclosing a copy of an Ordinance recently issued by the Austrian Government, admitting Foreign Joint Stock Companies to transact business in Austria, and of which the following are the most important provisions:—

Imperial Decree of the 29th November, 1865, concerning the admission of Foreign Joint Stock and Limited Liability Companies (except Insurance Companies) to transact business in Austria.

ART. I.—All Foreign Joint Stock and Limited Liability Companies (except Insurance Companies) are recognized as legally established in Austria, and admitted to carry on business under their titles, like any similar Company existing in Austria, provided—

- a. That they have been legally established in the country of their existence.
- b. That the Government of the country to which they may belong accords similar admission and rights to such Companies established in Austria, by way of, and on the principle of reciprocity.

c. Provided also, that the transactions of such Companies do not interfere with the State's interests and militate against the statutes of this country established for the protection of trade on the legislative principles of Austria. And finally—

d. Provided that such Companies engage to transact business in Austria according to the general laws of the country, and more especially in conformity with the present Decree.

ART. II.—The decisions as to existence mentioned in Article I, and the granting of the privilege of admission, are left to the authorities which are charged with the same, with regard to the establishment of similar Companies in Austria.

The admission may be granted either for the full term, as established by the statutes of the Foreign Company, or for a shorter term.

Every prolongation of those terms of duration, on which the original admission is based, every establishment of branches or agencies which are not comprised in the same, as also every supplementary arrangement, extension, and alteration in the statutes of the Company made abroad, must be duly submitted to the competent authorities in Austria for decision and adoption, before they can be acted upon.

ART. III.—Before any Foreign Company enters into actual operation of its business in conformity with the present Decree, or before it extends, prolongs, or alters its statutes (Article II), it is bound to publish the text and special conditions of this Decree in the public papers, established by law for this purpose, as also for any other publication concerning such Companies.

ART. IV.—The Company is bound to specify to the Administration the whole extent of its operations, and the name or names of the individuals composing the same, and to publish the same in the public papers, notifying at the same time the names of the members who are already settled or intend to be permanently settled in Austria.

The representatives of the Company in Austria have full power to represent the same, either with the Administration, Courts of Justice, or private individuals, in all things that concern the transactions of the Company.

In cases of dispute or litigation on any subject concerning the transactions of the Company, in which the latter appear as defendants, the same is subject to the jurisdiction of the usual competent Courts of Justice in Austria. Should an arbitration be agreed upon the case is to be submitted to the decision of arbitrators settled in Austria.

ART. V.—The representatives of the Company are bound to submit to the political authorities of the district where the chief seat is situated, within the first three months of every year, the following accounts concerning the transactions of the past year.

- a. The resolutions of the General Meeting.
- b. The general balance-sheet of the Company.
- c. The special balance-sheet of the operations in Austria, in which are to be separated the assets and funds employed in the Austrian transactions from the rest of the Company's property. The above balance-sheets are, moreover, also to be published in the papers.

ART. VI.—The representative members are personally responsible to the creditors here of the

Company for any damage or injury that may accrue from the incorrectness of the special balance sheet (Art. V., letter c), and which might have been avoided if more care had been employed in preparing the same.

ART. VII.—The rights and duties of such Companies admitted in Austria, are to be judged by the same laws which are established for the regulation of similar Companies at home.

Particular application have on such Companies^s the regulations on the practical supervision of the State, as far as the Companies are engaged in commercial transactions in Austria, and also on their duty of entering such transactions into the Commercial Register where such practice does exist.

Such Companies are also subject to the income and other taxes levied in Austria on trade and other undertakings, according to the regulations of the country.

ART. VIII.—The permission of the admittance becomes void and annulled :

- a. If the Company has failed to open its operations in Austria within the term expressly notified in the admittance license, or in default of such notification, within the term of six months from the date of granting such licence.
- b. If the Company has altogether discontinued its operations in Austria, for the space of three months, without the consent of Government.
- c. If the Company has ceased legally to exist in its own country, or has lost there the entire right and disposal of its capital.
- d. If the time has expired for which the license of operation in Austria had been granted.

The conditions of the terms mentioned in *a* and *b*, do not preclude the possibility that the consent of Government may cease even before the expiration of the period, as regards some special operations of the Company, in conformity with the general rules of trade.

ART. IX. Government is justified in revoking the license :

- a. If the Home Government of the Company happens to make, in the reciprocity treaty, alterations prejudicial to such companies at home (Art. I., letter b), or if—
- b. The Company itself attempts to transgress this law,

ART. X.—A special separate Decree will follow as regards the admission of Foreign Insurance Companies into Austria.

ART. XI.—The central districts which are concerned in this Decree are charged with its execution.
