THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Lords Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council, relating to the "cattle plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of the 18th section of their Lordships' Order of the 23rd November, 1865:—

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

I, ALEXANDER MAXWELL ADAMS, Provost of the Royal Burgh of Lanark, in virtue of the powers conferred upon me by the Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively 23rd November and 16th December, 1865, hereby declare, in terms of the 18th section of the first mentioned Order, that with a view to prevent the spreading of the cattle plague, it shall be unlawful for any person to bring any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf from any part of Great Britain to any place within the Royal Burgh of Lanark from the date of this notice to the 1st day of March next, under this condition that any animal of the description above specified, after being slaughtered, may be admitted into the said Burgh, if accompanied by a certificate from the Inspector of the District from which it has been sent, that such animal was free from the cattle plague immediatly previous to being slaughtered, and that it had not, to the best of his knowledge and belief, been in contact with other animals suffering from said disease, for a period of at least fourteen days prior to the date of his certificate, which certificate must be presented at the office of the Town Clerk of this Burgh within two days from its date. ,

Any person contravening this Order is liable for every breach thereof to forfeit a sum not exceeding £20.

### CATTLE PLAGUE. Borough of Plymouth.

To Cattle Dealers, Butchers, and others.

I, THE undersigned, Francis Hicks, Esq, Mayor of the borough of Plymouth, in the county of Devon, being the Local Authority acting within the district of the borough of Plymouth aforesaid,

in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, and by virtue and in exercise of the powers given to me in that behalf by certain Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date respectively the 23rd day of November and the 16th day of December, 1865, do hereby, declare, that with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder now prevalent among cattle, generally designated the "Cattle Plague," it is expedient, and I do hereby order and direct that from and after the publication of this notice until the 28th day of February next, inclusive, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, not being intended for immediate slaughter be brought into any market or fair held within the said borough of Plymouth, or to any place whatever within the said borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, and that during the same period no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, whether intended for immediate slaughter or otherwise, be brought from any place beyond the said borough of Plymouth, into any place within the said borough, except between the hours of seven in the morning and six in the evening, nor without previous notice being given to Mr. James Rowley. the Inspector appointed for the said borough, of each animal so brought into the said borough, and the production to the said Inspector of a certificate under the hand of some duly qualified Veterinary-Surgeon that such animal is in a healthy state.

And I hereby give further notice, that any person offending against the said Orders in Council, or either of them, by acting contrary to this notice, after the publication hereof, will be subject for every offence to forfeit such a sum not exceeding twenty pounds as the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted shall think fit to impose.—Dated this 13th day of January, 1866.
