Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall prohibit the removal of any such animal from one part of any farm to another part of the same farm, or the taking of any cow or heifer to the bull, or the removal, under the personal superintendence of such Inspector as last aforesaid, of any animal labouring under the said disorder, to a suitable place, for the purpose of being buried.

And I give notice, that every person offending against any of the conditions, provisions, and stipulations herein contained, will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20.

Northamptonshire to wit.

NOTICE.

WHEREAS the several notices published respectively by the Justices of the Petty Sessional Divisions of Northampton, Towcester, and Wellingborough, under the authority of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder called "Cattle Plague," are in force only until the 1st day of February now next ensuing; and whereas the Justices of the said county, assembled in Quarter Sessions, held, by adjournment, on the 11th day of January instant, did, by a notice published under the authority of another Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, alter the said notice published by the Justices of the said Division of Wellingborough, so that the same was made to extend to swine.

Now the Justices of the said county, assembled in Quarter Sessions, held on the 3rd day of January, 1866, and, by adjournment, on the 19th day of January instant, do, under and by virtue of, and in exercise of, the powers given to them by the last recited Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, renew the said notices published by the Justices of the said Divisions of Northampton and Towcester, and the notice published by the Justices of the said Division of Wellingborough, with such alteration as is aforementioned, so that the same respectively shall continue in force until the 1st day of March now next ensuing.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

I, THOMAS KIER, Provost of the burgh of Falkirk, by virtue of the power and authority conferred on me by the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, of date the 23rd day of November, 1865, hereby declare, in terms of the 16th section of the said Order, that, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," it is expedient, from this date to the 1st day of March next, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, to any place whatever within the burgh of Falkirk, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except

under the condition that they shall be, immediately after such exhibition or sale, slaughtered within my jurisdiction; and in terms of the 18th section of the said Order, I hereby declare that it is expedient, with the view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, that, from this date to the 1st day of March next, no animal, of the descriptions above specified, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the burgh of Falkirk, except under the condition that they be forthwith exhibited and sold, and immediately thereafter slaughtered within my jurisdiction.

And I hereby revoke the notice given by me of date the 22nd December, 1865.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Stamford.

WHEREAS by authority of several Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd November and 16th December, 1865, and the Orders therein respectively mentioned, I, Octavius Nowlan Simpson, Esquire, Mayor of the borough of Stamford, do give notice and declare that it is expedient that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, be brought into any fair or market within this borough, or at any other time from the date hereof until the 1st day of March next ensuing; and that no animal of the aforesaid description be brought from any place in Great Britain beyond my jurisdiction into any part of this borough, except fat stock for the purpose of being slaughtered, and that such fat stock must be slaughtered within forty-eight hours after it shall have been brought within the said borough. Provided, that any person may exhibit or sell, on his own land or premises, or land or premises in his occupation, any such animal belonging to him which has been on such land or premises for not less than twenty-eight days previous to such sale. Provided also, that persons having such animals on lands or premises in his own occupation and beyond the borough, may, but only with the license of two Justices acting in and for the said borough, bring or send such animals to any other land or premises in his own occupation within my jurisdiction.

Any person committing an offence against this Order will be liable to a penalty of twenty pounds.
