PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the eleventh of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words following; viz. :—

“Whereas your Majesty was graciously pleased by your Order in Council, dated the ninth September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, to direct that the admission of inmates into Greenwich Hospital should be restricted to such petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and such non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines as may be infirm or helpless. And whereas we are of opinion that it would be expedient to establish more definite regulations with respect to the persons who should be considered eligible to appear before us as candidates for admission into Greenwich Hospital; we beg leave to recommend that your Majesty will be pleased by your Order in Council to sanction the establishment of the following regulations. The admission of inmates into Greenwich Hospital to be confined to the undermentioned persons:

“1. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, who have been granted pensions either for long service, or for injuries received or disease contracted in your Majesty's Service, and who may be infirm or helpless.

“2. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, who have served, with good characters, for ten years continuously, or with short intervals, and who may be infirm or helpless.

“3. All petty officers and seamen of your Majesty's Navy, and all non-commissioned officers and privates of your Majesty's Corps of Royal Marines, whose claims may be special and exceptional, not coming within the above mentioned classes.

“All or any of such inmates to be discharged at the discretion of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.”

Her Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Pembroke.

WHEREAS by authority of the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Honourable Privy Council, dated 23rd of November, 1865, 16th of December, 1865, 20th of January, 1866, respectively, certain powers were given to Mayors of Boroughs, to take such steps as they may deem advisable, for the purpose of preventing the introduction of the cattle plague, within the limits of the said borough.

Notice is hereby given, that after the date hereof, it is ordered that no live cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, or any raw hides, skins, horns, hoofs (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection, be allowed to be brought or enter by sea or by land from any part of Great Britain, (except such parts as are within the limits of the county of Pembroke), into any part within the jurisdiction of the borough of Pembroke, until after the 1st day of March next.

After the publication of this notice, any person offending against the above order, will, for every offence forfeit a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

I, JOHN HARLOCK, Mayor of the borough of Banbury, in pursuance of the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, or of some or one of such Orders, do hereby declare that it is expedient, and I do hereby order that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall after the publication of this notice be brought from any part of Great Britain into the borough of Banbury, until after the 1st day of March next. And I do hereby declare this notice to be in lieu of the one issued by me on the 1st instant.

And I also give notice that any person offending herein will, for every offence, be liable to forfeit twenty pounds.

CATTLE PLAGUE.*Borough of Wallingford.*

I, JOHN HILLIARD, Mayor of the borough of Wallingford, in exercise of the powers vested in me as the local authority in the said borough, by Orders made by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, and the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, or some or one of such Orders, do declare, that with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," it is expedient, and I therefore do order, that from the 8th day of February instant, until the 1st day of March next—

1. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be moved to any market or fair, or to any parish or place whatsoever within my jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.
2. That for the same period no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought from any part of Great Britain beyond my jurisdiction to any place within my jurisdiction.
3. That for the same period no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be removed from any place in the borough of Wallingford to any other place therein.
4. That for the same period no raw or untanned hides and skins, nor any horns or hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), nor any offal of any such animal as aforesaid, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any part of Great Britain beyond my jurisdiction into any place within my jurisdiction.

And any person offending in any of the cases aforesaid, will for every offence forfeit such sum not exceeding £20, as the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted may think fit to impose.

CATTLE PLAGUE.*Borough of New Windsor, county of Berks.*

WHEREAS, a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated the "Cattle Plague," now prevails amongst cattle within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain.

And whereas I, the undersigned, Mayor of the said borough of New Windsor, am of opinion that it is expedient, with a view to check the spreading of the said disorder known as the "Cattle Plague," to prevent the removal of animals as hereinafter specified.

Now I do, in pursuance and by virtue of the powers and authorities vested in me by certain Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November last, and 16th day of December last, and 30th day of January last, and of all other powers and authorities, enabling me in this behalf, by this notice declare it to be expedient:—

1. That from the date of this notice until the 1st day of March now next ensuing, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be moved to any market or fair, or to any place whatsoever within my jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

2. That for the same period no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be brought from any part of Great Britain beyond my jurisdiction to any place within the said borough of New Windsor, except

Fat stock, previously certified by the duly appointed Inspector of Cattle for the said borough of New Windsor to be free from disease, and removed for the purpose of immediate slaughtering, and which shall be slaughtered within forty-eight hours after the same shall have been purchased, and so certified to be free from disease.

3. And, further, that it is expedient that for the same period no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be removed from place to place within the said borough of New Windsor, except fat stock, removed for the purpose of immediate slaughtering under the conditions aforesaid. And also except that every person shall be at liberty to move any cow or heifer requiring to be sent to a bull for the sole purpose of being served (either with or without another cow or heifer as a companion), or to move any bull for the sole purpose of serving any cow or heifer, such person having first obtained a certificate signed by the Inspector of Cattle for the said borough, that there is no case of cattle plague on the farm or premises of the owner of the animal to be moved, nor on the farm or premises to which it is proposed to be taken, or within two miles distance of such farms respectively, or of the declared route of such animal, and that no such case has existed during the preceding six weeks; and having also obtained the licence of a Justice of the Peace for the said borough, the said licence and certificate to be in force for three days, and at the expiration thereof to be delivered to the Superintendent of Police for the said borough, provided always that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to remove his own cattle from one part of his own occupation, where the cattle plague does not exist or has not existed for six weeks previously, to another part of the same occupation, unless such cattle, in the course of such removal, pass more than 100 yards upon a highway or upon a road through a different occupation.

4. That, for the same period, no raw or untanned hides and skins, nor any horns or hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (except

such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), nor any offal of any such animal as aforesaid, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any part of Great Britain beyond my jurisdiction into any place within my jurisdiction.

Any person acting contrary to this notice will be liable to a penalty of twenty pounds.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Rutland to wit.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the county of Rutland, holden by adjournment at the Castle of Oakham, in the said county, on Monday, the 5th day of February, 1866, before the Rev. J. H. Fludyer, Chairman, the Right Honourable Gilbert John Baron Aveland, the Honourable H. L. Noel, the Honourable W. C. E. Freke, J. M. Wingfield, Esq., G. Finch, Esq., E. N. Conant, Esq., C. C. J. Orme, Esq., and the Rev. W. Wales, Clerk, Justices of the Peace for the said county:

It was resolved that the order of this Court made on the 4th day of January last, under the authority of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 16th day of December, 1865, be confirmed, excepting so far as the same is varied by this present order.

And by authority of the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 20th day of January, 1866, and of the statutes and orders therein mentioned or referred to, the said Justices in the said adjourned Quarter Sessions assembled, did order and declare, and notice is hereby given, that, with the view of preventing the Cattle Plague, it is expedient, from the 9th day of February instant, inclusive, until the 1st day of March next, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, to any market or fair, or to any place within the county of Rutland, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy or sell any such animal so brought or sent.

That it is expedient that from the 9th day of February instant, inclusive, until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, nor any offal of any such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, be brought into the said county, from any place beyond the said county, except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America.

That it is expedient that from the 9th day of February instant, inclusive, until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported as aforesaid), nor any offal of any such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, be allowed to travel or pass along any highway in the said county without a certificate signed by two magistrates of the said county, after mature enquiry, except in cases of farmers removing such animals from one part of their farm to another within the same parish, in cases of cows going to the bull,

and in cases of fat animals going to the butcher's to be slaughtered within 48 hours, authority being also given to the police to require the production of such certificate.

That it is expedient, that from the 9th day of February instant, inclusive, until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, nor any offal of any such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, be allowed to travel or pass along any highway in the said county, between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the following morning.

That it is expedient, that from the 9th day of February instant, inclusive, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, nor any offal of any such animals, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, be under any circumstances allowed to be removed or carried along the highways in any parish or place in which the Inspector has certified that the Cattle Plague exists.

And every person committing any offence against the tenor hereof is liable for every such offence to a penalty of twenty pounds.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

I, THE undersigned, John May Miller, Esq., Mayor of the borough of Barnstaple, in the county of Devon, by virtue of the several Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively 23rd day of November, 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January now last past, do order as follows:—

That all notices given and other Acts (other than appointments of Inspectors,) done either by myself or my predecessor, Thomas Lamb Willshire, Esq., shall, from and after the first day of this month, February, be revoked, except as to any liability which have been incurred, or any legal proceedings which may have been taken, under or by virtue of any of the said Acts, and I do hereby accordingly revoke the same, except as hereinbefore accepted.

And I do also further order and declare, that all appointments of Inspectors made by the said Thomas Lamb Willshire, Esq., or by myself, remain and be in force until the 1st day of March next, unless in the meantime I do revoke the same.

And I do order and declare, that it is expedient from the said 1st day of February, until the 1st day of March next, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within my jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale. And that from and after the said 1st day of February, until the 1st day of March next, it is expedient that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, or calf, be removed from any place within my jurisdiction, to any other place within such jurisdiction, unless the owner thereof shall, previously to such removal, have obtained such a licence as shall be applicable to the case of the cattle to be removed, which licences, together with forms of application for the same, may be obtained at the police station of this borough. And I do further order and declare, that from and after the said 1st day of

February, until the said 1st day of March, it is expedient that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, be removed from any part of the said borough of Barnstaple, over or along any turnpike-road, highway, public road, or sides thereof, or any unenclosed land, to any other part of the said borough, whether under any licence or proviso herein contained, mentioned, or referred to or not, between the hour of six in the evening and six in the morning, and I hereby give notice that every person offending against the terms of this Order, will be liable to a penalty of twenty pounds.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Devizes.

I, THE undersigned, George Waylen, Mayor of the borough of Devizes, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf given to me by certain Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, and the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, or some or one of them, do by this notice declare that it is expedient, and I do hereby order and direct, that from and after the 6th day of February instant, no person shall bring any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, or any raw or untanned hides or skins, or the horns or hoofs, or the offal or dung of any such animals, from any other part of Great Britain into the said borough, except as hereinafter mentioned, namely:—Animals and articles of the description aforesaid may be sent or carried by railway through the said borough, or brought or sent with the licence of any two Justices acting in and for the said borough, by any person from land and premises in his own occupation beyond such borough, to any other land or premises in his own occupation within such borough, during a time to be specified in such licence; and animals of the description aforesaid in a fit state to be slaughtered, and the property of some person carrying on the business of a butcher and keeping a shop in the said borough, may be brought into the said borough for the purpose only of being slaughtered and on condition that they are slaughtered within forty-eight hours thereafter; and I hereby give notice, that if any person shall bring or send any animals or articles as aforesaid from any place beyond the said borough, into any place within the said borough, except as aforesaid, after the publication of this notice, such person will be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for every such offence.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Blackburn in the county of Lancaster.

By authority of the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, or one of them, in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament therein mentioned, I, the undersigned, James Thompson, Esquire, Mayor of the borough of Blackburn, do by this Notice, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally called the "Cattle Plague," declare as follows:—

1st—That it is expedient from the day of the date hereof until the 1st day of March next, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, to any market or fair or to any place whatever within my jurisdiction as Mayor of the borough of Blackburn, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

2nd—That until the said first day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall, except as in the said Orders is excepted, be brought from any part of Great Britain into any place within my jurisdiction as aforesaid except for the purpose of being slaughtered. And no such animal shall be brought to any place within my jurisdiction as aforesaid for such purpose without the license of a Justice of the Peace acting in and for the county of Lancaster, authorizing the removal of such animal through the Petty Sessional Division of the said county immediately adjacent to the borough of Blackburn first obtained. And that within two hours from the arrival of every animal brought in under the foregoing exception, notice in writing shall be given to Mr. Joseph Potts, the Chief-Constable of the Police of the said borough, of such arrival, according to a form to be obtained from the said Joseph Potts, who shall have full power to order the examination of any such animal he may suspect of labouring under the said disease by the Inspector duly appointed for that purpose, which animal shall be dealt with according to the result of such inspection as authorized by the said Orders or one of them. And that every animal so brought in under the foregoing exception shall be slaughtered within three days after it shall have been brought within such limits inclusive of the day of bringing in, and shall not be taken out of the said Borough alive.

3rd—That until the said 1st day of March next, no such animal as aforesaid, being in any place within my jurisdiction as aforesaid, shall be removed from such place to any other place within my jurisdiction unless it shall have been at such first named place for a period of 14 days, and shall be certified by the Inspector duly appointed for that purpose as being free from all suspicion of the said disease, nor without the license of a Justice of the Peace acting in and for the borough of Blackburn first obtained for that purpose.

4th—That except as in the said Orders is excepted until the said 1st day of March next, no raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal, of any of the above-named animals shall be sent from any place in Great Britain out of the said jurisdiction to any place within the said jurisdiction, and that no such articles as aforesaid be removed from any place within my said jurisdiction to any other place within my said jurisdiction unless and until the same articles have been duly certified by the said Inspector as free from any suspicion of disease, and such removal licensed by one of the Justices of the said borough.

5th—That except as in the said Orders in Council is excepted, no person shall remove or convey any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection from any place within my said jurisdiction, or carry or convey any such articles as last aforesaid on or along any road or public highway within my said jurisdiction.

6th—That every certificate of the Inspector appointed as aforesaid and every license of any Justice of the Peace as aforesaid shall only be in force and of any validity for the space of 4 days after the granting of such certificate, and such

certificate and such license whenever required shall state the place to which such animal or other article as aforesaid is required to be removed, and shall accompany the animal or the hides, skins, and other articles as aforesaid so removed, and a duplicate of such certificate shall in every case be delivered to the said Joseph Potts, the Chief-Constable of the said borough, or left at the Police Office in the Town Hall, in the said borough, but such certificate shall authorize the removal of any such animal as aforesaid only whilst such animal shall continue free from disorder.

7th.—That until the said 1st day of March next, no animal as aforesaid nor any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal of any such animal shall be brought into the said borough, nor shall be removed from one place to another within the said borough, except between the hours of 6 o'clock in the morning and 6 o'clock in the evening.

Any person in anywise offending in the premises, will for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding £20 which the Justices before whom he or they shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

Kincardineshire.

At a meeting of the Justices of the Peace for the county of Kincardine held at Stonehaven, on the 8th day of February, 1866, whereof Sir John Hepburn, Stuart Forbes, Baronet, Convener of the county was Chairman, it was resolved under the powers conferred by the several Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, and the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, and with reference to their order or notice of 1st February, 1866, the Justices hereby resolve and give notice as follows:—

The fourth resolution of said order or notice is hereby amended by deleting the words "such certificate to be countersigned before removal of the animals, by a delegate from the parish from which such are to be removed, and by a delegate from each of the parishes through and to which such animals are to pass," and substituting in their room the words "such certificate, if the animals are going to the nearest railway station, to be countersigned by a delegate from the parish from which such animals are to be removed, and if the animals are going to any other place within the county, to be further countersigned by a delegate of the parish to which they are to be taken."

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Renfrew.

NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Renfrew, in Sessions assembled, have resolved and declared,

and do hereby, in virtue of the Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated 20th January last, resolve and declare, that it is expedient, from the date of the publication of this notice until the 1st day of March next, that the resolutions and declarations contained in the notice published by authority of the said Justices, dated 4th January last, shall extend to all raw or untanned hides and skins, and all horns or hoofs, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America, and to the offal of any such animals; and also to all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, to the effect aftermentioned, viz. :—

First. That for the period above mentioned, it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any such hide, skin, horn, hoof, offal, dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter from any place in Great Britain, beyond the jurisdiction of the said Justices, into any place within such jurisdiction.

Second. That for the period above mentioned it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any such hide, skin, horn, hoof, offal, or dung from any place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices to any other place within the said jurisdiction; and that it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any hay, straw, fodder, or litter from any premises in which the cattle plague has existed, or may at the time exist, within the said jurisdiction, to any other place within or beyond the said jurisdiction. The above resolutions and declarations being always subject to the provisos set forth in the said Order in Council, and to the further proviso that the same shall not extend to the sweepings of streets or the cleanings of ash-pits and privies under the control of Police Commissioners, or to the removal of manure from one part of a farm to another part of the same farm.

And notice is hereby further given, that any person contravening the said resolutions and declarations, or any of them, shall for every offence forfeit any sum not exceeding £20, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted may think fit to impose.

Stewartry of Kirkcudbright.

Notice.

By virtue of the powers conferred by an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 20th day of January, 1866, notice is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the stewartry of Kirkcudbright, in sessions assembled at Kirkcudbright upon the 2nd day of February, 1866, hereby declare that it is expedient from this date to the 1st day of March 1866, that no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any place beyond the boundary of the stewartry of Kirkcudbright into any place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, and the said Justices do hereby order accordingly. It appears to the said Justices that all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, brought from any part of the county of Dumfries, or from any burghs therein, is likely to propagate infection.

Notice is also hereby given, that said Justices further ordered, and do hereby order that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be

removed from any farms, village, or hamlet, on which the cattle plague may have existed, or may exist, or may hereafter be declared by the District Inspector to exist, into any other place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices.

Provided always, that in case any of the District Inspectors shall hereafter declare that the cattle plague exists in any burgh within the boundary of the stewardry of Kirkcudbright not subject to the jurisdiction of the said Justices, no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, as aforesaid, shall be removed from within the said burghs to any place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices.

Provided also, that no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, as aforesaid, shall be removed from any farm, or from any village or hamlet within the jurisdiction of said Justices, where the Cattle Plague exists, or has existed, or may hereafter be declared by the District Inspector to exist, into any other place within the jurisdiction of said Justices.

The above orders to continue in force from this date to the 1st day of March, 1866.

Any person offending against the above orders shall for every such offence forfeit a sum of money not exceeding twenty pounds sterling, as the Justices may think fit to impose.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the county of Derby, holden at Derby, on Tuesday, the 2nd day of January, 1866, and thence continued by several adjournments to Wednesday, the 7th day of February, before Thomas William Evans, Esq., M.P., Chairman, Robert William Mills Nesfield, Esq. (Deputy Chairman), and others, Justices, &c., appointed to preserve the Peace in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies and trespasses in the said county committed:

Pursuant to, and by virtue of an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, of the 20th day of January, 1866, and of the statutes and orders therein mentioned or referred to, the said Justices (being the local authority in and for the said county of Derby,) have at the said adjourned Sessions, held on the said 7th day of February instant, resolved to declare and do hereby declare and give notice, that within the jurisdiction of the Justices of the said county, in Quarter Sessions assembled, that is to say, the whole of the said county, except the borough of Derby:

1. That it is expedient that from the 10th day of February instant until the 1st day of March next, no raw or untanned hides or skins, or any horns or hoofs of any animals, as defined by an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council of the 23rd day of November, 1865 (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs, as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), that is to say, of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, or swine, or the offal of any such animals as aforesaid, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any place in Great Britain beyond such jurisdiction into any place within such

jurisdiction. Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, by railway through such jurisdiction, or to bring or send, with the license of any two Justices of the said county, any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, from any land and premises in his own occupation, and beyond such jurisdiction, to any other land or premises in his own occupation within such jurisdiction, during a time to be specified in such license.

2. That from the 10th day of February instant, until the 1st day of March next, the clause No. 5, of the order made at an adjourned General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of the county of Derby, on the 24th day of January last, shall extend to all animals as defined by the said Order of the 23rd day of November, 1865, and hereinbefore specified; and also to all raw or untanned hides and skins, and all horns and hoofs of any such animals (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), and to the offal of any such animals as aforesaid; and also to all dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection. Provided always that nothing contained in this clause of this order shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animals, or any such hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction, to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying them through or out of such jurisdiction.

3. That it is expedient that after the word "homestead" in the clause 5, No. 8, of the said order of Sessions of the 24th of January last shall be added the words "or to or from the nearest public watering place;" so that after the said 10th day of February instant, the said clause 5, No. 8, shall be read and construed as if the words "or to or from the nearest public watering place" had been originally inserted therein.

4. That the certificate required by clause 5 of the said order shall (except in case of fat animals purchased by a butcher for immediate slaughter, and removed direct to some slaughter-house) state (in addition to the matters required by the said order) that the animal proposed to be removed has not been exposed at any sale by auction within seven days of the date of such certificate.

And it is hereby ordered that these Sessions be adjourned to Wednesday, the 21st day of February instant, to be then held at the County Hall, in Derby, at twelve o'clock.

And in lieu thereof they now also resolve and declare that, on and after said date, and until the 1st day of March next—

1. No cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be sent or brought to any fair or market, or to any place within the county of Linlithgow, under the jurisdiction of the Justices of the Peace of the same, for the purposes of exhibition or sale. But nevertheless, That any person may exhibit or sell on his own land or premises any of such animals belonging to him which have been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days prior to such sale.

2. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, or sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hides or skins, or horns, or hoofs of any of said animals; nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into the county of Linlithgow, within the jurisdiction of the said Justices of the Peace, except upon the following conditions, viz. :—

That any of the said animals and articles may be brought into said jurisdiction on a written and signed certificate being obtained from two Justices of the Peace residing near the place from which the same are brought, to the effect that said cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, or sheep, lamb, goat, or swine; or, as the case may be, that said dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter are not from a farm or from premises where the said cattle plague exists, or has existed for the last four months; or from the seller, or owner, or superintendent of a slaughter-house, that said hides or skins, hoofs, or horns, are not from an infected animal, and have not been in contact with other hides, skins, hoofs, or horns from any such animal or animals. Said certificate to be exhibited, when demanded, to any Constable or Magistrate of said county of Linlithgow.

3. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hides or skins, or hoofs, or horns of such animals, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter shall be removed from place to place within said county of Linlithgow, within the jurisdiction of said Justices, or to the borders of the same, except as follows, viz. :—

1. That any of said animals and articles may be removed from place to place upon and within the same farm or premises, or within the immediately adjoining farms or premises held under the same tenant or possessor.

2. That any of said animals and articles may be removed from place to place within said county of Linlithgow and said jurisdiction, provided that a signed license to remove the same be obtained from a neighbouring Justice of the Peace, proceeding upon a solemn declaration by the sender or owner, or his manager, in terms of the Act 5 and 6

William IV, cap. 62, having the force of an oath, emitted before him, to the effect that none of said cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, or swine so required to be removed, are at the time labouring under, or infected with, said cattle plague, and are not from an infected herd, or flock, or byre, shed, or court where infected animals are, or have been, and have not been in contact with any animal infected with said disease; or, as the case may be, that said dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter is not from a farm or from premises on which said disease exists at the time, or has existed at any time within the last four months; or, that said hides, or skins, horns, and hoofs are not from animals which were infected, or which have died, or been slaughtered on account of said disease. Said license to be in duplicate, and to contain the number, if more than one, and description of such animal or animals, and such articles so to be removed, the place to which they are to be sent, and the purpose of removal; and said declaration, together with one of said licenses, to be forthwith transmitted by the said Justice of Peace to the Clerk of the Peace at Linlithgow, for the information of the Justices.

4. That any of said animals taken or sent to a butcher within the said county and jurisdiction for slaughter, or out of the same, for the like purpose, shall not be allowed again to leave the premises of said butcher alive, or to be brought back again alive to said county and jurisdiction.

The foregoing rules and regulations are independent of, and in addition to, the Special Orders issued by the said Privy Council, in regard to places and parties where and when the cattle plague has actually broken out, and they do not apply to any of the said animals or articles when sent or carried by railway through said county of Linlithgow and jurisdiction of the Justices aforesaid.

Now, therefore, this Court doth hereby give notice, order, and declare, that notwithstanding any provision to the contrary contained in the said order, declaration, or notice of the 29th day of January last, it shall be lawful, on and after the 10th day of February instant and until the 1st day of March next, for any person or persons to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or lamb which shall or may be brought or conveyed by railway to the railway station at Southport aforesaid, from such station direct to some licensed slaughterhouse or slaughterhouses within the limits of "The Southport Improvement Act, 1865" (situated not further than half a mile from such station), there to be slaughtered within 24 hours: Provided always, that each such animal as aforesaid shall be certified, before leaving such station, by some Veterinary Surgeon or Market Inspector, to be appointed for that purpose by the Southport Improvement Commissioners, to be free from the disorder called the "Cattle Plague."

2. And this Court doth hereby further give notice, order, and declare, that notwithstanding any provision to the contrary contained in the said order, declaration, and notice of the 29th January last it shall be lawful on and after the 10th day of February instant and until the 1st day of March next, for any person or persons to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or lamb which shall or may be brought or conveyed by railway to the Runcorn Gap railway station at Widnes aforesaid, or by any boat or other vessel on the River Mersey to the Widnes and West Bank Docks respectively at Widnes aforesaid, from such station and docks respectively direct to some licensed slaughterhouse or slaughterhouses within the jurisdiction of the Widnes Local Board (such slaughterhouse or slaughterhouses being situate on the south side of, and being not further than half a mile from, the said Runcorn Gap Railway Station), there to be slaughtered within the space of 24 hours: Provided always that each such animal as aforesaid shall be certified, before leaving such station or docks respectively, by some Veterinary Surgeon or Market Inspector, to be appointed for that purpose by the Widnes Local Board, to be free from the disorder called the "Cattle Plague."

3. And this Court doth hereby further give notice, order, and declare, that notwithstanding any provision to the contrary contained in the said order, declaration, and notice of the 29th of January last, it shall be lawful, on and after the 10th day of February instant and until the 1st day of March next, for any person or persons to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or lamb which shall or may be brought or conveyed by railway to the railway station at Saint Helen's aforesaid, from such station direct to some licensed slaughterhouse or slaughterhouses within the limits of "The Saint Helen's Improvement Act, 1855" (situated not further than half a mile from such station), there to be slaughtered within the space of 24 hours: Provided always that each such animal as aforesaid shall be certified, before leaving such station, by some Veterinary Surgeon or Market Inspector, to be appointed for that purpose by the Saint Helen's Improvement Commissioners, to be free from the disorder called the "Cattle Plague."

And whereas by the said Order or Declaration of the 29th January last, it was provided that notwithstanding any provision to the contrary in such Order or Declaration contained, it should and might be lawful for any person or persons to carry, drive or convey any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or lamb along the turnpike road leading from the borough of Liverpool to the Liverpool Cattle Market at Stanley, or by railway from the said borough to the said market, direct to such market and back again into the said borough. And it was further provided that every such animal as last aforesaid, before leaving the said borough, should be certified by some veterinary surgeon or other duly qualified Cattle Plague Inspector, to be free from the disorder called the Cattle Plague, and that such certificate should accompany every animal so carried, driven or conveyed as last aforesaid, and should be produced by the person driving or otherwise removing any such animal as last aforesaid whenever required. And it was also provided that every such animal as last aforesaid should be kept on the said road or railway and should not be permitted to be taken or driven along the said road further than to the said market or into any field, yard or other place on either side of such road or railway.

And whereas it appears to the Justices now

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here assembled to be expedient that the said Order or Declaration of the 29th of January last should be further altered and varied in manner following:—

4.—Now, therefore, this Court doth hereby give notice, order, and declare that notwithstanding any provision to the contrary contained in the said Order or Declaration of the 29th of January last, it shall and may be lawful on and after the 10th day of February instant, and until the 1st day of March next, for any person or persons driving or otherwise conveying any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf along the said turnpike road leading from the said borough of Liverpool to the said cattle market at Stanley to make use of all or any of the sheds now erected or which may hereafter be erected on the fields or premises abutting on the said turnpike road between the boundary of the said borough and the said market: provided that immediately after the holding of every market or fair each of such sheds shall be white-washed, and such sheds and the yards adjacent thereto shall be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected in accordance with the regulations to be from time to time made for this purpose by the Court of Quarter Sessions, and to the satisfaction of an Inspector or Inspectors to be appointed by the said Court for the purpose of carrying out such regulations; and provided also that each of such sheds shall, before being again used, be certified by one of such Inspectors as aforesaid to be free from the said disorder called the "Cattle Plague," or any suspicion thereof.

That it is expedient that all cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, and goats shall be excluded from the Newbury Cattle Market henceforth, and until the 1st March next, or until this notice be varied or revoked.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, Parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post, and by the same Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by a certain Warrant in writing under their hands, bearing date at Whitehall Treasury Chambers, the 20th day of March, 1865, in exercise of the powers reserved to them in and by the said hereinbefore-recited Acts of Parliament, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, did order and direct that all packets consisting of patterns or samples, posted in the United Kingdom, might be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom, subject to the several rates of postage and regulations therein contained.

And whereas it is expedient to reduce, in the manner hereinafter set forth, the postage now chargeable under the said recited Warrant on the packets therein mentioned, and for that purpose to repeal the said recited Warrant, and the rates of postage and regulations therein mentioned and contained.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore-recited Acts of Parliament, and each of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows; that is to say:

1. All packets, consisting of patterns or samples, posted in the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom, subject to the several rates of postage, and to the several orders, directions, regulations and restrictions hereinafter mentioned and contained; that is to say:

2. On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of two pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding eight ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of four pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding eight ounces and not exceeding twelve ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of sixpence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding twelve ounces and not exceeding sixteen ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of eight pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding sixteen ounces and not exceeding twenty ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of ten pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding twenty ounces and not exceeding twenty-four ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of one shilling.

3. No such packet which shall exceed twenty-four ounces in weight, or which in length shall exceed two feet, or in breadth or depth one foot, shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant.

4. There shall be no enclosure sealed, or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure not authorised by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet.

5. There shall be no writing or printing upon any such packet, or on the cover thereof, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and number and price of the pattern or sample contained therein, nor shall there be any writing or printing in any such packet except the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and number and price of the pattern or sample contained therein, which shall in all such last-mentioned cases be written or printed on labels attached to the pattern or sample.

6. All such packets shall be sent in covers open at the ends so as to be easy of examination; nevertheless, samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers may be enclosed in boxes or in bags of linen, or of other material which shall be fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened, but closed bags, if transparent, may be used for the purpose.

7. If any packet, sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions aforesaid shall exceed twenty-four ounces in weight, or shall in length exceed two feet or in breadth or depth one foot, or if there shall be any writing or printing upon any such packet, pattern, or sample, or label attached thereto, or on the cover thereof, except as in the fifth clause of this Warrant mentioned; or if any such packets shall not be sent in covers open at the ends so as to be easy of examination (except samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers, and which may be enclosed in boxes or in bags of linen, or of other material which shall be fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened, or for which closed transparent bags may be used, or in case of boxes or bags (except closed transparent bags) being used, if such boxes or bags shall be so closed that they cannot be readily opened, every such packet shall and may be detained and opened and (at the option of the Postmaster-General) be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination, and every such packet on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall, at the discretion of the Postmaster-General, be chargeable with any rate or amount of postage he shall think fit not exceeding a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter if the postage had been paid when posted, nor less than the rate of postage which such packet would have been chargeable with if authorized to be transmitted by the post.

8. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions aforesaid, shall contain any enclosure, sealed or

otherwise closed against inspection, or any other enclosure not authorized by this Warrant, every such enclosure may be taken out by any officer of the Post Office, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be forwarded to the address on the packet, charged not only with the full rates of postage as an unpaid letter, but also with a further and additional rate of postage of one penny, and the remainder of the packet, if duly prepaid by stamps, may be forwarded to the place of its address without any extra charge.

9. The postage of all such packets as aforesaid shall in every case be paid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp, or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon under or by virtue of this Warrant.

10. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions aforesaid, shall be posted without having thereon or affixed thereto any postage stamp, every such last-mentioned packet shall be forwarded charged with a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable, under and by virtue of this Warrant, if the postage had been paid by stamps when posted. And if any such packet shall be posted, having thereon or affixed thereto a stamp or stamps the value of which shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under and by virtue of this Warrant, but equal in amount to one penny at the least, every such last-mentioned packet shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of the difference between the value of such stamp or stamps so being thereon or affixed thereto and the postage to which such packet would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of two pence.

11. Any packet posted in the United Kingdom, containing any razor, scissors, knife, fork, or other sharp or pointed instrument, keys, watch machinery, metal, metal tubing, or ore, or such like, shall and may (notwithstanding anything in a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 28th day of November, 1844, contained to the contrary) be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom, subject to the several rates of postage, and to the several orders, directions, regulations, and restrictions hereinbefore mentioned and contained; provided that every such razor, scissors, knife, fork, or other sharp or pointed instrument, keys, watch machinery, metal, metal tubing, or ore, or such like, so contained in any packet, be securely packed and guarded. And every such packet shall not only conform in every respect to the several orders, directions, regulations, and restrictions hereinbefore contained, but the same shall also furnish sufficient protection against injury to the officers of the Post Office, and to the contents of the mail bags: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorize the transmission by the post within the United Kingdom of any packet containing any explosive or other dangerous material or substance.

12. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post, under the authority of the eleventh clause of this Warrant, shall be posted or transmitted by the post without being securely packed and guarded, and without furnishing sufficient protection against injury to the officers of the Post Office, and to the contents of the mail bags, as in such eleventh clause of this

Warrant provided (of which the Postmaster-General shall be the sole judge), every such respective packet shall and may be detained and opened, and (at the option of the Postmaster-General) shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed; and every such packet, on being so returned or given up, shall be chargeable with any rate or amount of postage the Postmaster-General shall think fit, not exceeding the letter rates of postage.

13. In order to prevent any obstacle to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, any officer of the Post Office may delay the transmission of any packet posted or forwarded by the post under the provisions of this Warrant for the space of twenty-four hours after the time at which the same ought to be dispatched, in due course of the post, whenever it may be necessary so to do, or (at his option) until the dispatch of the mail next after that by which the same ought in due course of the post to be forwarded by him.

14. In all cases in which any question shall hereafter arise, whether any packet or any pattern or sample contained therein, transmitted under or by virtue of this Warrant is entitled to the privileges of this Warrant and to be so transmitted within the intent and meaning thereof, such question shall be referred to the determination of the Postmaster-General, whose decision thereupon shall be final and conclusive upon all parties.

15. All packets transmitted by the post under the provisions aforesaid shall in all respects (save and except as is hereinbefore mentioned and directed) be transmitted in conformity with and under and subject to the same or the like orders, directions, regulations, and conditions for the time being in force, and applicable to packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom.

16. The several terms and expressions hereinbefore used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 96.

17. The said recited Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 20th day of March, 1865, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed, revoked, and annulled, and the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage therein mentioned and set forth, shall wholly cease and determine.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by a certain Warrant bearing date the 16th day of October, 1857, did order and direct that all packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, posted in the United Kingdom might be transmitted by the post within the United Kingdom subject to the several rates and regulations thereafter contained.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, since the making of the said recited Warrant of the 16th day of October, 1857, have from time to time, by divers Warrants, made further regulations relating to packets transmitted by the inland book-post.

And whereas it is expedient to reduce the postage now chargeable on packets transmitted by the inland book-post in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we do further order, direct, and declare as follows, that is to say:

18. That all packets exceeding eight ounces in weight transmitted by the post under the authority

of the said recited Warrant of the 16th day of October, 1857, or under the authority of any other Warrant or Warrants of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, now in force relating to the inland book-post, shall in lieu of being charged with the postage payable thereon, in respect of such transmission thereof, according to the scale of weight and number of rates contained in, or referred to, by the said recited Warrant of the 16th day of October, 1857, or other Warrant or Warrants respectively as aforesaid, be charged with such postage according to the scale of weight and number of rates following; that is to say:

On every such packet exceeding eight ounces and not exceeding twelve ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, one uniform rate of postage of three pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding twelve ounces and not exceeding sixteen ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, one uniform rate of postage of four-pence;

And for every additional four ounces in weight of any such packet above the weight of sixteen ounces there shall be charged, taken, and paid an additional rate of postage of one penny, and every fractional part of such additional four ounces in weight shall be charged as an additional four ounces in weight.

19. The several Warrants hereinbefore recited or referred to, relating to the inland book-post, shall, save so far as the same are altered or affected by this present Warrant, continue in full force and effect as fully and effectually as if the scale of weight and number of rates mentioned and contained in the 18th clause of this Warrant had been inserted in the said recited Warrant of the 16th day of October, 1857, in lieu of those therein contained, applicable to packets exceeding eight ounces in weight.

20. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, revoke, or modify any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

21. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.
