W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirtyfour; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the ninetcenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the first day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fiftyninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of district chapelries to the consecrated church situate at Heathery Cleugh, in the parish of Stanhope, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham; to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate in Weardale, in the same parish; and to the consecrated church situate at Rookhope, in the same parish respectively.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to each of the said churches, situate at Heathery Cleugh, Weardale, and Rookhope, as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient, firstly, that all that part of the said parish of Stanhope, which is described in the first schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and numbered I, should be assigned to the said church situate at Heathery Cleugh aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Heathery Cleugh; secondly, that all that other part of the same parish of Stanhope, which is described in the second schedule hereunder writ-, ten, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and numbered II, should be assigned to the said church of Saint John, situate in Weardale aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John-in-Weardale;' and thirdly, that all that other part of the same parish of Stanhope which is described in the third schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delincated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed and numbered III, should be assigned to the said

church situate at Rookhope aforesaid, and that the same should be named. 'The District Chapelry of Rookhope.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Charles, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham (testified as aforesaid), we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at each of the said churches, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the several ministers of the same churches for the time being respectively.

We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The FIRST SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Heathery Cleugh, being :---

"All that part of the parish of Stanhope, in the county of Durham, and in the diocese of Durham, which is situate to the west of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said county of Durham from the county of Northumberland, at a point distant twenty-five chains, or thereabouts, to the east of Park Gate ; and extending thence in a direct line south-eastward for a distance of thirty-seven chains, or thereabouts, to a point called Middlehope Head on the boundary dividing the township of Forest Quarter in the said parish of Stanhope from the township of Park Quarter in the same parish, such point being situate at the extreme north-western angle of the said township of Park Quarter; and extending thence, first southward, and then south-eastward, along the said township boundary as far as the point where it meets the northern side of Sedling Rake-road; and extending thence north-westward along the northern side of such road for a distance of thirteen chains, or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of the stream which flows down the centre of Elmford Cleugh; and extending thence south-westward across the said road to and along the middle of such stream to its junction with the River Wear ; and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said river as far as the centre of Blackdeanbridge, which carries over such river the road leading from West Black Dean; and extending thence in a direction generally south-westward along the middle of the last-described road to its junction with the road leading from Ireshope Burn to Wearhead; and extending thence north westward along the middle of the last-de-scribed road for a distance of twenty-one chains, or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the house called 'Lane Side;' and extending thence south-westward, and in a direct line for a distance of thirty-one chains, or thereabouts, (passing close to the west of the house called Ullstield'), to a point in the middle of Grasshill Causeway, about midway between the house called Ling Riggs and the house called Winter Gap; and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named road, for a distance of six chains, or thereabouts, to a point opposite to the last-named house, and also opposite to the middle of the north-eastern end of Low-lane; and extending thence south-westward to and along the
