to the north-eastern end or source of the stream which flows through Brandon Walls Cleugh; and continuing thence still south-westward along the middle of the same stream (passing under the road which leads from Bolt's Burn to Stanhope), to the junction of the said stream with Brandon Burn ; and continuing thence still south-westward along the middle of Brandon Burn to its junction with Rookhope Burn ; and extending thence in a direct line westward for a distance of forty-five chains or thereabouts, to a point in the middle of the line of the Rookhope and Middleshope Railway, opposite to the north-western corner of the house called 'Bishop's Seat'; and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said line of railway, for a distance of forty-five chains or thereabouts, to the point at or about the south-eastern end of Crow's Cleugh, on the southern boundary of Northgate Fell; and ex-tending thence, first westward along such southern boundary, and then north westward along the western boundary of the said Fell, to its junction at Windy Hill, with the boundary dividing the township of Forest Quarter, in the said parish of Stanhope, from the township of Park Quarter, in the same parish; and continuing thence northwestward along the same boundary, to the extreme north-western angle of the said township of Park Quarter, called Middlehope Head ; and continuing thence still north-westward and in a direct line for a distance of thirty-seven chains or thereabouts, to a point on the boundary which divides the said county of Durham from the county of Northumberland, such point being distant twenty-five chains or thereabouts to the east of Park Gate."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty, King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirtyfour; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the unnetcenth and twontieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the first day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fiftyninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your

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Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Wilfrid, situate at Hayward's Heath, in the parish of Cuckfield, in the county of Sussex, and in the diocese of Chichester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Wilfrid, situate at Hayward's Heath aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Cuckfield which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned to the said church of Saint Wilfrid, situate at Hayward's Heath aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Wilfrid, Cuckfield.'

"And, with the like consent of the said Ashhurst Turner, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester (testified as aforesaid), we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Wilfrid, Cuckfield, being :--

"All that part of the parish of Cuckfield, in the county of Sussex, and in the diocese of Chichester, which is situate to the east of an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides such parish from the parish of Lindfield, in the same county and diocese, at a point opposite to a boundary stone inscribed 'C. S. W. D. C., 1866, No. 1,' and placed on the western side of the Board Hill-road, opposite to the middle of the north-castern end of the fence dividing the close numbered 641 upon the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Cuckfield, and upon the map hereunto annexed from the close numbered 640 upon the same maps, such point being distant about thirty-eight chains and a half to the north-west of the bridge by which the line of the London, Brighton, and South Coast Railway crosses the said road; and extending south-westward to such boundary stone, and continuing in the same direction to and along the middle of the said fence, and along the middle of the tences dividing the closes numbered respecifively 636, 630, 629, 625, 624, and 655 upon the said maps, from the closes numbered respec-tively 640, as aforesaid, 621, 623, 597, and 590 upon the same maps, to the junction of the fence
