NOTICE is hereby given to the Officers, Seamen, and Marines, and to all persons interested therein, that the distribution of the tonnage bounty of a slave dhow, name unknown, captured on the 4th January, 1865, by Her Majesty's ship "Orestes," will commence on Tuesday, the 27th instant, in the Prize Branch of the Department of the Accountant-General of the Navy, Admiralty, Somerset House."

Agents and other persons holding powers of attorney, prize orders, assignments, or other instruments, by virtue of which they may be legally entitled to claim the share of any captor, serving in the above-named ship, are requested to present the same at this office.

Any Officer, Seaman, Marine, or other person, who may desire to receive his share from the Collector of Customs or of Inland Revenue within the United Kingdom, is required to intimate the same by letter to be addressed "On Prize Business, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, London," (enclosing his certificate of service or an attested copy thereof, excepting in the case of Commissioned Officers), — in which letter his own place of residence is to be precisely stated, as well as the place of the nearest Collector of Customs, or

CATTLE PLAGUE.—ISLE OF MAN.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Legislature of the Isle of Man, entitled "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1865," the Lieutenant-Governor is authorized, by and with the advice and consent of any two Members of the Council, from time to time to make such Orders and regulations as may appear to be necessary to prevent the introduction of the cattle disease, commonly known as the "Cattle Plague," into the said Isle.

The Lieutenant-Governor, therefore, by virtue and in exercise of the powers given by the said Act, hath ordered as follows:—

1. That the Order contained in his Proclamation, bearing date the 18th October, 1865, so far as the same prohibits the importation of animals from that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland, and also the Proclamation bearing date the 29th day of January, 1866, be and the same are hereby revoked.

2. That from the date of this Order, no carcase, nor any portion of the carcase of any bull, cow, ox, heifer, steer, calf, tup, sheep, wether, or lamb, shall be imported into this Isle, or into any of the ports thereof, except from that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland.

3. That from the date of this Order, no turnips, hay, straw, or other fodder, no offal, dung, litter, bones, or any manure, except guano, shall be imported into this Isle, or into any of the ports thereof, except from that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland.
