**REGULATIONS**

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S COURTS AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The number of Ladies and Gentlemen attending each Court will be limited to two hundred and fifty, including those who will be presented to Her Majesty.

It is expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at Her Majesty's Courts only when in attendance upon the Ladies of their families.

Those Gentlemen who have not been presented to The Queen will, under such circumstances, be eligible for presentation to Her Majesty at these Courts.

The presentation of Ladies and Gentlemen will be limited to one hundred at each Court.

Ladies and Gentlemen wishing to attend Her Majesty's Courts must send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, S.W., on or after Thursday the 1st of March, and these names will be submitted for Her Majesty's approval in the order of their receipt at the Office.

All applications must be made in writing, and no names will be received previous to the 1st of March.

Ladies and Gentlemen who desire to be presented to Her Majesty must, in like manner, send in their names and addresses to the Lord Chamberlain's Office within the days above-mentioned. A letter from the Lady or Gentleman by whom each presentation is to be made must in all cases be forwarded.

The Queen has been graciously pleased, with regard to these Courts, to dispense with the regulation that the Lady or Gentleman must attend

the Court at which they propose to make presentations to Her Majesty.

The Lord Chamberlain will forward to all persons who can be received under the above regulations, cards for their admission to Buckingham Palace at the Court which Her Majesty shall be pleased to appoint for their reception.

In sending in their names Ladies and Gentlemen are requested to mention the Court which they would prefer to attend.

All those Ladies and Gentlemen who receive cards of admission to Buckingham Palace are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in attendance and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty. In the case of presentation the name of the presenter must be inserted on the card.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court an hour previous to each Court.

**REGULATIONS**

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

*By Her Majesty's Command.*

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's

Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

#### PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the fourteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas by the fifth section of an Act passed in the twenty-ninth year of your Majesty's reign, chapter eighty-nine, entitled ‘An Act to provide for the better government of Greenwich Hospital,’ it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for your Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, to appoint such pensions as seem fit to officers of your Majesty's Navy, for the time being, entitled to the benefits of Greenwich Hospital, to be enjoyed by them so long only as they are not on the establishment or inmates of Greenwich Hospital, but in addition to any half-pay, pension, or other allowance coming to them otherwise than under any such Order in Council, and to prescribe the conditions on which such pensions are to be held; and whereas we are of opinion that it would be expedient to award the pensions hereinafter mentioned to officers of your Majesty's Navy, such pensions to be called ‘Greenwich Hospital Pensions,’ and to be paid out of Greenwich Hospital Funds. We do, therefore, beg leave to

recommend that your Majesty may be graciously pleased by your Order in Council to sanction the following pensions being granted :—

Ten pensions of £150 a-year each to Flag Officers, to be selected from the Active List, six only of these to be granted at present, and the remaining four, as vacancies occur, amongst the four Flag Officers of Greenwich Hospital; these ten Flag Officers to have the privilege of rising in half-pay, as well as in rank, to that of full Admiral, such pensions not to be held in addition to “Good Service” pensions.

We further beg leave to recommend to your Majesty :—

I. That Retired Officers should only be eligible for the pensions applicable to the rank which they held on the Active List.

II. That all officers who accept these pensions be placed on the Retired List, or superannuated, if Warrant Officers, and that they be allowed to retain their pensions notwithstanding promotion.

III. That the service afloat required to render officers eligible for these pensions shall be as follows :—

except in the case of such officers as have received severe wounds in action, or disabling hurts on actual service, whose cases may be specially considered by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

IV. That the existing rules respecting time in the Coast Guard, Transport, or Mail Service,

established by your Majesty's Order in Council of the first August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, be applicable to the above officers.

"The Lords Commissioners of your Majesty's Treasury have expressed their concurrence in the foregoing proposal."

Her Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among Sheep, Cattle, and other Animals" (which Act has since been extended and continued in force until the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament), after reciting that "a contagious or infectious disorder known or described as the Sheep Pox or Variola Ovina, now prevails among the sheep in some parts of the United Kingdom, and it is necessary to take measures to prevent such disorder from spreading," it was and is enacted (amongst other things) as follows, namely:—"In case any Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said Disorder, or any Disorder of the like Nature, be exposed or offered for sale, or be brought or attempted to be brought for the Purpose of being so exposed or offered for Sale, in any Market, Fair, or other open or public Place where other animals are commonly exposed for Sale, then and in any such case it shall be lawful for any Clerk or Inspector or other Officer of such Fair or Market, or for any Constable or Policeman, or for any other Person authorized by the Mayor, or by any Two Justices of the Peace having Jurisdiction in the Place, or for any person authorized or appointed by Her Majesty in Council, to seize the same, and to report such Seizure to the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace having Jurisdiction in the Place; and it shall be lawful for such Mayor or Justice either to restore the same, or to cause the same, together with any Pens, Hurdles, Troughs, Litter, Hay, Straw, or other Articles which he may judge likely to have been infected thereby, to be forthwith destroyed or otherwise disposed of in such manner as he shall deem proper, or as may be directed in manner hereinafter provided; and any Person bringing or attempting to bring any Sheep, Lambs, Oxen, Bulls, Cows, Calves, or other

"horned Cattle, into any such Market, Fair, or open or public Place as aforesaid, knowing such Sheep, Lambs, or Cattle to be infected with or labouring under either of such Disorders as aforesaid, shall, upon Conviction thereof, forfeit and pay for each and every such Offence a Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds."

And whereas in and by the said Act, it was and is further enacted as follows, that is to say:

"If any Person turn out, keep, or depasture any Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said disorder, in or upon any Forest, Chase, Wood, Moor, Marsh, Heath, Common, waste Land, open Field, Road Side, or other undivided or uninclosed Land, such person shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit and pay any Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds."

And whereas in and by the said Act it was and is further enacted (for the more effectually preventing the spreading of contagious or infectious disease) as follows, that is to say:—

"It shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of Sheep, Cattle, Horses, Swine, or other Animals, or of Meat, Skins, Hides, Horns, Hoofs, or other parts of any Animals, or of Hay, Straw, Fodder, or other articles likely to propagate Infection; and also for the purpose of purifying any Yard, Stable, Outhouse, or other place, or any Waggons, Carts, Carriages, or other vehicles; and also for the purpose of directing how any Animals dying in a diseased state, or any Animals, Parts of Animals, or other Things, seized under the Provisions of this Act, are to be disposed of; and also for the Purpose of causing Notices to be given of the Appearance of any Disorder among Sheep, Cattle, or other Animals, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the Provisions of this Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and all Provisions for any of the Purposes aforesaid, in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like Force and Effect as if the same had been inserted in this Act; and all Persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds, or such smaller Sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any Case by such Order direct."

And whereas a Contagious or Infectious Disorder, known or described as the Sheep Pox, or Variola Ovina, now prevails among the Sheep, in a certain part of the United Kingdom, and it is expedient to take measures for preventing such Disorder from spreading;

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, do hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in them as aforesaid, make and ordain the several Orders and Regulations following; that is to say:—

I.

It shall not be lawful for any person to remove any Sheep or Lambs to or from the parish of Long Buckby, in the county of Northampton, or to drive or conduct any Sheep or Lambs through or by way of such parish, unless the person so

removing, driving, or conducting such Sheep or Lambs shall first have obtained a certificate, in writing, signed by some person who may have been authorized, by two or more Justices of the said county of Northampton, to seize Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said disorder, under the 1st section of the said Act, that such removal, driving, or conducting may take place without danger of spreading the said disease.

## II.

All Sheep and Lambs dying in any of the stages of the said disease, wheresoever such death or deaths shall or may occur, shall forthwith be buried by the person or persons in whose possession such Sheep or Lambs may be at the time of death, with their skins on, in pits of not less than five feet in depth, and the carcasses so buried shall be covered with quicklime.

## III.

All sheds and places whatsoever, and all railway trucks and other vehicles which may or shall have been used or occupied by Sheep or Lambs affected by the said disease, shall forthwith, after having been so used, be thoroughly cleansed with water, and immediately afterwards purified with chloride of lime by the person or persons in possession of such sheds, places, trucks, and vehicles respectively.

## IV.

Every person in possession of any Sheep or Lambs in or amongst which the said disease shall manifest itself, shall forthwith give notice, in writing, of the fact to the Chief Constable or Superintendent of Police of the county or borough in which such Sheep or Lambs may be.

## V.

And it is further ordered that this Order shall continue in force for three calendar months from and after the date hereof.

## NOTICE AS TO SHEEP.

I, JOHN BLACKIE, JUNIOR, Lord Provost of the city of Glasgow, do hereby, in virtue of the powers conferred on me by the Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, give notice, that sheep may be brought into Glasgow, to any part thereof, and may pass through the city, provided always that sheep which have been in the cattle market shall not pass out of the city for any purpose, nor be removed from the market to any place except one of the slaughter-houses provided by the Market Commissioners.

## CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Somerset, to wit.*

Notice No. 4.

AT the General Quarter Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the Shire-hall, at Taunton, in and for the county of Somerset, on Tuesday, the 2nd day of January, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord 1866, before Sir William Miles, Baronet, Edward Ayshford Sanford, Esquire, Chairmen, and others their companions, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen, in and for the county of Somerset aforesaid, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanours committed in the same county; and continued by adjournments to Friday, the 16th day of the month of February following, at Highbridge, in the parish of Burnham, in and for the said county, and then there holden before Sir William Miles, Baronet, Chairman, Sir Arthur Hallam Elton, Baronet, and others their companions, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned for the purposes aforesaid.

Whereas by virtue of an Act passed in the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter 107 (which Act has since been from time to time continued by subsequent Acts, and lastly by "The Expiring Laws Continuance Act, 1865"), and of Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, respectively dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, the Justices of the Peace for this county, in Quarter Sessions assembled, on the 2nd day of February, 1866, did, as the local authority constituted by the said Order in Council of the 16th day of December, 1865 (by a notice, numbered 3, published in a newspaper circulating within the jurisdiction of this county, and in counties bordering upon this county), make certain orders with a view to prevent the spreading of the cattle plague.

And whereas the Justices of the Peace, now assembled, have resolved that it is expedient that the 6th Order of Sessions, made on the 2nd day of February instant, shall be modified and varied in manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now, therefore, by virtue and in pursuance of the said Acts and Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, the Justices of the Peace for this county, now assembled, do, as the local authority constituted by the said Order in Council of the 16th day of December, 1865, by this notice, to be forthwith published in a newspaper circulating within this county, and also in newspapers circulating in the several counties of Devon, Dorset, Wilts, Gloucester, Monmouth, and Glamorgan, as the counties bordering upon this county of Somerset, declare and order:—

That on the 21st day of February instant, and until the 1st day of March next, the said 6th order shall be modified and varied by the addition to the existing provisos thereto of the following provisos (that is to say):—

Provided also, that it shall be lawful for any person to remove any raw or untanned hide or skin, or horn or hoof, of any animal specified in the said notice numbered 3, from any parish within the jurisdiction of this county to or through any other parish within the same jurisdiction,



under and subject to the conditions following ; namely :—

- (a.) Every such animal to have been free from disease when slaughtered, and not to have been in contact with any animal ill of cattle plague.
- (b.) No hide or skin, horn or hoof, shall be removed from or to any parish in which cattle plague exists, or has existed within twenty-eight days last past ; and no hide or skin, horn or hoof, shall be carried through any part of a parish in which cattle plague exists, or has existed within twenty-eight days last past, unless by railway through such part of a parish for the purpose of being sent out of the jurisdiction of this county.
- (c.) No such removal shall be made without the license, in writing (as described in the proviso to the 3rd order contained in the said notice numbered 3), of one Justice of the Peace acting in and for the division in which the parish is situate from which such removal is to be made.

Provided also, that in the case of animals put out by persons to feed on land not in their own occupation within the jurisdiction of this county, it shall not be unlawful for such persons to remove such animals to land in their own occupation ; such removal, nevertheless, to be subject to all the conditions contained in the proviso to the 3rd order in the said notice numbered 3.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Perthshire.*

#### SUPPLEMENTARY NOTICE.

WHEREAS the Justices of the Peace for the county of Perth, in Sessions assembled on 2nd February curt., declared, with a view to prevent the spreading of the cattle disease, that no hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal of cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, or calves, or dung, hay, or straw, should be removed from place to place, generally, within the county of Perth, or from the city of Perth (being a separate jurisdiction), except under certain exceptions therein specified, and which declaration has been published, and whereas it has become expedient that the said prohibition should in some respects be modified.

Therefore the said Justices in Sessions assembled on 16th February curt., do hereby modify the foresaid prohibition, to the effect hereafter specified, as a farther exception to the foresaid declaration, and declare as follows, viz. :—

That from and after the last-mentioned date, hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal, of the foresaid animals, and dung, may be removed from place to place within the county of Perth, or from the city of Perth (being a separate jurisdiction), but only under authority of a license by a Justice of the Peace, and after a declaration made before said Justice, by the person wishing the license, that no animal affected with the cattle disease has been on the lands or premises from which the said articles are to be removed, and specially in regard to the said hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or offal, that the same are not parts of diseased animals, and are to be removed or taken forthwith to a tanner's yard, or other proper place for manufacture, or other usual purpose.

And notice is hereby given, that it shall continue to be unlawful for any person to remove the

foresaid articles from place to place, within the county of Perth, or from the city of Perth, except under the conditions above specified ; and any person found contravening the said declaration and resolution shall, for every offence, be liable in a penalty of twenty pounds.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*County of Dumbarton.*

NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Dumbarton, in Sessions assembled at Dumbarton on the 19th day of February, 1866, resolved to modify their resolutions of 26th January last, and accordingly declared, and do hereby declare, that it shall now be lawful for any person to remove from place to place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat or swine, or any raw or untanned hides or skins, or any horns, hoofs, or offal of such animals, or any dung, hay, straw, fodder or litter, provided a Justice of the Peace for Dumbartonshire, resident in the locality, shall, upon a declaration of two farmers residing in the neighbourhood, certify that the disease called "Cattle Plague," or "Rinderpest," does not exist and has not existed for the period of one month prior to the date of the certificate, within one mile of the place from whence the removal is desired, and does not exist and has not existed for that period within one mile of the route along which the removal is to proceed ; and further, that notwithstanding the above resolution and modification, it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any such animal, or other article as aforesaid, from the parishes of East and West Kilpatrick, Kirkintilloch, and Cumbernauld, into any of the remaining parishes of the county.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Borough of Wrexham.*

In pursuance of the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November last and the 16th day of December last, I, the undersigned, William Overton, Esquire, Mayor of the borough of Wrexham, in the county of Denbigh, do hereby order and declare as follows :—

1st. That the order made and signed by me on the 22nd day of December last is hereby revoked, except as to any penalties which may have been incurred under such order.

2nd. That it is expedient, until the 1st day of March next, to prevent the removal of the following animals, namely, every cow, heifer, bullock, ox, or calf, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the following conditions (that is to say), that such animals are for immediate slaughter, and that the owner thereof shall, previously to their being brought into the said borough, have obtained from a Justice of the Peace, upon a statutory declaration made before him in proof of the fact, or from a duly

appointed Inspector of the district from which the animals shall have been brought, a certificate authorising such removal, and stating that the animals are free from disease, and have not been dispastured or kept in any place in which cattle disease has appeared within one calendar month then last past, and which certificate shall be produced by the driver of the animals to any police officer requiring the production thereof.

And it is further ordered, that all such animals shall be slaughtered within seven days after being brought into the said borough.

It will therefore be unlawful for any person to bring or send any such animals into such market or fair, or to any place within the said borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animals so brought or sent, except in accordance with the above conditions.

And I do further give notice that it is expedient, from the date of this notice until the said 1st day of March next, that animals as hereinbefore defined, except in accordance with the foregoing conditions, shall not be brought from any other part of Great Britain to any place within the said borough; and that it will not be lawful for any person, previously to the said 1st day of March next, to bring or send any such animals from any other place in Great Britain into any place within the said borough, except in accordance with the conditions aforesaid.

Every person offending herein, will, for every offence, forfeit a sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*County of Warwick.*

Additional Orders.

THE Justices assembled at the Quarter Sessions, held by adjournment this 17th day of February, 1866, at Warwick for the county of Warwick, do order and declare:—

That Order No. 4 of the 20th day of January, 1866, relating to the removal of fat cattle, shall be, and is hereby revoked; and instead thereof, they order and declare:—

That from and after the 19th day of February instant it shall not be lawful to move or send any fat animal as defined in the Orders of the said 20th day of January to or from any railway within the jurisdiction of the local authority of the county of Warwick.

That one Justice of a division in which he resides, or for which he usually acts, may, at his discretion, grant a licence to move, on a day to be named therein, in the day time only, along any public road for a distance not exceeding six miles, any such fat animal to a place to be specified, for slaughter, upon a declaration (to be retained by the Justice) being made before him by the owner, or by some competent person authorised by the owner, that the said animal has been in his possession for at the least one month last past, is healthy, and free from cattle plague, and that there has been no cattle plague on the said owner's farm or premises, or amongst any of his cattle, for a month last past; and that it is intended that the said animal shall be slaughtered at the place named within forty-eight hours; and the condition of the license shall be, that if the said animal be not slaughtered within the time speci-

fied, or afterwards be found alive in any place within the jurisdiction of the local authority, the person in whose possession it shall be so found shall be responsible for the same. Any wilful infraction of this Order, or any act done in contravention thereof, shall render the offender liable to the penalty under the statute, not exceeding £20.

This Order to continue in force, until it shall be revoked or amended by any future order of the local authority or by Act of Parliament.

The Justices do further order and declare that it is expedient to amend Order No. 1, of the 3rd day of February instant, which prohibits the introduction of raw and untanned hides from any place in Great Britain, beyond the jurisdiction of the local authority of the county of Warwick, to any place within such jurisdiction; and it is hereby ordered and declared, that notwithstanding the said order (which to all intents and purposes shall continue in full force and effect, except as is hereinafter excepted), it shall be lawful to send and bring any raw and untanned hides from and out of the boroughs of Warwick, Coventry, Birmingham, Stratford-on-Avon, and the Royal Town Manor and Lordship of Sutton Coldfield, to any tan-yard, or premises used for tanning, but not elsewhere, within the jurisdiction of the aforesaid local authority; provided always that every hide, or parcel of hides, so sent at any one time, shall be accompanied with a certificate that the said hide, or hides, has, or have been effectually disinfected by the application of chloride of lime, or some other disinfectant; which said certificate shall be obtained from the cattle Inspector of the borough, or if there be no Inspector, then from the Mayor, or from some Justice of the Peace of the borough, and shall be sent with the hide, or parcel of hides, and shall be delivered to the person to whom the said hide, or parcel of hides, is consigned; and shall by him, within three days of the receipt thereof, be transmitted to the Clerk of the Petty Sessional Division, within which such tan yard, or premises used for tanning, is, or are situate. Any wilful infraction of this order shall render the offender liable to the penalty under the statute not exceeding £20.

Ordered, that these sessions be further adjourned to Wednesday the 28th day of February instant, at two o'clock in the afternoon.

place in Great Britain, beyond the jurisdiction of the Justices of the county of Haddington, into any place within the jurisdiction of said Justices. And they hereby declare, that the bringing or sending any of the aforesaid articles from any other part of Great Britain into the jurisdiction of the said Justices, is prohibited from this date to the 1st day of March next.

Every person offending against the above notice is liable to be prosecuted for a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds for each offence.

*Epiphany Adjourned Quarter Sessions, 20th day of February, 1866.*

THE Justices assembled at the Quarter Sessions held at the County Hall, Worcester, in and for the said county, by adjournment, on the 20th day of February, 1866, by virtue of the powers vested in them as the "Local Authority" in the county of Worcester by the Orders in Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, or one of them, do, with the view to prevent the spreading of the disorder generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," declare as follows:—

1. That it is expedient, from the 20th day of February instant until the 1st day of March next, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, or any raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any such animals (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), shall be removed out of or from any part of so much of the parishes or places of Tenbury, Kyre Magna, Kyre Parva, Hanley Child, Rochford, and Bockleton, or either of them, as lies within a radius of two miles from the farm-houses in the occupation of Mr. Peyton and Mr. Munn respectively, both in the hamlet of Sutton, in the parish of Tenbury, into any parish or place adjoining the district within such radius of two miles from either of the said farm-houses as aforesaid, or from one farm to another within the said distance of two miles from the said farm-houses, or either of them.

2. That it is also expedient, from the 20th day of February instant until the 1st day of March next, that raw or untanned hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall or may be removed from the town of Tenbury, through the parish of Rochford, in this county, with a licence of a Justice of the Peace for this county (after such hides or skins have been disinfected to the satisfaction of the Justice granting the licence) to any tan-yard in this county to be named in such licence.

3. The several declarations of this Court in respect of such disease, designated as the "Cattle Plague," made on the 3rd, 23rd, and 30th days of January last, and the 6th and 13th days of February instant, are to the foregoing extent only hereby altered and varied.

Every person offending against the tenor hereof will for every offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted may think fit to impose.

### CATTLE PLAGUE.

*Essex Adjourned Session, 20th February, 1866.*

Amended Order, in lieu of all previous Orders.

IN pursuance of the Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, the Justices of the Peace for the county of Essex, assembled at the General Quarter Session of the Peace, holden by adjournment at Chelmsford, in the said county, on Tuesday, the 20th day of February, 1866, do hereby declare (with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder now prevailing amongst cattle in Great Britain, called the "Cattle Plague,") that it is expedient that from the 21st day of February, 1866, until the 1st day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, nor any raw or untanned hides or skins, nor any horns or hoofs of any such animals as aforesaid (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), nor the offal of any such animal as aforesaid, nor any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain beyond the said county of Essex into such county, so far as the same is within the jurisdiction of the said Justices, under or by virtue of the said Orders, or either of them.

And the said Justices, so assembled as aforesaid, do hereby further declare, so far as the said county is within their said jurisdiction, that it is expedient that no such animal as aforesaid, nor any such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs of any such animal as aforesaid, nor any offal of any such animal as aforesaid, nor any hay or straw (such hay or straw coming from any place where any diseased beast has been kept), nor any dung or litter likely to propagate infection, shall from the 21st day of February, 1866, until the 1st day of March, 1866, be driven or conveyed along any highway within the said county, from any place within such county, to any other place within the same county.

Provided nevertheless, that it shall not be unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal, hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, by railway through the jurisdiction of the said Justices, or to send or carry any such animal, or any such articles as aforesaid, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction as aforesaid, to the nearest convenient railway station for the purpose of carrying the same through such jurisdiction as aforesaid.

Provided also, that it shall not be unlawful for any person to buy or send, with the licence of two Justices acting in and for such jurisdiction as aforesaid, any hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, from any land and premises in his own occupation, and beyond such jurisdiction, to any other land or premises in his own occupation, within such jurisdiction, during a time to be specified in such licence.

Provided also that the prohibition hereinbefore contained shall not extend to prevent any person or persons living within such jurisdiction as aforesaid having animals fitted for slaughter, and which have been bonâ fide in the possession of the owner or owners thereof at least twenty-eight days prior to sale, from sending such animals from any part of such jurisdiction to the nearest railway station, or to any butcher for the purpose of sale and slaughter only, provided a certificate, signed by a Justice of the Peace acting in and for the petty sessional division of the county within which such owner or owners is or are resi-

dent, authorising such removal be first had and obtained for that purpose.

Provided also that the prohibitions hereinbefore contained shall not extend to the removal of any animal or any hides, skins, horns, hoofs, offal, or other articles as aforesaid, bonâ fide the property of the occupier of any land or premises within the said jurisdiction of the said Justices from one part of such land or premises to another, along any highway for any distance not exceeding three hundred yards.

Provided, lastly, that the prohibition hereinbefore contained shall not extend to the removal of any cow, heifer, or bull, for the purposes of breeding, for a distance of not exceeding two miles, provided that before such removal take place the owner or owners of any such animals so to be removed shall procure from a Justice of the Peace for the said county an order for that purpose, made upon the declaration of such owner or owners that all the animals on the sender's premises, and also on the premises to which such animals are to be sent, are free from disease, and that there has been no disease upon such premises respectively for the space of twenty-eight days at least.

And the said Justices so assembled as aforesaid do hereby further declare and give notice, that every person offending against this declaration and notice is liable for every such offence to forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.
