REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card

with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at one o'clock.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of the eleventh and twelfth years of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter one hundred and seven, intituled "An Act to prevent until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders amongst sheep, cattle, and other animals," which Act has since been from time to time continued by divers

subsequent Acts, and lastly by an Act passed in the session of the twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and nineteen, it is (amongst other things) enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time, to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal, to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of sheep, cattle, horses, swine, or other animals, or of meat, skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or other parts of any animals, or of hay, straw, fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and that all provisions for any of the purposes aforesaid in any such Order or Orders contained shall have the like force and effect as if the same had been inserted in the said Act; and that all persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding twenty pounds, or such smaller sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct:

And whereas a contagious or infectious disorder now prevails among cattle within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, which disorder is generally designated as the "Cattle Plague:"

And whereas with a view to check the spread of the said disorder, an Order, dated the 23rd of November, 1865, has been made, under the authority of the said Acts, by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, consolidating and amending certain Orders previously made for that purpose; and the same has since been altered and amended by subsequent Orders, bearing date the 16th day of December, 1865, the 20th day of January, 1866, and the 6th day of February, 1866, which Orders cease on the 1st of March next:

And whereas it is expedient to continue the said Orders, so far as the same are consistent with an Act passed in this present session of Parliament, intitled "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," by which provisions have been made for the slaughtering of cattle affected with the cattle plague, and for other purposes:

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council do hereby, in exercise of the powers given under the said Act, so continued as aforesaid, order as follows:

I. The Orders of the Lords of the Council, dated the 23rd of November, 1865, the 16th of December, 1865, the 20th of January, 1866, and the 6th of February, 1866, are hereby continued; and where any local authority, under any powers given by any of the said Orders of the Lords of the Council, has published notices, or made orders within its district, all such notices or orders which may be in force when this Order comes into operation, are hereby continued until the same shall be altered or revoked by any further Order or by any local authority, subject nevertheless to the provisions contained in "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," or in any Act which may be hereafter passed.

II. The powers given by the said Orders, and by this present Order, to the local authority, shall be exercised, from and after the time when this Order comes into operation, by the local authority

constituted under and for the purposes of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and not otherwise; save that, in any place in which there shall not be any local authority duly constituted under and for the purposes of the said last-mentioned Act, until after the time when this Order comes into operation, the local authority, for the purpose of exercising the powers aforesaid, shall in the meantime, and until the constitution of a local authority under the said Act, continue to be such as is defined by the said Orders of the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 6th day of February, 1866, respectively.

III. So much of the said Orders of the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 6th day of February, 1866, as is inconsistent with this present Order, is hereby revoked.

IV. This Order shall come into operation immediately on the publication thereof in the London Gazette, and shall continue in force until revoked by any further Order.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received, from the Lord President of the Council, a copy of an Ordinance passed by the Royal Court of Guernsey on the 17th instant, prohibiting the importation into that Island, of cattle, sheep, and pigs, shipped at British ports.

The above Ordinance, which came into operation on the 21st instant, also prohibits the said animals being brought to the Island of Guernsey with the intention of importing them.

The Master of any vessel infringing the provisions of the said Ordinance will be subjected to the penalties therein specified.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council relating to the "Cattle Plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of their Lordships' Orders:—

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Northumberland, 1866.

At an adjournment of the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, held at the Moot Hall, in and for the said county, on the 26th day of February, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, before Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace assigned to keep the Peace in the said county.

CATTLE PLAGUE.—ORDERS IN COUNCIL.

11th & 12th Vict., cap. 107; 29th Vict., cap. 2.

In pursuance of the powers vested by law in this Court, it is ordered that the notices and orders made by this Court on the 1st of February instant, as to putting in force the Orders in Council relative to the cattle plague, be, and they are hereby continued, until they shall be altered according to law, subject to the following altera-

tions, and to the new regulations made by virtue of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866:"—

1. That the boroughs of Morpeth and Tyne-mouth, by virtue of the last-mentioned statute, now form part of this jurisdiction.

2. That no animals or articles shall be brought from any adjoining county or place into this jurisdiction, unless the same shall be brought to the borders of this county, according to such regulations as may be in force in such adjoining county or place, and then they may be removed to any place in this jurisdiction, under the orders in force in this county.

3. That the hides, skins, horns, hoofs, and offal of any such animal as shall have been removed from place to place in this jurisdiction, under the order of one Justice, marked A, may be further removed to any other place within this jurisdiction, under the order of one Justice according to the form B; the party wishing to remove the same having first declared to the truth thereof.

4. That the Justices in each Petty Sessional Division, or any two Justices in Petty Sessions assembled in such division, be a committee for such division, and have delegated to them the powers hereinafter set forth, and that such Committee shall have power to dismiss any of the existing Inspectors, and appoint Inspectors, Cattle Overseers, and other officers, according to their discretion.

5. That the duties of the Inspectors shall be the same as those assigned to them by the Orders in Council and by Act of Parliament, and that they, and such Cattle Overseers shall be paid the same allowances as have heretofore been given to such Inspectors by the Privy Council.

6. That any Inspector or Cattle Overseer may at all times enter any premises within his district where he has reasonable grounds for supposing that cattle affected by the cattle plague are to be found, for the purpose of carrying into effect the duties imposed upon him by law; and if any person obstructs such Inspector or Cattle Overseer he will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20, provided that such Inspector or Cattle Overseer, if required, state in writing the grounds on which he shall enter such premises for the purposes aforesaid.

7. That every Inspector or Cattle Overseer shall have power to slaughter any animals, affected with the cattle plague, with the consent of the owner, or two members of the Committee of the district where such animals shall be, and such Inspector or Cattle Overseer shall thereupon report to the Committee his opinion of the value of the animal immediately before it was affected with the cattle plague.

8. That every such Committee, Inspector and Cattle Overseer, shall cause every animal that has died of the cattle plague, or been slaughtered in consequence thereof, to be buried immediately in its skin, and to be covered with not less than six feet of earth, and with a sufficient quantity of quick lime or other disinfectant.

9. That every Committee, Inspector, and Cattle Overseer, shall cause the premises in which any animal affected with the cattle plague has been kept, to be thoroughly disinfected, and that all hay, straw, litter, dung, or other articles, used in and about such animal, be burnt or otherwise destroyed; and no fresh animal shall be admitted into such premises until the expiration of thirty days after such disinfecting; the Inspector or Cattle Overseer to report to the Committee when this disinfection has taken place.

10. That every Inspector, Cattle Overseer, and other person, in contact with animals affected with the cattle plague, before quitting any premises

wherein any such animal has been kept within thirty days next preceding, shall disinfect his clothes, and use such precautions as are necessary, with a view to prevent the spreading of the cattle disease, and shall abstain from taking any dog with him when engaged in his duties.

11. That all Inspectors and Cattle Overseers shall provide a sufficient supply of carbolic or cresylic acid and chloride of lime, to be used as such disinfectants, and carry out as far as possible the recommendations for disinfection set forth in the pamphlet issued by the Royal Commissioners, under the title of "Recommendations for Disinfection," with copies of which each Inspector and Cattle Overseer will be supplied.

12. That with respect to animals that shall have been in the same shed or stable, or in the same herd or flock, or in contact with any animal affected with cattle plague, the Inspector or Cattle Overseer may cause such animals to be slaughtered with the consent of the owner, or by order of the Committee of the district; the Inspector or Cattle Overseer forthwith to report on all points to such Committee, as well as his opinion of the value of each of the animals.

13. That with respect to the value of any animal so slaughtered, the Committee of the district may ascertain the same, not only by the certificate of the Inspector or Cattle Overseer, but by such other evidence as they may think necessary, after first giving notice to, and hearing the evidence brought forward by, the owner of such animal.

14. That all cattle brought by sea into any town or place within this jurisdiction, shall be marked by clipping the hair off the end of the tail, and no such cattle shall be moved alive from such town or place, except by sea.

15. That no cattle shall be moved on any railway before the 25th day of March, 1866.

16. That all notices required to be given by the Inspectors and Cattle Overseers to any Committee, be sent by post to the Clerk of Petty Sessions.

17. That any person acting in contravention of these orders, shall be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding £20, and where any such offence is committed with respect to more than four animals, a penalty not exceeding £5 for each animal may be imposed instead of the penalty of £20.

CATTLE PLAGUE (A).

I, the undersigned, the owner of the animals and articles next hereinafter mentioned, and we, the undersigned, occupiers of land in the county of Northumberland, whose rentals are severally £100 a year, at the least, do hereby solemnly and sincerely declare as follows:—

1. That the said owner wishing to remove the following animals and articles from his farm and premises at to viz.—
Here state the kinds of animals or articles (cow, heifer, bull, bullock, oxen, calves, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, or raw or untanned hides or skins, horns, or hoofs of animals, offal of animals, dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter), we have personally examined such animals and articles, and the premises in which they have been kept, and that they are free from infection.

2. That we believe that no cattle plague has existed within twenty-eight days, either in the said farm and premises, or within two miles thereof, and that during the whole of which period such animals have been kept upon the premises of the said owner.

committee for the said period all the powers conferred on this Court by the said Act, excepting the power to make a rate; and this Court doth direct that the committee shall meet at the office of the Clerk of the Peace, at Bodmin, in the said county, and shall be convened by at least three days' notice from the Clerk of the Peace, after he shall have been requested by notice under the hands of two or more magistrates to call such meeting.

2. That until the 14th day of April next, the Justices acting in the several Petty Sessional Divisions of the county shall be committees for their respective divisions, under section 8 of the said Act, and the powers hereinafter mentioned are delegated to every such committee, and two of every such committee shall be a quorum.

3. That the following inspectors be appointed for carrying the said Act into effect within their several divisions or districts until the 14th day of April next:—

And this Court doth hereby assign to every of the said Inspectors the following duties:—

(a) At all times to enter any field, stable, cowshed, or other premises within his district where he has reasonable grounds for supposing that cattle affected by the cattle plague are to be found, for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of the said Act; and if any person refuses admission to, or obstructs or impedes, or aids in obstructing or impeding, any such Inspector, he will, for each offence, be liable to a penalty

not exceeding twenty pounds, provided that such Inspector shall, if required, state in writing the grounds on which he has entered such premises for the purpose aforesaid.

(b) On receiving notice from any magistrate, owner of cattle, or member of the police force of the county of Cornwall, of any animals being affected with the cattle plague, to attend on the premises and examine the animals, and on such and any other occasion the inspector shall cause all animals affected with the cattle plague to be slaughtered; and shall cause every animal that has died of cattle plague, or has been slaughtered in consequence of being affected with cattle plague, to be buried as soon as possible, in its skin, in some proper place, and to be covered with a sufficient quantity of quick-lime, or other disinfectant, and with not less than six feet of earth.

Provided that upon instructions as to disinfection and burial being issued by the Lords of the Council or the Royal Commissioners, the same shall be observed instead of the above.

(c) To cause the yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in which any animal affected with the cattle plague has been kept while affected with the disease, or has died or been slaughtered, to be thoroughly cleansed and disinfected, and all hay, straw, litter, dung, or other articles that have been used in or about any such animal, to be burnt or otherwise destroyed, and no fresh animal shall be admitted into any yard, shed, stable, field, or other premises in which any animal affected with the cattle plague has been kept while affected with the disease, or has died or been slaughtered, until the expiration of thirty days after the cleansing and disinfecting of such premises.

And this court doth direct that the inspectors, cattle overseers, and others in contact with animals affected by the cattle plague, shall disinfect their clothes, and use every precaution with a view to prevent the spread of contagion.

(d) Every inspector (with the consent in writing of two members of a committee of a district) may cause to be slaughtered any animal that has been in the same shed or stable, or in the same herd or flock, or in contact with any animal affected with the cattle plague. And the owner of any animal so slaughtered may either dispose of the carcase on his own account, with a licence from some member of the committee of the district, or may require the committee of the district to dispose of the same; in which latter case the Justices in Quarter Sessions shall pay to the owner, by way of compensation, such sum, not exceeding twenty-five pounds, as may equal three-fourths of the value of the animal slaughtered, subject to the provisions contained in the said Act.

(e) Each inspector shall, by the post of every Tuesday, weekly transmit to the chairman of the committee, and also to the Clerk of the Peace of the county, a return showing the number of cattle affected with the plague, the names of their owners, the localities, and the number of cattle which have died or been slaughtered.

(f) Each inspector shall be paid as follows:—

4. That it be delegated to each of the committees (as officers for this purpose of the local authority) to ascertain the value of any animal which may have been slaughtered under the above provisions, and that upon any committee certifying the said value and the amount of compensation they award to the owner, the Justices in quarter sessions, or any adjournment thereof, shall order payment of the same out of the rate to be levied as directed by the said Act; but such sum shall not (excepting in cases under letter (d) aforesaid) exceed twenty pounds, nor one-half of the value of the animal immediately before it was affected with the cattle plague.

Every committee may appoint valuers, and require such evidence as they may think proper of the circumstances of the slaughter, and the value of the animal slaughtered.

5. That the district committees do report to the central committee such provisions as they may deem expedient to be made for the appointment and payment of additional inspectors, valuers, and other officers, for the purposes of the said Act, and to carry out the orders of this Court.

6. That the accounts of expenses incurred by any committee and to be claimed of the county, shall be transmitted every fortnight to the Clerk of the Peace.

7. That for the purpose of aiding the local authority and the said committees and inspectors in carrying into effect the foregoing regulations and the provisions of the said Act, the chief constable of this county be appointed chief supervisor, and that the superintendents, inspectors, and sergeants, under the command of the chief constable, be appointed supervisors for the respective divisions to which they are attached.

8. These resolutions and orders are to extend to the whole of this county, excepting such places therein as are not subject to the jurisdiction of this court, as the local authority appointed by the "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866."

It is also ordered that this Court be adjourned and held *de die in diem* at the office of the Clerk of the Peace, at Bodmin, in this county, and that the first adjournment thereof be there held at twelve o'clock at noon, on Tuesday, the 27th day of February instant.

N.B.—By the "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," it is enacted:—

1. That all cattle brought by sea from any place in Great Britain, or from any place out of the United Kingdom, into any town or place in Great Britain, shall be marked by clipping the hair off the end of the tail, and no such cattle shall be moved alive from such town except by sea.

2. That no cattle shall be moved on any railway before the 25th day of March, 1866.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

At an adjourned Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the said county, held on Saturday, the 24th day of February, 1866, before J. H. Scourfield, Esq., M.P., Chairman; Summers Harford, Esq., John Harvey, Esq., and others their associates, Justices.

Whereas, by virtue of several Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Hon. Privy Council, and of certain orders and notices of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said county, in quarter sessions assembled, and at certain ad-

jourments thereof made and issued before the 20th day of February, 1866, permission was given for cattle (as defined by the said Order) to be driven to the nearest railway station to be carried out of any particular jurisdiction into which they would not otherwise have been allowed to enter. And whereas, in consequence of this permission, cattle have been driven from the adjoining county of Cardigan, a distance of more than 18 miles, to the Narberth Road Station, which is situated partly in the county of Pembroke, and partly in the county of Carmarthen, to the great danger of introducing the infection of Cattle Plague into the adjoining district. And whereas an Act of Parliament, 29 Vict., c. 2, was passed on the 20th day of February, 1866, by section 17, of which it is enacted "That no cattle shall be moved on any railway before the twenty-fifth day of March, 1866." Now it is hereby ordered that from and after the due publication of this notice, no cattle, as defined by the said last mentioned Act, shall be permitted to enter from without into the jurisdiction of the magistrates of the county of Pembroke, in Quarter Sessions assembled, on any pretence whatever until further notice, save and except such cattle as are brought by sea into any town or place within the aforesaid jurisdiction, and which cattle shall not be removed alive from any such town or place except by sea.

Any person acting in contravention of this Order will, for each offence, incur a penalty not exceeding £20, and where any such offence is committed with respect to more than four animals, then a penalty not exceeding £5 for each animal may be imposed instead of the penalty of £20.

2. That until such 17th day of March next no such animal or article as aforesaid shall be removed or taken to any market or fair within any part of the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

3. That until the 17th day of March next no such animal or article as above mentioned shall be removed from or out of any one Petty Sessional Division of the said county to any other Petty Sessional Division of the said county, except the person or persons so removing any such animals or articles as aforesaid shall be thereunto licensed

and empowered by certificate under the hands of two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said county, one of whom shall be a Justice usually acting in the Division from which such animals or articles are to be removed, and the other usually acting in the Division to which such animals or articles are proposed to be taken.

Every person offending against the said Order shall, for every such offence, forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall render it unlawful for any person to bring or carry into the said county of Merioneth from the counties of Carnarvon and Cardigan, any hay or straw, if the person or persons so bringing or carrying the same have the licence thereunto of three magistrates of the said county of Merioneth.

assigned to keep the peace of the said Queen, in the county aforesaid; and from thence further continued by adjournment to and held at Trowbridge, in the said county, on Monday, the twenty-second day of the same month of January, in the year aforesaid, before Sir John Wither Awdry, Knight, chairman, the Most Honourable the Marquis of Bath, and others, their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace of the said Queen, in the county aforesaid; and from thence further continued by adjournment to and held at Trowbridge aforesaid, on Wednesday, the thirty-first day of the same month of January, in the year aforesaid, before Sir John Wither Awdry, Knight, chairman, the Most Honourable the Marquis of Bath, and others, their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace of the said Queen, in the county aforesaid; and from thence further continued by adjournment to and held at Corsham, in the said county, on Thursday, the fifteenth day of February, in the year aforesaid, before John Bird Fuller, Esquire, chairman, the Right Honourable Lord Methuen, and others, their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace of the said Queen, in the county aforesaid; and from thence further continued by adjournment to and held at Chippenham aforesaid, on Monday, the twenty-sixth day of the said month of February, in the year aforesaid, before Sir John Wither Awdry, Knight, chairman, the Most Honourable the Marquis of Bath, and others, their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace of the said Queen, in the county aforesaid; it is ordered and declared as follows, that is to say:

By virtue and in pursuance of the several Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council now in force, made under the authority of the several Acts of Parliament in such Orders recited, with a view to check the spreading of a contagious or infectious disorder now prevailing among cattle, within that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, which disorder is generally designated as the "Cattle Plague," and of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866." The said Justices of the Peace for the said county in General Quarter Sessions assembled, on the said twenty-sixth day of February, do hereby order:

1. That the third, fourth, sixth, seventh, eighth, and twelfth clauses (together with the provisoes and conditions therein comprised or thereto appended) of the orders and declarations made by the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled as aforesaid, on the thirty-first day of the said month of January, be revoked.

Provided always that such revocation shall not extend to, or affect, any proceedings in respect of any offence committed against any clause, proviso, or condition hereby revoked during the time such clause, proviso, or condition remained in force.

2. That the Most Honourable the Marquis of Bath, the Right Honourable the Earl of Suffolk, the Right Honourable Thomas Henry Sutton Sotherton Estcourt, Sir Richard Hungerford Pollen, Baronet, Horatio Nelson Goddard, Peter Audley Lovell, Edward Hinxman, William Arthur Heathcote, David Archer, and Ralph Ludlow Lopes, Esquires, being members of this Court, and George Brown, Edward Little, John Archer, William Stratton, and Bartholomew Horsell, Gentlemen, being rated occupiers in the said county, be and they are hereby appointed and formed a Committee, (five of them to be a quorum) to carry out the provisions of the said "Cattle Diseases Prevention

Act, 1866," and that all powers conferred on this Court by the said Act, excepting the power to make a rate, be delegated to such Committee.

3. That the chief constable of the county be, and he is hereby appointed chief inspector, for the purpose of carrying into effect, within the jurisdiction of this Court, the provisions of the said "Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and of the Orders in Council now in force, and the notices, orders, declarations, and duties, given, made, and assigned by the said Justices or the said Committee.

4. That the following persons be, and they are hereby appointed inspectors for the county, to act in the several districts therein, as hereunder scheduled, for the purpose of carrying out the said provisions, notices, orders, declarations, and duties.

And that they be authorised to act in the absence or occupation of an adjacent inspector, on the recommendation of the chief inspector or his deputy. And that it shall be the duty of such inspectors to make such reports and returns to the said chief inspector as he may from time to time require, and generally to conform to any instructions which they may receive from him.

5. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, goat, or swine, nor any raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horn, hoof, or offal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or goat (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), nor any dung likely to propagate infection, be

brought from any other part of Great Britain into any other place within the jurisdiction of this Court.

Provided nevertheless that it shall be lawful to remove limed and disinfected skins of sheep slaughtered within the city of New Sarum, and the borough of Devizes; to any place within any adjoining Petty Sessional Division where such skins are dressed for manufacture; licence having been first obtained for such removal from two Justices of the Peace, acting in such Petty Sessional Division in Petty Sessions assembled, such licence to be granted only upon production of a certificate, in writing, from the inspector of the district, that such skins have been properly disinfected.

6. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf; sheep, goat, or swine be removed, brought, or sent for exhibition or sale to any market or fair within the jurisdiction of this Court.

7. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf be removed from any parish or place within the jurisdiction of this court to any other such parish or place: nor upon or along any highway, or the sides thereof, within any such parish or place; for a distance greater than four hundred and forty yards.

(i) Provided nevertheless that it shall be lawful for any person to remove any cow, heifer; bull, bullock, ox, or calf *bonâ fide* his or her property, from land in his or her own occupation, in any parish or place within such jurisdiction to contiguous land also in his or her own occupation in any other such parish or place: provided that no such animal shall, during such removal, traverse any highway; or the sides thereof, for a distance greater than four hundred and forty yards.

(ii) Provided also that it shall be lawful for any person to remove, under the superintendence of the police, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, fit for immediate slaughter, from any farm in his or her own occupation to any slaughter-house, every such animal having been marked by the police by clipping the hair off the end of the tail previously to removal, and to be slaughtered to the knowledge of the inspector of the police within forty-eight hours of reaching its destination; or any bull or cow for breeding purposes; or any calf in a covered cart or waggon for the purpose of being weaned; or any cattle on change of tenancy; or for the purpose of stocking a farm, (such cattle being in every instance the *bonâ fide* property of the person removing the same) under the following conditions, that is to say:

(a) That an order, in writing, for such removal be first obtained from two or more Justices of the Peace, assembled in Petty Sessions for the division, wherein the parish or place is situate to which it is proposed to remove such cattle. Such order to state the route to be taken by the said cattle and the limit of time (in no case to exceed seven days) for which such order shall be valid.

(b) That no such order be granted, except for removal within the limits of any one Petty Sessional Division, or from one Petty Sessional Division to another such adjoining Division and that in the latter case the Order of two or more Justices, assembled in Petty Sessions, in each such Division shall be required.

(c) That no such order be granted, except on the production of a declaration in writing from the owner, that the cattle proposed to be removed are in a healthy condition, and have for twenty-one days previously been in the possession of the said owner. And of a like declaration by such owner; and of a certificate in writing from the superintendent of the police for the Division in or out of which it is proposed to remove such cattle, that the Cattle Plague does not exist, nor within the space of thirty days previously has existed, within two miles of the parish, or place, whence it is proposed to make such removal; such order to be shown on demand to the police, or any ratepayer in such division or divisions, by the person in charge of the said cattle.

(iii) Provided also that it shall be lawful for any person to remove any cattle from any one parish or place within the jurisdiction of this Court, to any other such parish or place, for any of the above-mentioned purposes: having first obtained an order in writing for such removal, from the Cattle Plague Committee, appointed as aforesaid. Such order to be issued subject to such conditions and in such form as the said Committee may require, and to be shown on demand to the police, or any ratepayer in the county, by the person in charge of such cattle.

But no cattle shall be removed under any such order, either from or through any parish or place wherein, or within two miles of which, the Cattle Plague exists, or within the space of thirty days previously has existed.

8. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, goat, or swine, nor the raw or untanned hide or skin, nor any horn, hoof, or offal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, or goat (except such hides, skins, horns, or hoofs as are directly imported into the United Kingdom from India, Australia, South Africa, or America), nor any dung likely to propagate infection, shall be removed from any farm, or along or across any highway, or the sides thereof, in any parish or place within the jurisdiction of this Court, after the Chief Inspector, or any duly qualified Inspector, shall have certified that the Cattle Plague exists, or within the space of 30 days previously has existed, in such parish or place.

9. That no removal of any animal under any of the foregoing Orders be made, except between the hours of seven in the morning and five in the afternoon.

10. That the word "highway" in the foregoing Orders shall be construed to extend to any occupation-road or bridle-way, except so far as such occupation-road or bridle-way shall be in the occupation of or contiguous to lands in the occupation of the owner of any cattle moving thereon.

11. That every local authority other than this Court, now having jurisdiction within the limits of this county, be invited to co-operate with this Court in carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by or under the Orders in Council hereinbefore mentioned.

12. That all existing Orders of the Privy Council, and all orders of this Court in relation to the "Cattle Plague," be printed, and a copy sent to each magistrate in the county.

13. That the foregoing orders, declarations, and appointments, be and continue in force until

the same shall be altered or revoked by any further Order.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the twenty-eighth year of the reign of Her Majesty, cap. 45, entitled "An Act to provide for the Collection by means of Stamps, of Fees payable in the Superior Courts of Law at Westminster, and in the Offices belonging thereto," it is provided by the third section thereof, that the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, with the concurrence of the Lords Chief Justices and of the Lord Chief Baron, may, from time to time, make such rules as seem fit for regulating the use of these stamps under this Act, and particularly for prescribing the application thereof to documents from time to time in use or required to be used for the purpose of such stamps, and for insuring the proper cancellation of adhesive stamps and keeping account of such stamps.

And whereas by an Order made in pursuance of the said Act on the 16th day of December last, it was ordered that all adhesive stamps affixed to any paper or document, presented to or kept in the possession of any officers of the said Courts or of the clerks to the Judges, should, before the Act is done or permitted to be done, in respect of which the fee denoted by such stamp is payable, be effectually cancelled by some officer of the said Courts, or by one of the said clerks to the Judges, by obliterating the same by means of a handstamp and printing-ink, shewing the date of the cancellation, and no such document should be filed or delivered out until the stamp thereon should be cancelled or defaced. And whereas it is expedient to alter the said Order. Now we, being two of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, with the concurrence of the Lords Chief Justices and of the Lord Chief Baron, do hereby order and direct that all stamps directed by the said Order to be cancelled, may be so cancelled by writing thereon the initial letters of the name of the person by whom the same is so directed to be cancelled, and the date of such cancellation, or in the manner directed by the said Order.

CATTLE PLAGUE.—ISLE OF MAN.

WHEREAS by an Act passed by the Legislature of the Isle of Man, entitled "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1865," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of any two Members of the Council, from time to time to make such Orders and regulations, and to take such measures, as may appear to be necessary for preventing or regulating

the importation of animals from parts beyond the seas.

Now, therefore, the Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two Members of the Council, by virtue of and in exercise of the powers given by the said Act, hath ordered as follows:—

I. That the expression "animal" in this Order shall include any bull, cow, ox, heifer, steer, calf, tup, sheep, wether, or lamb; and that the expression "meat" shall include the flesh of any animal.

II. Before any animal to be imported into this island from that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland shall be landed, the following certificates in writing must be handed to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry:—

1. From a Government inspector at the port of embarkation that the cattle when embarked were free from any symptom of the cattle disease, generally known as the rinderpest.
2. A written certificate from an inspector appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor that there is no symptom of the said disease amongst any of the animals to be landed.
3. A written certificate from the master of the vessel that she has not been employed in carrying cattle, except from that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland, for a period of three months previous to the date of the said certificate.

III. In the event of the inspector certifying in writing to the Collector of Customs that the rinderpest exists on board any vessel importing animals, none of the animals on board such vessel shall be allowed to land.

IV. In the event of any doubt existing on the mind of an inspector whether any of the cattle being imported are affected by the rinderpest, two more inspectors shall be called in, and their decision, given in writing, shall be final.

V. In the event of the decision of the inspectors being that the symptoms are not those of rinderpest, then, upon this being certified in writing to the Collector of Customs, permission will be given for the animals to be landed; those, however, respecting which a doubt exists to be separated, and landed at such place and kept within such limits, as the inspectors may direct, for a period of six days, at the end of which time, on the inspector certifying that there is no appearance of the rinderpest, they may be removed by the owner.

VI. The owner will be responsible for the animals being provided with necessary food during this period.

VII. In the event of the rinderpest breaking out amongst any of the animals while in quarantine, the inspectors shall seize and slaughter, or cause to be slaughtered, and to be buried within the limits of the quarantine ground, or in such other place as the inspectors may appoint any animal labouring under such disease. And the animals that were in immediate contact or within the same yard or inclosure as the animal or animals so infected shall be removed to another part of the quarantine ground, and the quarantine of six days to commence afresh from the day of such removal.

VIII. In the event of any hay, straw, or other article, the importation of which is prohibited by the said Proclamation, being used for the packing and preservation of merchandise, the importers before the removal of their goods shall be required to give an undertaking in writing to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry that they will

destroy or cause to be destroyed by fire, in the presence of a constable, within twenty-four hours from the delivery of the goods, all such prohibited articles.

IX. No meat shall be imported without a certificate in writing from a Government inspector at the port of embarkation that the meat is free from disease and fit for human food.

X. These Orders to take effect from the 20th day of February, 1866.
