HE Grand Revolution that was feared would be the confequent of the Armies Revolt, was yefterday effected, in the depoling of Sulran Mahomet, and fetting on the Throne his Brother Solyman, which proceeded by these Throne his Brother Solyman, which proceeded by these fteps: The Grand Signior had, entertained fome hope, that the Differenties of the Army would have been allay'd upon the arrival amongst them of the Sclictar Aga, with Assurances from him, That their Arrears should be all paid: That besides a considerable Donative, all their Demands should meet with a Compliance. And some Bersons in credit with him, having infinated, that one that he retained a feerer Kindness for the late Viller solyman, and that he referved the shewing of it to a convenient feason to their prejudice; he declared his Resolution to sacrifice him and all his Dependents to their Satisfaction, and approved of the Advice given him to feize the Estate, not only of the Vicer, but Advice given film to leaze the Estate, not only of the Viver, but also of the Caimacan, the high Treasurer and chief Customer, with those of the other Principal Officers, rowards rassing the Money necessary to be distributed amongst the Troops. In the mean time Couriers arrived daily from the Army with no other accounts, than that they threatned nothing less than the derivening the Grand' Signiots, and that they constituted should accounts, than that they interacted nothing less than the de-throning the Grand Signior; and that they continued their march by easile Journies toward. Constantinople; and shon after the Seliciar returning, acquainted the Grand Signior, that the Seisum Bassa had indeed received the Seal and Standard, but it was with such an affected indifference, as showed he did not the Seal and Standard had the Henour conferred on him, dehold himself infich obliged by the Honour conferred on him, declaring at the fame time, that he did not know whether he should undertake the burthen of fo weighty a Concern, till he were satisfied that his Highness would contribute his endeavours toward correcting the Dilorders of the Government, which could not be made appear but by his willingness to retreach his exorbitant Expences, and to punish such Ministers, whose Incapacity, Negligence and Avarice, had brought things to that confution: Upon which Notice, the Grand Signior thought it necessary, towards preventing their defigns, to begin himself that Retormation, which he found he should be obliged to; and that Retormation, which he found he though the obliged to; and in order to it, he affembled, on the 10th of October, an Extraordinary Council, at which were prefent the Nichangi, or Secretary of State, the Kadileskers, or chief Judges of Romelia and Amatolia, the Kadil's or Judges, with others vers'd in the Laws; where, after having express'd himself in very moving Terms, in relation to the present unhappy Circumstances of Affairs, he told them, That lince the beguning of his Reign, things had been so managed, as not to deserve consure or re-Arrans, he told them, that there the beginning or his keigh, things had been in managed, as not to deferve cenfure or reproach; and if of late they had been in another porture, it proceeded from the Visiter's not having executed his Commands, and with-holding from him the true Accounts of what passed; But that they had followed the Designation of the late Misses. that they had faln under the Punishments due to their Miscarriages, and he was ready to do the fame Juffice on all those who mages, and he was ready to do the tame juttice on an those who shall be found failing in their Duty; and, if that were not sufficient, he was contented, not only to devest himself of the Empire, but to lay down his Life also, if that could any way conduce to the good of the State, and to the advancing the Glory of the Original Name. On the 26th and 27th, the two Cadileskers or chief Judges, the Kister Aguli or chief of the Eumens, the Bostangis Bacha, and the Teiterdar or Treasurer, were deposed and ordered to be sent to the Army with a Guard; they were carried away the 29th, and all butcher'd by the Soldiers, beginning with the Testerdar; and an Officer in the Army interposing in his behalf, upon pretence that he ought to be kept to give an account of his Administration of the Revenue, they dispatch'd him also to bear him Company. Grand Signior hearing this, like a Sentence passed upon him, retired to his own Apartment, where he was under a Guard little differing from a Prifoner, and continued thus till the 8th little differing from a Prisoner, and continued thus till the 8th instant, without having any account of what passed. And that day the new Musti, the two Cadileskers, the Caimacan, the Age of the Janisaries, and other Principal Officers, who came before from the Army with a Detachement of 1500 Men, met early in the morning at Saneta Sophia the chief Mosque, where, after Prayers, they put the Question to the Musti, Whether, for the good of the Empire, Solyman might not be placed on the Throne, and Mahomet IV. be devosed? who, having 1esolved it in the Affirmative, and according to custom, put it into a the Intologand vancounts IV. or acquires: who, naving sentire it in the Affirmative, and according to culton, put it into a ferfix or Solemn Decision: They were all immediately to the Old Serail, and about eight in the morning there Proclaim'd So yman; and the fame was done in the livening throughout the whole City, and in Galara and Pera, amid it the loud Acclamations of the People. Makemet had heard nothing of the Change till about Noon, when, calling for his Horks to take the Air, the Eunichs told him, he must first send to ask leave of Sultan Solyman his Brother, who soon after sent an Order written with he own Hand, to this effect, That as Makemet had kept his Brother in Prison 174 40 years, it was but just that he should be shul up as long himself to do penance for his Sins, and at the same time ordered him to be secured: To those that came to seize him, he only said, What have I done to deserve this Ulage? The present Sultan is about 45 years old, tall and well proportion d, of a strong Complexion; he and his Brother were by different Mothers: He is in great Esteem amongst the Men of the Law, who are also their Expounders of the Alcoran, as one that has acquired a great Skill in the Laws by a constant application to these Studies during his long Consinement. faction of the januaries, who had intuitive this rather toranim, and more than once confirred to lay him alide in favour of this very Solyman; and they were not recovered out of their vitious ferment, but by the feafonable Severities and prudent Conduct of the Two Ruperl's, Father and Sm, who were Grand Villiers fucceffively; the first of which, is faid, in the 5 years time that he had the publick management of Affairs, to have caused 5 or 6 and thirty thousand to be executed: And they were both of them careful that the Armies should not want employment to give vent to their boiling Spirits, by which means, they not only kept the Helm of the Government steady, but spread the terror of the Ottoman Arms, they seldom fairning upon any of the Neighbouring Countries, that they did not carry away a piece; so that it was in this Reign, and under their Ministry, that the Transilvanians lost Waradin, the Emperor Novigrad and Newhausel, the Poles Camunee, and the Venetians Candia, not to mention what was done against the Moscovites, and inore remote parts; the Grand Signior in the mean time (having such Men to rely on) gave hunsels up to the Pleasires of the Field, and Hunting, which was his Production, wherein he was engaged to excess, being otherwise a Prince (if compared with his Predecessors) without Cruelty, without Covetous end Moderation, and one that delerved, from his Subjects,

Justice and Moderation, and one that deserved, from his Subjects, a kinder Fate than what has attended him, since his Missortunes are made his only Crime, or rather the Pretence to excuse the unsuccessful or faint Performances of his Army.
